WITCH-HUNTING. The American socialist weekly The Militant reports this example of the witch-hunt.

All the penny candy vending machines in Wheeling, W.Va., were confiscated by vigilant police after it was discovered that along with chewing gum balls some of the machines now and then dispensed "subversive" prizes. These prizes were postage stamp size emblems of 16 different countries—including Soviet Russia. On one side was a hammer and sickle and on the other side appeared the subtle propaganda: "U.S.S.R., population 211,000,000, capital Moscow." City Manager Plummer ordering the machines confiscated, declared: "This is a terrible thing to expose our children to.'

But not all Americans are witch-hunters. Those who suffer at the hands of the witchhunters, and those whose sons and husbands are being slaughtered in Korea are an evergrowing army.

All these things are considered "unessential" in an arms drive. The Budget therefore sets out to mop up what they call "inflationary demand" by deliberately allowing prices to rise, charging for health services, restricting readit (the spiring the Bonk Pate) and create credit (by raising the Bank Rate) and creating unemployment. Mr. Butler says that the workers can offset rising prices by . . . working longer hours! Reduced income tax is supposed to provide the incentive to overtime working.

Tax-Dodging

How the Wealthy Stay That Way

MR. RALPH ASSHETON the member for Blackburn West, but formerly Tory member for the City of London, has described Mr. Butler's handiwork as "... a brave Budget ... realistic and, above all, not vindictive ..." He, and all the Tory Press are now busy spreading the illusion that financial reward will now attend the deserving. But will it?

The worker—if he earns enough to pay income tax — pays it AS HE EARNS with unfailing regularity. But for Mr. Assheton's friends—the unearned income brigade—many are the ways (all quite legal) of dodging tax. Some of these tax-evasion methods are even encouraged by the income-tax authorities

THE LIFE-INSURANCE RACKET

As is well-known, an income-tax allowance is granted for payments on life-insurance, it being argued that such payments reduce the amount of purchasing power competing for scarce goods (thus reducing inflation) and at the same time provides capital for industrial development.

Many people with small incomes have been in the habit of taking out a policy as an insurance against the insecurity of life under private enterprise. But now these small policy holders are being joined by an increasing number of people whose incomes are assured by gilt-edged investments (subject to super-tax!) and who are taking up insurance policies worth tens of thousands of pounds. Why?

Because, by this means, part of their income which would be subject to supertax is now used to pay premiums on a policy re-payable at death, or after a limited period. Such repayment is made as capital AND IS NOT SUBJECT TO TAX.

THE "LOSSES" DODGE

Here is another neat little racket. The Inland Revenue Department does not make claims against firms making a loss, instead it allows losses which it has "agreed" to be see against the profits of a firm which buys out another with a loss.

Consequently, a brisk trade has arisen in the sale of firms which have nothing to commend them except an "agreed loss"! A number of brokers even specialise in this "business" which is no doubt considered as "essential work".

Firms with an "agreed loss" of £25,000 have been offered and sold for £5,000. The buyer being compensated by the balance of £20,000 worth of exemption from

tax for the profits of his own firm.

But the real plums in this line are those firms who are able to advertise an "agreed director's loss". You see, the distribution of dividend rescued from profits tax will leave the recipient still liable to income tax. But the transfer of an "agreed director's loss" from one director to another provides exemption from income-tax also!

THEY DON'T PAY THAT 19/6d.

The people who derive large incomes from trust funds find it most inconvenient to pay tax at 19/6 in the pound. And the Insurance

Companies have every sympathy with them. So investors can sell for a limited period those parts of their holdings yielding dividend subject to super-tax.

The money received from such sales is considered to be "return of capital" AND IS EXEMPTED FROM TAXATION.

Since the dividend-drawer would have

had to pay supertax at 95%, and the Insurance Company will have to pay profitstax at only 30%, there is obviously plenty of scope for them to strike a bargain profitable to both.


The bonus-shares racket is based on the same conditions for its success, namely, that capital is free of tax. The release of reserve funds as bonus shares, which are regarded as capital and not taxed, has put hundreds of millions of pounds into the pockets of shareholders

WHY THEY GET AWAY WITH IT

All these dodges were practised during the lifetime of the late Labour Government, and they will continue to operate to a greater or lesser extent under any Government which permits the economy to remain predominantly capitalist. It is an illusion to think that taxation alone can ensure a fair distribution of wealth.

While private ownership of industry continues to provide unearned income it will also guarantee that a great part of it will go untaxed. Only common ownership can stop up unearned income at its source, and and thus give to all a fair share of the country's wealth.

THE GREAT DECEPTION

By H. E. CASTENS

PROBABLY nothing that Butler said in his Budget speech was a lie.

Yet when he said he was putting up the price of food by 1/6 per week, and with exquisite meanness went on to underbalance the charities he dispensed to the poor against this figure, he *implied* that this would be the limit of harm that his Budget would do to the worker's standards.

So doing, he implied a lie, for the Budget must cause far greater harm than this.

The worker must pay for the old age pension rise with an added insurance contribution of $7\frac{1}{2}d$.

The increased cost of petrol must lead to a rise in costs of goods and services adding up to nearly 6d, per head per week.

The increased bank rate raises costs every time money is borrow to pay for machinery, stocks, or labour, or to sell by hire purchase; and the total effect of this must be in the neighbourhood of 1/- per week per head.

The destruction of the utility system will raise the cost of better clothes hitherto tax free, and (by leaving the quality of the cheaper clothes to the whim of the maker) lower their quality and increase their real price.

The direct effect of the Budget on the cost of working class living will thus be nearer to 4/- per head per week than to 1/6d. Some experts say it will be 5/-. All this before the health charges.

THE LIE IN FIGURES

Against an increased cost of 8/- per week, a couple on the old age pension get a 2/- rise.

Against an increased cost of 16/- per week, a married couple with two children (allowing for increased family allowance and income-tax reductions) will get:

Up to an income of £8 a week ... 3/- per week.

At an income of £10 per week ... 9/4 per week.

At an income of £15 per week ... 19/- per week.

At an income of £20 per week ... 24/- per week.

One reason Butler has given for cutting food subsidies was that they made a taxfree gift to the rich. So, as a moral man, he took that gift away. But was he so moral when he gave back to the rich, as tax reduction not only what he had earlier taken from them as subsidies, but also all the subsidies he had taken from the poor?!!

Butler may indeed have told no lie, but if he goes down to history as the eighteen-penny-liar, he will have little to thank but his own sanctimonious hypocrisy and the good sense of the British worker in separating the word from the meaning.

Bevan, and not even Mr. Stalin. The credit must go, first and foremost, to those thousands of simple workers and peasants of China and Korea who, possessing little except a fierce desire to be free of foreign domination, have stood up to and halted, the better-fed, better-equipped, imperial armies of MacArthur, Ridgeway and Van Fleet. It is this resistance which has shocked the American people, caused them to question the very purpose of this "dirty war" and thus created further obstacles inside the U.S. itself, to the extension of this horrible conflict. Once that fact is recognised, Labour's official support for Ridgeway in Korea will be ended and replaced by the demand for the withdrawal of all British troops.

CONCLUSION

These are just some of the great questions of policy which have been raised by Aneurin Bevan's clash with the Right Wing of the Party. They must be settled at the October Conference which will give Labour a wonderful opportunity to place itself in the right camp—the camp of international labour.

The war which is being prepared against the Soviet Union, Eastern Europe and China—and which is causing this shift to the left in Britain—is not OUR war. These countries cannot be OUR enemies if they have done what we have still to do, root up the capitalist way of life. They all have economic difficulties and there are serious distortions in their forms of Government.

Bureaucracies, however, cannot flourish where there is an abundance of the good things of life—and abundance there will be, just as soon as the industrial might of the Western world is linked in a planned socialist way, to the enormous agricultural resources of Russia, China, and a liberated colonial world. That is Labour's task.

as the French Government attempted to raise the huge sums of money to finance its commitment to the proposed European Army . . . the Government fell!

Small wonder that an anxious note can be detected in the capitalist press. "The fall of the French Government" says the New York Times. "the growing agitation against re-armament in Germany, and the success of the lunatic fringe in driving the British Labour Party towards pacifism...

You will note that the Americans regard the growth of the Left Wing in Britain, equally with the opposition to re-armament in Germany and France, as serious obstacles to their plans for war. (They will have even greater "cause for concern" when they realise that the "lunatic fringe" represents the majority of Britain's 8 million organised workers. Some lunatic! Some fringe!)

Isn't it time we turned our practical opposition into a conscious political one? Labour is officially committed to support re-armament. In reality, the workers have rejected this policy because of its ruinous economic consequences. Isn't it time we brought our policy officially in line with the reality by withdrawing all support for this re-armament programme?

AMERICAN "AID"

Implicit in a rejection of rearmament is, of course, a refusal to accept American "aid", which is designed almost exclusively for war

The so-called Military Security Act under which American aid is given is "an agree-

For this reason, no less than 10 countries have turned down such "aid" during the last few months.

The Mexican Government, for example, "considered this (M.S.A.) to mean a commitment to send their troops outside their national territories. They were not prepared to accept anything that even hinted at such an undertaking." (New York Times, 22/2/52).

In Indonesia, the acceptance of the terms of "Mutual Security" by the Foreign Secretary, caused a government crisis. A majority of the Cabinet, together with the two main Indonesian parties, denounced the agreement as a violation of their pledge "to conduct an active and independent foreign policy for the promotion of world peace."

As a final example, Burma. Here is a country which occupies a key position in the American plan to invade China. Chiang Kai Chek's troops are clearly there for that purpose. Realising this, and having no desire to see their country "liberated" in the Korean style, the Burmese people have forced their Government to turn down American "aid".

If millions of people in Burma, Indonesia, and Mexico have had the good sense and the courage to turn down American "aid" . . . why should British Labour still be committed to accept it?

FREE THE COLONIES!

The increasing success of all the great popular movements for national liberation in the colonies—progressive movements in themselves—are today becoming a powerful deterrent to the American rulers in launching World War Three. The situation, from the point of view of the Churchill-Truman Axis, is deteriorating.

The armies of the United Nations have failed, despite the most inhuman methods of warfare, to crush the just resistance of the Korean and Chinese peoples.

General Templar, in Malaya, is so far from restoring "law and order" that, in desperation, he has cut in half the rice ration of little Malayan children! Punishing women

and children because their men fight for the liberation of their country is reminiscent of Hitler's marches across Europe. It will have the same result—the popular movement of resistance will grow in strength and determination until Templar the Terrorist is thrown

into the sea.

As for the French in Indo-China, bled white of men and materials in this hopeless attempt to defeat the anti-imperialist army of Ho Chi Mhin, they are now seriously talk of . . pulling out altogether! Meanwhile, the movement for Egyptian and Sudanese independence has now been joined by a mass revolt in all the colonies of French North Africa

If this resistance of the colonial peoples is frustrating the American plans for war, how

Isn't it clear that if our weight is thrown into this struggle—by agitation for the removal of all British troops from the colonies—the "concessn" of the imperialists will be increased a thousandfold.

THANK THE KOREANS

Would such a development make the Americans so desperate that they would gamble all on an immediate declaration of war? Yes, that is possible . . . providing the American millionaires can be assured of the continued support of their own working class.

But should the American workers break their present alliance with Wall Street, the difficulties confronting American Imperialism would be almost insurmountable, paralysing its drive for world domination,

Today there are definite signs of such a development in America. The letter of the American mother (published on page one) is an indication of the changing mood of the American workers. As the casualties mount up among the G.I.'s in Korea, so the patriotic fumes grow less dense in America. The shape of the real American worker—the worker who organised those great union struggles in the '30's—is beginning to emerge. And he doesn't look a bit like his American boss, but just like a working man of any nationality.

Who is responsible for this most significant development? Not Mr. Attlee, not Mr.

POLICY and LEADERSHIP - A PRACTICAL PROBLEM

HOW can we change the present policy of the Labour Party and replace the present right wing leadership with people who will operate a full socialist policy?

These are questions which require practically no less than political answers. They cannot be dealt with simply by passing resolutions or making The left wing occasional speeches. must adopt a more consistent perspective of work politically and organisationally if this is to be achieved.

THE TRADE UNIONS

Every member of the Labour Party should, according to the Constitution, be a member of a trade union. One hears repeatedly inside C.L.P.s that "trade unionists are inactive in the Labour Party", but it is also an unfortunate fact that many members of the Labour Party are inactive inside the unions. This is the first big mistake.

We cannot do serious political work in the Labour Party unless we are active trade unionists, and the trade union rank and file, no matter how hard it fights on the industrial field, will make slow progress unless it participates to the fullest extent inside the Labour Party.

> Shop stewards and factory militants must pack the C.L.P. Management Committees no less than the union branches.

The trade unions today are in the forefront of the struggle against the Tory cuts. On the factory floor there is complete unanimity on the need to resist—the only trouble is that the Labour Party, which is the only political instrument capable of achieving this, remains in the hands of people who in many cases have never been inside a factory in their lives!

Yet there exists machinery to alter all this. Every union branch can actively work within its local C.L.P. It is only necessary to see that the affiliation fees are paid and that reliable delegates, genuinely representing the opinions of the branch, are in regular attendance. Union branch delegates to the C.L.P.s hold a job of first-class importance.

LIAISON NEEDED

To assist this work forward, each C.L.P. should, if it has not done so already, appoint a trade union liaison officer whose job it would be to check up on the unions which meet in the locality and see to it that they are represented on the Management Com-

He must also be familiar with the situation in the local factories, urging the shop stewards to see to it that their members become active Labour Party workers in the district where they live. These are jobs which can be started right away, and needless to say the trade union liaison officer should be person who understands the trade union

Unity between the trade union and L.P. rank-and-file means almost inevitably a strong left wing combination. It means that a breath of the class struggle blows through the Party meetings, thereby sorting out the careerists and bureaucrats. This unity must now be realised in matters of policy.

THE BLOCK VOTE

Each year the trade union block vote strikes terror into the minds of C.L.P. members. They understandably criticise the right

Resolutions must be pushed forward to a successful conclusion on the conference floor of Union conferences and then must be tabled for Labour's Annual Conference.

When the time comes for the C.L.P. to adopt a conference resolution, its members must not proceed in an individual way, imagining that they, and they alone, have the solution to all problems. They must study carefully the progressive decisions of union conferences and then frame resolutions which embody these.

This will enable the C.L.P. delegates to contact the unions concerned at the Annual Party Conference. Thus begins the first great step in utilising the block vote for socialism—united action, all along the line, between the unions and C.L.P.s in matters of policy and organisation.


If right wing union leaders refuse such help, then it becomes a matter of waging a campaign to force them to do so.

Just as the trade union rank-and-file can help alter the situation inside the Labour Party, so also can L.P. members help trade unionists. Changing leaders can be accomplished if Labour's left wing members get together and fight for the best men to be elected to union posts.

THE CO-OPERATIVE MOVEMENT

There is a lot of misgiving inside Labour Parties concerning the Co-operative Movement. It is generally felt that since the Co-ops, have large sums of money at their disposal they may one day take over the local Party. We can appreciate this point, local Party. We can appreciate this point, but it is not the correct approach—for the Co-operative Movement also is moving towards the left.

When elections to the Management Committees come round, the C.L.P., in co-opera-tion with the Co-op. Party, should propose its own slate of candidates and mobilise the full support of its affiliated bodies to fight for these.

CONCLUSION

Unity in action between the rank-and-file of the trade unions, the Labour Parties, and the Co-op. movement must, from now on, be the main objective of the Left Wing. Already Union Conferences have on their agendas some very good resolutions. of them will undoubtedly be carried.

At the coming October Conference of the Party, if the Constituency Labour Parties enter the political arena with policies based on these Trade Union resolutions, the Right Wing of both the Unions and the Labour Party will be resoundingly defeated.

Billericay demands anti-Tory fight

With all or part of these conditions ful-filled, you will then qualify for regular

sojourns in the sun under the auspices of M.R.A. (Master Renegades Association).

Whilst sojourning in Florida, Switzerland or Canada (parochial little outfit this), you will find that you have suddenly "changed". No longer do you beat your wife, no more do you curse the Boss. You have become absolutely "unselfish" and above all you are absolutely and quite definitely "honest".

From this point you will then proceed to "change" the "world" starting first with your own workmates, you will very soon kill this selfish demand for a living wage. You will put an end to this bitterness against their "kindly" employers and provided you are not too long holidaying in Florida, Switzerland or Canada, you will, by your grand example, have the Shipowners touring the docks anxiously enquiring "if anybody is short of a few bob this week" or urging men to wear shirts (if any) this "bitter" weather.

You\_will find, however, when beginning your "crusade" that your ranks are some what depleted.

# Labour Youth Support Apprentice Strike

By NORMAN WINTROP (East Salford L.L.O.Y.)

ON February 7th, 1,000 Clydeside apprentices held a march and a demonstration for £1 a week wage increase. Such was the feeling that, by March 14th, 15,000 lads were on strike in Scotland and, in the course of a few days, were joined by 4,000 in Manchester, 550 in Sheffield, and smaller numbers in other parts of the country.

With the bulk of the press trying to give the impression that the apprentices were just "out for a lark", the strikers settled down to running their strike efficiently. Factory and Area Committees were set up and delegates were sent all over the country. While the press were snooping around waiting to seize upon and magnify any manifestation of youthful exuberance, the apprentices organised their meetings, deputations and other activities in an orderly and effective manner.

#### LIVING STANDARDS FALLEN

There are, as in all strikes, solid reasons for the withdrawal of labour. Since 1941 apprentice engineers have received no independent wage increase—nothing except small percentages of the increases granted to

For example, last year the rising cost of living forced the A.E.U. to demand a £1 wage increase. They finally got 11/--but the apprentices, equally affected by the rising prices, received only 2/- to 6/-. The living standards of young engineers has been steadily getting worse over the last ten years. At the time of the strike, the weekly wage for apprentices varied from 28/- for the 15-year-olds up to 80/4 for those aged 20.

The working week is 44 hours—and in many cases on highly skilled jobs. The A.E.U. has shown that during this time the engineering employers have been making £3 a week profit out of every worker employed in the industry. This figure of exploitation is, of course, much higher for the

# **Negro-Baiting**

By TOM MERCER (Norwood Labour Party)

THE slogan "Keep Brixton White" is being chalked on the streets of South West London where, since the war, hundreds of negro workers have settled. This foul slogan is a challenge not only to the Negroes of Brixton but, in particular, to the Labour Parties of that area (Brixton and Norwood).

Fascists always seize upon some genuine social grievance (in this case, the acute housing shortage) and use it to stir up racial antagonisms so as to divide the Labour Movement. In Brixton they are trying to cause clashes between white workers and black—just as in other areas they try to cause disunity with filthy anti-semitic propaganda. No policy is too vile for these social thugs to exploit; no action too low that they will not stoop to it.

It is not the Negroes who are responsible for the housing shortage in Brixton. On the contrary, they are its worst victims, exposed to all sorts of shameful rack-renting by very, very white landlords.

The writer himself once occupied a room in the new negro quarter of Brixton. The rent was 10/6 a week. The address was 28 Somerleyton Road.

He was ejected from this room by a white landlady in order that the room could be let to two negroes at 25/- each—thereby increasing the rent from 10/6

The same thing took place throughout the entire four-storied house and, I believe, has happened in almost every case where rooms have been let to negroes.

Both white and black workers are therefore the victims of grasping capitalist landlords. And it is precisely to cover up and hide this fact that the Fascists are trying to sow the seeds of racialism in Brixton.

But they will never succeed if the Labour Parties make common cause with the negro workers. There must be launched a recruiting drive among black workers so that white and black may together wage a vigorous campaign to expose the Fascist mischief-makers and drive them out of the area.

Keep Brixton free of Fascists-by uniting black and white workers against Toryism and landlordism.

Franco and the Falange feel strong because the great powers, who yesterday condemned them, today help and tolerate them. Also because the international Labour Movement and liberal forces throughout the world have markedly decreased their activity against the Franco tyranny.

The Barcelona and Sevilla trials are a

challenge to the Labour and Democratic forces which have kept alive throughout the world an opposition to the regime of hunger, oppression and terror now governing Spain. This challenge must be met urgently and without fail by the international working class and its trade union and political organisations.

# The Tories and De-requisitioning

THE Tory Government is deliberately setting out to create more homeless families. Those workers who live in requisitioned property are going to be turned out-unless the Labour Movement kicks up a hell of a row!

That much is clear from the following official circular which has been sent out by the Tory Ministry of Housing, and part of which reads as follows:

> MINISTRY OF HOUSING AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT, WHITEHALL, S.W.1 19th February, 1952

All Housing Authorities, County Councils, England.

# REQUISITIONED PREMISES NOW IN USE FOR HOUSING

I am directed by the Minister of Housing and Local Government to state that he has had under consideration the arrangements made during the war under which powers were delegated to Clerks of Local Authorities to requisition premises for the accommodation of inadequately housed families. These arrangements were made to meet war-time conditions and have been continued after the war at the expense of the Exchequer in order to assist Local Authorities in the immediate post-war difficulties.

2.... A term must now be put to the financial responsibility of the Government for these arrangements which must nor be replaced, so far as accommoda-tion continues to be required, by services provided under the normal machinery of local government."

Tory Councils are only too ready to put the terms of this Circular into operation. The Tory Council in the Royal Borough of Kensington has already done so, and tenants of requisitioned accommodation in other boroughs have been threatened with eviction in a similar manner.

There are two reasons for this Tory action. The first is to give back the landlords property that they can re-let at fancy rents. The second is to relieve the Tory Government of the expense of maintaining such property. They need the money for the arms drive.

What the circular says, in effect, is: you must go homeless so that the war-machine can be capable of making millions of others

One way to frustrate this Tory plot against the people is to see that Labour is returned in all the forthcoming Local Elections. But not just returned—returned with a definite instruction from the Labour Movement NOT TO OPERATE THE TERMS OF THIS CIRCULAR.

Another essential task is to rally the organised workers behind any resistance put up by the threatened tenants of requisitioned We have been warned! homes.

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
