These T.U. Demands Anger Mr. Churchill

THE Amalgamated Engineering Union has demanded that the next Labour Government re-nationalise the road haulage industry without paying any further compensation. This is, in every respect, a just and reasonable request.

Those who are prepared to "buy", at knock-down prices, public property which the Covernment has no moral right to sell . . . are guilty of a thinlydisguised robbing of the national exchequer. They must expect no different treatment to that which is regularly meted out to other, less prominent, members of the burgling profession.

In the parliamentary debate on the subject, Mr. Morrison didn't go as far as the National *Committee of the A.E.U.—not by a dozen miles !-nevertheless, his speech contained sufficient of the popular indignation at the proposed smashand grab on road haulage that it drew from Mr. Churchill a sharp rebuke.

Cat Out of the Bag!

Referring to what he called this "grave issue", the leader of the Tories thundered: "If persons acting in good faith . . . are to be dispossessed without compensation, or with inadequate compensation, a new era will open up.

"Of course," he conceded, "one Parliament may change or reverse the legislation of another (but) it is quite a different thing to violate the broad equities of legal

or commercial transactions. would not only affect our credit in many ways, but the constitutional authority of Parliament itself would be impugned."

It was a most important speech. It should be pinned up in the offices of every trade union leader who opposes industrial action to prevent the passage of reactionary Tory legislation. For what did Mr. Churchill say? Translated into everyday language he said this: I will recognise the authority of Parliament ONLY SO LONG AS THAT AUTHORITY IS NOT USED TO ATTACK THE WEALTH AND PROPERTY OF MY BIG BUSINESS FRIENDS.

No matter if nine-tenths of the population demands that no com-pensation be paid to the road haulage-robbers, if the next Labour Government puts this policy into effect . . . Mr. Churchill will consider that the "constitutional authority of Parliament has been impugned"! What a lesson for those who try to teach us that Parliament stands above class Parliament stands above class interests!

But at least we should be grateful to Churchill for clearing away the mystery which surrounds the conception of "parliamentary conception of "parliamentary authority". Labour must adopt a similar, clear-cut, class attitude to this institution.

If Parliament serves the interests of the working class-who are, of course, the vast majority of the population—then it should be supported and defended. But if— as at present—Parliament serves the interests of Big Business and is used to lower our living standards. we should consider ourselves under no sacred obligation to recognise its authority.

KOREA

By George West

NOT all the censored reports and contradictory statements from American generals in Tokyo can hide the rottenness of the United Nations' policy towards the Korean prisoners of war.

Out of 170,000 prisoners, 60,000, then 70,000, now 100,000! (Manchester Guardian 17/5/52) did not want to return back to North Korea or China—or so we were told.

Is anyone foolish enough to think that the American generals would carry on a war solely for the human rights of 60,000 (70,000 or 100,000) 'gooks"—as they have arrogantly termed the peoples of the Far East?

That only one in every four Chinese prisoners should wish to return to his family and land is inconceivable. These Chinese have experienced the Chiang Kai Shek regime, they know its corruptness; millions of their fellow countrymen deserted its armies to join those of the Chinese communists. Yet we are expected to believe that three out of every four, of their own free will, decided they wanted to go back to Chiang!

GENERALS ADMIT IT

No! The truth is clear. What is being manufactured is a propa-ganda trap for the peoples of the "free" world. The war was to be given a new moral whitewash so that when the truce talks break down, young lads could then die in Korea (and China?) assured that they were fighting for "human rights". But events in Koje (and now in Pusan) have exploded the whole scheme.

General Colson, successor to General Dodd, admitted that the Geneva Convention had not been carried out at Koje (is it for this 'indiscretion' that he has been reduced to the rank of Colonel?) There had been wounding of prisoners. The commander of the camp admitted that when prisoners refused individual re-screening, troops were sent in to separate them up. Red Cross delegates received information from a prisoner, referred to as a 'man of confidence', which gave a shocking picture of the activities of U.N. troops.

They entered the camp at 4 a.m. shot prisoners who attempted to leave their tents, and generally unleashed terror in the camp, even kicking dead bodies being loaded on to lorries. There was no medical examination of the wounded who were thus loaded on to the lorries with their dead.

What 'voluntary screening' really means has now been thoroughly exposed. Thus the anger and panic of the American Command and its removal of Colson. They have cynically repudiated Colson's agreement with the prisoners, just as they have repudiated the Geneva Convention on voluntary repatria-

MASSACRES COMING?

The whole affair stinks to high heaven. Some slight smell has even penetrated the nostrils of the Daily Herald editor. He commented on May 14th . . . "Events are disturb-May 14th . . . ing. Evidence is confused and often contradictory... there is a growing anxiety that all is not well in the camps. If nostrils in that quarter are slightly twitching, the stench from the activities of the U.N. command in Korea is nearly suffocating real socialists in the Labour

The mass movement of troops into Koje and Pusan is a warning that a wholesale massacre of Chinese and Korean prisoners is being contemplated.

We must end this filthy war in Korea. Our Party was built for nobler things than supporting wars against colonial peoples. Let us have done with the war schemes of American generals. Let all real socialists redouble their efforts to rouse the Labour movement to end the shame of Korea Withdraw

German Treaty Means A New 'Korea'

Re-armament Against The Will Of German Workers

WORLD War Three has been brought dangerously near by the decision to rearm Western Germany against the will of the great majority of the German people. If the decision is ever ratified, the peaceful unification of Germany will become almost impossible.

Western Germany — firmly gripped in the vice of the Truman-Churchill war alliance known as the "European Defence Community"—will be in possession of a modern army of 12 divisions staffed and officered by ex-fascists longing to claw back, with the aid of both and tarks the land and of bombs and tanks, the land and

property taken from them by the workers and peasants of Eastern

Confronted with this situation, the East German Republic-if only in self-defence-will re-arm and draw closer in every way to Soviet Russia and the non-capitalist states of Eastern Europe.

The stage is being set for another 'Korea'-on a vastly bigger scale and right in the heart of Europe.

The bestial gang of German fascists now emerging from the prisons with the blessings of their jailers, and once more preparing to terrorise the peoples of a war-weary Europe, are now considered by the American-led world coalition of capitalist powers as reliable allies in

the new war for "freedom and democracy". And indeed, they are!

Their plans for seizing Eastern Germany (lke Syngman Rhee's plans for invading North Korea) perfectly coincide with the vast military preparations now pro-ceeding in all capitalist countries for war against Soviet Russia, China, and the countries of Eastern

Workers Oppose

But in Germany, as in Korea, there is one big obstacle. Those marked down as the victims are refusing to be led to the slaughter.

Whoever else may support German re-armament . . . the German working class is against it. They have proved, not only in resolutions

50,000 Own Britain

THE "Financial Times" has made an investigation into the ownership of British industry. Their figures—given in a book called "Ownership of Industry"—are startling.

They calculate that 4% of the adult population now own the whole of British industry. But nine-tenths of these owners hold between them less than 35% of the total capital. Consequently; one-tenth of the total share-holders—that is, about 120,000 people—own 65% of all British capital.

Allowing for the fact that roughly half of these shares are in nominee and corporate holdings, it is safe to conclude that no more than 50,000 people (probably less) OWN two-thirds of this country and ... CONTROL the lot!

Support Thomson Strikers

DESPITE biased reports in the national press, few workers will fail to understand the real nature of the Thomson-Leng strike. It is a strike for the very principle of trade unionism itself. As the General Secretary of N.A.T.S.O.P.A. states, it is to defend "the right to belong to a trade union".

Brothers, that is an important issue!! No apologies are necessary for supporting this strike.

Mr. Thomson The reason behind the dispute is simple. apparently thinks he is living in the middle of last centurybefore we won the right to organise legally. He has, in fact, succeeded in turning the clock back—for a quarter century at least—in his own small domain.

Ever since 1926 Thomsons has been non-union and anti-union on the employers' side. On returning to work after the defeat of 1926, the Thomson workers were forced to sign the humiliating "Document"—an agreement not to join a trade union while serving this employer whom even Churchill was obliged to characterise as: "a narrow, bitter, unreasonable being, eaten up with his own conceit, consumed with his own petty arrogance, pursued from day to day and from year to year by an unrelenting bee in his bonnet".

This, however, is no harmless "bee". If Thomson gets away with it in the print trade, now that his challenge has been accepted, other employers will feel that they can get away with this antiquated policy elsewhere. That is why we support the slogan: "Black All Thomson Work".

Support for the Thomson workers is already nation-wide. The London Office of N.A.T.S.O.P.A., for example, has received at least a thousand messages of support and solidarity, both moral and financial. We endorse that support and call on our readers to continue and extend it until the victory is won.

Furniture Bosses Attack Sliding Scale

THE employers intend that ment has been magnificent. workers should bear the brunt of rising prices. That is clear from the attempts now being made to undermine

agreements which tie wages to the cost of living.

The first direct attack on sliding scale agreements (which cover some two million workers) comes from the furniture trade employers.

Furniture workers have a cost of living agreement whereby their rise a penny an hour for every three points rise in the cost of living index. The Furniture of living index. The Furniture Employers Association now propose to amend the agreement so as to allow a penny an hour for every four points rise in the index ! But that is not all.

Maintaining that the agreement is "unfair to them", the employers propose that this change shall be made retrospective from April 1951!!

WHAT IT MEANS

They therefore claim a standstill in cost-of-living increases until the present index figure (now standing at 132) shall have risen to 140, when a penny an hour for every four points will then begin to

This would mean that by the time it reaches 144 the workers, instead of having had 4d, an hour increase, as they would under the present agreement, would only get 1d. an

The response of the furniture workers in defence of the old agree-

7,000 of them, from 40 London factories, demonstrated in Hyde Park on May 15th at the call of the London Furniture Workers Shop Stewards' Council.

SUPPORT FOR UNION ACTION

They decided unanimously to "reject emphatically the proposals of the Employers' Association to amend the Interim Cost of Living Agreement dated 19th March, 1951" and pledged "support for any action the Unions may deem necessary in defence of the agreement, and resolve to make the maximum contribution to prevent any worsening of the present Agreement and living standards".

A deputation of 12 representa-tives of a cross section of Factories and Unions was elected to present the resolution to the workers' side of the Joint Industrial Council.

In sending us a report of this magnificent meeting, Bro. J. Moss. Chairman of the Shop Stewards' Council, writes . . "The capitalist press (including the Herald) ignored the meeting, in spite of being informed before and after. don't suppose it had the news value of the public burning of ration books by the Housewives eague, or the kind of clothes the Queen is to wear at her coronation.

"This demonstration", says Jack oss, "should be an encouragement to the Unions in their efforts to secure the withdrawal of the employers' proposals and the addition of 3d, an hour for all furniture workers. It also prepares the way for the time when, and if, it will be necessary to take further action in defence of our living standards.

GARMENT BOSSES DODGE HOLIDAY AGREEMENT

LARGE scale unemployment and "short time" now threatens all workers in the clothing industry, and the position is made worse by the poor state of T.U. organisation (Mantle and Costume).

After a long period of negotia-tions at the Wages Council on the unions' proposal for holiday pay at average rates, a new order was

advance for clothing workers on The order operates holiday pay. The order operates as from the 23rd May and is based on the last year's earnings.

Having opposed the proposals during the negotiations, the employers are now taking steps to avoid payment this year. have issued notices ending employment before 23rd of May, others are making proposals designed to avoid payment by wage cuts or alteration of conditions of employment.

An emergency meeting of the Mantle and Costume Branch, National Union of Tailors and Garment Workers, at the Shoreditch Town Hall on 22nd May-gave a strong lead to resist these attempts to avoid payment of the new holiday rates.

Among those who contributed to the discussion, Bro. Frank Hamilton, reporting his experiences in a non-union shop, said the workers agreed to join the union after the boss had threatened to sack them in protest against the new holiday He also pointed out how the workers would respond with

Workers must close their ranks quickly if they are to succeed in resisting the attacks of the employers and obtain full benefit from the new Order for holiday Working conditions cannot be maintained or improved without 100 per cent trade unionism. Only through struggle, properly led, will it be possible to meet the developing crisis.

Rank and file workers must pay more attention to union affairs and build the kind of leadership which will be equal to the tasks ahead.

JOURNALIST SUPPORTS SLIDING SCALE

YOUR last issue had a valuable article on the need to secure wage agreements that included a cost of living sliding scale and also an outright wage advance.

This is nothing impossible or Utopian. The printing unions, including the National Union of Journalists to which I belong, have recently won such an agreement with the provincial newspaper proprietors.

It obtained up to 12s, a week immediate increase and stipulated that there would be a further increase of 1s. a week for every point rise in the cost of living index above 120.

As a result we have since been paid an additional 13s. a week cost of living bonus.

The undesirable feature of the agreement was that—apart from cost-of-living bonuses — there was a stabilisation clause pre-cluding further wage advances for three years.

THE MISSING 100,000: LABOUR YOUTH TRIES AGAIN

"This Conference calls upon the N.E.C. to provide the money and facilities necessary to co-ordinate the League of Youth within the framework of the Party into an effective national body, with an upper age limit of 25, and with a democratic structure and an organising staff."

(Resolution of Scarborough Conference 1948.)

MANY people in the Labour Movement, both young and old, thought the Scarborough Conference would establish a fighting Socialist youth organisation.

Today, four years later, and on the eve of the League's Second National Conference, has that hope been realised?

National Consultative Committee of the League of Youth, then consisting in most cases of delegates selected and appointed by Regional Council of the Labour Party, set the League a target of 100,000 members to be enrolled by 1950! The beginnings of an organisation existed already in 1948 about 250 branches of a mainly social character, brought into activity by the adult party at election time to assist with the donkey

WHAT WAS PLANNED

Arrangements were made for a great membership drive—public meetings in selected areas, the sale of a special broadsheet, distribution of a pictorial recruiting leaflet and canvassing. A monthly

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journal named "Labour Youth" (later "Socialist Advance") was published (by kind permission of Fransport House) and a National Public Speaking Contest was organised to keep members organised occupied when not out canvassing -but free expression on Party policy was not encouraged!

No attempt was made to seek affiliations from Trade Union Young Workers' Committees direct to the League of Youth.

Nevertheless, a good number of members were recruited to the League from the Party and by local canvassing, and some branches were formed. Between 3,000 and 4,000 members attended Filey and a meeting was given over for a short time during the rally for these members to consider the N.C.C.'s report of their work during the past

This report was rejected quite decisively by those present, who the dissatisfaction which existed over the total lack of democracy in the organisation and the right of the League to run its own affairs.

DEMOCRATIC VICTORY

The N.E.C. were eventually forced to concede the insistent demand for a National Delegate Conference of the League of Youth, and this took place at Easter, 1951. In spite of the severe restrictions placed on the sending of resolutions and delegates to this conference, it was attended by 350 delegates and

Far from the National Status Campaign having had a "deleterious effect upon the development of the League of (Conference resolution Youth' from Beckenham), the N.C.C. reported that membership had increased to its highest figure, with 820 branches in November 1950, when the demand for autonomy had become the most important issue in the League.

N.E.C. EVASIONS

The League of Youth Conference this year should carefully examine the Report of the N.C.C. and relate it to the resolutions passed last year, and those remitted to the



Committee for further considera-

Of those passed, one calling for an Annual Delegate Conference of the L.O.Y. (previously endorsed by the N.C.C.) has been completely ignored by the N.E.C.

Similarly, no answer has been forthcoming to the demands for the right of Branches to send delegates and resolutions of their own choice without the veto of Constituency

A resolution establishing the ight of the League to discuss Labour Party policy at all levels of its organisation has not been implemented, nor has the constitutional right of the League to have representatives at the Annual Conference of the Labour Party.

has not even been discussed by the N.C.C. or the N.E.C.!

THE RESULT

N.C.C. report this year clearly indicates that as far as mem-bership is concerned, we are back where we were in 1949, with about 650 branches, and the decline took place during the last 12 months. A liberal estimate by Transport House of the actual membership is about 5,000—plus! This is indeed a striking indictment of the N.E.C.'s policy towards the League of "be-seen-and-not-heard", carried out vigorously during the past fou

Whilst the League may not be much larger, it has certainly learned bitter lessons and can stake its claim to be a serious and mature political youth organisation. This is a great credit to those who have stuck out for the right to manage their own affairs.

Now is certainly the time (as the N.C.C. says) to oppose the reactionary policy of the Tory Government and present the alternative of Socialism to British youth. But this cannot be done on the basis of "marking time" in the League and the Party, at a time when the standard of living is driven down and the lives of young people are being sacrificed in colonial wars.

Given freedom, the League of Youth can recruit thousands of young working people on the basis of a self-determined political youth policy in defence of wages, working conditions, education, etc. If the delegates to the next Conference realise this, then we can find the "missing 100,000" members and build a real and positive Labour League of Youth.

The Art of Taming Rebels

The Problems of a Left Wing delegate to Annual Conference

a previous article we stressed the necessity for local parties to formulate resolutions in line with the progressive decisions of Union Conferences. The A.E.U., for example, has gone on record for a number of progressive

If a Party has incorporated some of these demands in its Resolution, its delegates must approach the Union delegation and try to persuade the Union to propose the motion with the C.L.P. seconding it. This presents a strong front to the Conference and helps to forge unity between local parties and the

Delegates to Annual Conference should be chosen on the basis of political views. Conference should not be an occasion for giving agents a holiday. Once chosen, the delegate must be prepared to fight for his Party's resolution, and, believe me, it will be a fight from start to

COMPOSITING COMMITTEES

Groups of resolutions are always composited. The aim of the right wing is to take the sting out of political motions so that the press can record a victory for the "gentle Attlee" over the "fiery rebels".

Left wing delegates must get to the compositing committees at least twenty minutes before they begin so that they can meet other delegates. If possible, appointments should be fixed beforehand with other parties having similar motions on the Agenda.

Enter the Committees determined to preserve the main points of your

Many Constituency Labour Parties will be sending new delegates to the coming October Conference. What will these delegates be "up against"? What chance have they of influencing Conference decisions in accordance with the desires of their local parties?

Conference Agenda as it stands. AT THE CONFERENCE

Here in session is the Parliament of one of the greatest Labour Movements in the world. The general atmosphere is designed to quieten the timid rebel. alone doesn't work—there is always the booming voice of a Deakin or a Lawther. But delegates should pay no attention to this nonsense.

Conference is a place to fight for principles and not to worship at the shrine. Come to the Conference in company, if possible, with delegates of similar views and be prepared to fight.

The first item is always the Standing Orders Report: If you have to go before Standing Orders have to go before standing Committee, be ready to "get stuck in", especially if they are "gunning" for your motion. If they cannot for your motion. If they cannot reach agreement with you they will probably try to keep the item off the Agenda by stalling for time.

They give you the impression that it is coming up in order to break your resistance; then as time goes on and the established Agenda gets under way, they hope to push you off until it is too late. In off until it is too late. In experiences like this you badly need some union help. Hence the need for proper preparation politically and organisationally. You cannot beat the machine otherwise.

N.E.C. REPORT

The next important job is to take great notice of the N.E.C. Report. Your Party and Union delegation should have studied it in advance. Go through it section by section. The Chairman must give you the rostrum if you wish to move reference back or request points of clarification. Delegates should be on their toes all the time and follow the procedure of the chairman as he goes through the different sections.

One of the worst features of Conference is the presence of the capitalist press. The right wing always use this as a form of blackmail, injecting into Conference the feeling that the left wing cannot speak its mind openly.

The best way to handle the press is to have your speech written out beforehand. Avoid loose state-ments, and back your material with facts. Do not try to deal with too much at once—you won't have the

HOW TO "GET IN"

This is really very hard unless you happen to be Deakin or Sir Will Lawther. If you have a motion, you should try to get a definite understanding with the Standing Orders Committee in advance that you will be called. Have it noted on the list of composite resolutions if possible.

Otherwise, you take your chance on the floor. Wave your hand as much as possible, try every trick you know for catching the chairman's eye. On occasions it has come

At the Conference, try to contact as many left wing delegates as possible. Don't waste too much time on social functions. Remember the rank and file have sent you to represent them. Do the job seriously and return home with your report, conscious that you have done your best in the circumstances. That is all you can do.

Equal Pay - NOW:

THE House of Commons has passed a Labour motion instructing Ministers announce an early definite date by which the application of equal pay for equal work for women in the Civil Service, teaching profession, local government and other public services will begin."

We might have a mediating influence, w might have shown another line of advance for world development; we know what it should be, but in-stead we are committed, without reserve, to the American plan as

States, but how to work with her most effectively. (Page 5). Here is declaration that British Foreign Policy is essentially the same under a Labour Government as under a Tory Government. We are to be permanently allied with the central power of world capitalism and committed thereby to a policy of resist ance, based on armed might, to all countries antagonistic to capitalism.

This is not the policy of the Labour Movement of this country and it should not therefore be advocated in any publication issued by the Executive of our Party.

THE method of working with the United States is equally opposed to the principles of our party, see Page 8. "Providing the non-Stalinist world makes itself stronger than the Soviet Union and her satellites . . . the Cold War need never develop into a hot war."

Indeed! What is going on now in Korea, Indo-China and Malaya? Are these cold wars? Is China merely a satellite? This is a piece of un calculated to deceive us as to the forces we really have to consider.

But forget these considerations. and we are committed to a plan formulated by the American Government, supported by the Tory Party and Catholic reaction in Western Europe, and calculated to inflict on the U.S.S.R. the maximum of provocation without affording people of this country the slightest protection against the sort of horror evperienced by Japan in 1945 and in Korea today.



How long is our Socialist advance to be held up by armaments? How many other peoples are to be called "Communist bandits" and attacked because they revolt against their imperialist exploiters? Nobody knows, but what is certain is that World War 3 is not far away and that only a revolt of the Labour against capitalist mongering can save us.

The above sufficiently shows the dangerous implications contained in this, first policy pamphlet. These implications should be condemned by resolutions sent for the agenda of our next Annual Conference; they should go in from every party so that the opinion of our move-

Dockers Rescue Redundancy victim

SAM BROAD, a young married docker, was alleged to have moved about in the hiring pen with the intention of evading selection for work.

On this charge and solely on the word of Mr. Denton, an under-manager of the National Dock Labour Board on Merseyside, Sam Broad was dismissed from the Scheme without the opportunity of calling any witnesses in his defence ses who could have proved that hiring of labour for that morning had finished, that the men were waiting for attendance stamps on their employment books, and that Broad was making his way to the toilet, for a legitimate purpose!

The reaction of the rank and file was so violent that within 24 hours of his dismissal this man was given an appeal board.

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Labour Councils Must Fight All Cuts

FOLLOWING the County elections, the Borough and Rural Council elections have further strengthened the tide of opposition to the Tory Government. Throughout the British Isles, Labour has gained control of many councils, in some cases, for the first time in history.

These victories are an expression of the hatred that millions of people feel for this bankrupt Tory gang that obtained office by lies, deceit and cunning. Not only did Labour voters come out in increased numbers but, in many cases, Tory voters were demoralised or (as in the Home Counties) middle class voters swung back to Labour.

Labour Party members welcome these victories but we know that unless they are consolidated all that was gained this year can be lost again next year. A tremendous responsibility now rests on these Labour-controlled councils.

The Labour Party has given its policy on local affairs in the municipal elections. In some towns, such as Birmingham, the rank and file itself formulated election policy at a special conference prior to the local elections.

If we boldly carry out our election pledges, without equivocation or compromise, if we demonstrate that Labour councils will fight the Tory Government tooth and nail if it dares to further curtail local expenditure for its rabid re-armament plans, we shall consolidate Labour's election victories and give a lead to thousands of workers struggling against Tory mis-rule.

"There is no time like the present" an old, but worthy, adage. Labour Councils must immediately rescind all fines and punishments that were placed on firemen in recent months. They must begin their own direct labour house-building schemes. Labour must (as passed Birmingham municipal conference), expose the monopoly prices in building materials and transport that contribute so much to high costs.

Labour Councils must refuse to raise rents of municipal houses merely because the Tory Government has increased the bank rate.

On the contrary, we must make NATIONAL SCANDAL out of the fact that the bankers, financiers and monopoly capitalists, virtually hold entire cities to ransom by means of loan charges and astronomical profits on building materials. All this, and the fact that, under the 1929 De-Rating act, capitalists pay only one quarter of the rates of domestic householders, should be exposed. Then the people will see that lower rents and lower living costs can only be brought about by capitalism. smashing

We must refuse to cut education and, where in power, must revert back to the previous expenditure, re-opening nursery schools and revoking all the Tory cuts.

If Labour fearlessly carries out its policies on the Councils and bodly stands up to the Tory Government on national policies, not only will all our seats be retained and new ones gained but the days of this Rich Man's Government will rapidly draw to a close.

London Trades Council victim of witch-hunt

GLASGOW Trades Council was disbanded for its alleged "red" bias. Now it is the turn of London.

The excuse in Glasgow was that two resolutions passed by the Trades Council did not accord with the policy of the Scottish T.U.C. But this was only an excuse—not the real reason.

For a considerable time the Glasgow Trades Council back a left wing majority despite a baiting" by the right wing.

In London, not even the shadow of an excuse exists. The T.U.C. have acted in defiance of rules and elementary democracy. Sir Vincent Tewson's letter to the London Trades Council states that a "recommendation" has been made by the Trades Councils Joint Consultative Committee not to register the London Trades Council for 1952. Before this recommendation has even been adopted he (Sir Vincent) has cut off all "normal facilities and services to your council"!

Sir Vincent gives as the reasons "Substantial withdrawals of organisations from your council' and "the Committee were generally of opinion that the nature of the warning had not been adequately observed" (a warning given in 1950 but never subsequently renewed).

EXECUTED BEFORE SENTENCE!

No charges, detailed or otherhave been made to the Trades Council-nor was any doubt suggested about its 1952 registra-Behind locked doors it was tried and sentenced in its absence. Moreover, the sentence has been carried out before the condemnation has been pronounced!

In the document submitted to the T.C.J.C.C., on which it came to a decision, are stated the alleged reasons why certain unions broke away from the L.T.C. These are, word for word, the same as statements made to the London evening press by anonymous spokesmen for those unions (T. & G.W.U., M. & G.W.U.). After considering this document, the T.C.J.C.C. recomends that these unions should be called to a meeting in order to ascertain the reasons for their disaffiliation!

It is very reminiscent of Lewis Carrell's "Through the Looking Glass" where, in the Trial Scene, they have the execution first, then the sentence, next the verdict and finally the accusation !!!

I am sure that all readers will wish to join with the delegates to the London Trades Council and support the resolution (carried by over half-a-million votes to none!). It states:-

- 1. That we continue to press for re-registration.
- We ask the T.C.J.C.C. and the General Council to réceive a deputation.
- That the London Trades Council be informed of the detailed charges made against it.
- That the London Trades Council be permitted to answer the charges and make a defence.
- That the General Council be asked not to endorse the T.C.J.C.C. recommendation until specific charges against the London Trades Council have been made and the Council given an opportunity of making a defence
- 6. That a statement be circulated to all delegates and affiliated organisations.

Assailed for years as "boches" and "militarists", the subject of a dreadful hate-campaign in which into tried to satisfie crimes of Hitler, their chief tormentor and persecutor, the German workers are now seen to be in the front line of the fight for peace and

Having precious little to thank any of the Great Powers for, their country divided and occupied by foreign troops, they have braved the bullets of the police to make known to the workers of other countries their undying hatred of war and re-armament. What a lesson for us in international socialist acitivity!

If we in the British Labour Party heed this call, if we recognise that the German workers are our allies in the fight for peace—just as the German fascists and capitalists are Churchill's allies in the fight for war!-then we shall be able to frustrate all the carefully-laid plans of the imperialists and save Europe from once more suffering the agonies of war.

What Can We Do?

The German Social Democratic despite its leaders—has been forced by the workers to oppose re-armament, They have demanded new elections in Western Germany before any "contractual agree-ments" with the Western Powers are signed.

When the demand was raised in our own Parliament by Labour M.P.s they received the following reply from Mr. Anthony Eden: "This proposal seems to me to be an unusual and improper interference in the internal affairs of another country."

Here is a man—a "gentleman" to boot!—who has been a willing party to carving-up the living body of the German nation, who supports the continued occupation of a divided Germany, who insists that the discredited Herr Adenauer be empowered to commit the whole German people to re-armament and a German 'Korea', calmly declaring —in the most cultured accents, of course—that it would be an "improper interference" in the internal affairs of Germany to allow the German people themselves to decide for or against re-armament! Old-school-tie hypocrisy can surely go no further!

What They Fear

The real reason why neither Eden, nor Churchill, nor Truman, nor Adenauer will consent to an immediate German election is because they know only too well that it would result in the downfall of Adenauer and the election of a Government which could not and dare not—be a party to the Bonn treaty on German re-armament.

So much for the Tories, foreign affairs, as at home, they serve faithfully the interests of capitalism and its plans for another world war. But what of Labour?

Did they fight tooth and nail this evil plan to re-arm the German fascists? Did they expose the diabolical plans of the Churchill-Truman axis? Did they declare

their support for the struggle of our German comrades against Herr Adenauer and pledge their support in any extension of the anti-war fight? They should have done-but they didn't.

'We Don't Insist'

True enough, the N.E.C. recently adopted a resolution which declared in favour of "no re-armament before elections." But when the subject was debated in the House of Commons, Mr. Attlee revealed just how much that resolution was worth. Elections first? Here is what he said: "I am not suggesting that we should insist on them. . ."!

So we pass resolutions-but we don't insist on them! We try and satisfy our rank and file who are against German re-armament-but you mustn't take us too seriously!

He went on . . . "I do not for a moment suggest that we can do it that is, hold elections) . . let us make no mistake about it, I want these preparations (for German re-armament) TO GO RIGHT AHEAD" (our emphasis) (Hansard, Vol. 500, 1485).

In short, Mr. Attlee-despite some protests from back-bench M.P.s. like 3. O. Davies has told the pass on German re-armament. But we shouldn't really be sur-prised. After all, the same Mr. Attlee wrote this in the London Star on Friday, May 23rd:-

"I recall another amusing incident of those days. I and some of my colleagues were guests at a dinner of the American Ambassador . . . (who) . . . asked whether any of us had ever done any big game shooting . . . I said 'Yes' . . . He said 'What were you shooting?' I said 'Germans'.'

And this is he they call "the gentle Attlee"!

Our Plain Duty

But just as our German comrades have forced Schumacher to oppose Adenauer, so the rank and file of the Labour must, and can, force Attlee to oppose Churchill.

The Russians have made proposals for all-German elections to establish a Government of a reunited Germany with which the Powers can sign a Peace Treaty. They have further proposed that such a German Government should dispose of its own armed forces and decide its own foreign policy.

These proposals will be supported by the great majority of the German people—despite the fact that Russia herself has largely lost their support by its past actions in occupying and dividing Germany in complete disregard of the legitimate national aspirations of the German people. British Labour must support the proposals also.

We must refuse to allow the British Parliament to ratify the Bonn Agreement; we must demand the peaceful unification of Germany; we must declare our solid-arity with the German Labour Movement and demonstrate our confidence in them to solve the German problem in a socialist manner. They will not fail us. Withdraw the troops! Let the German people decide!
