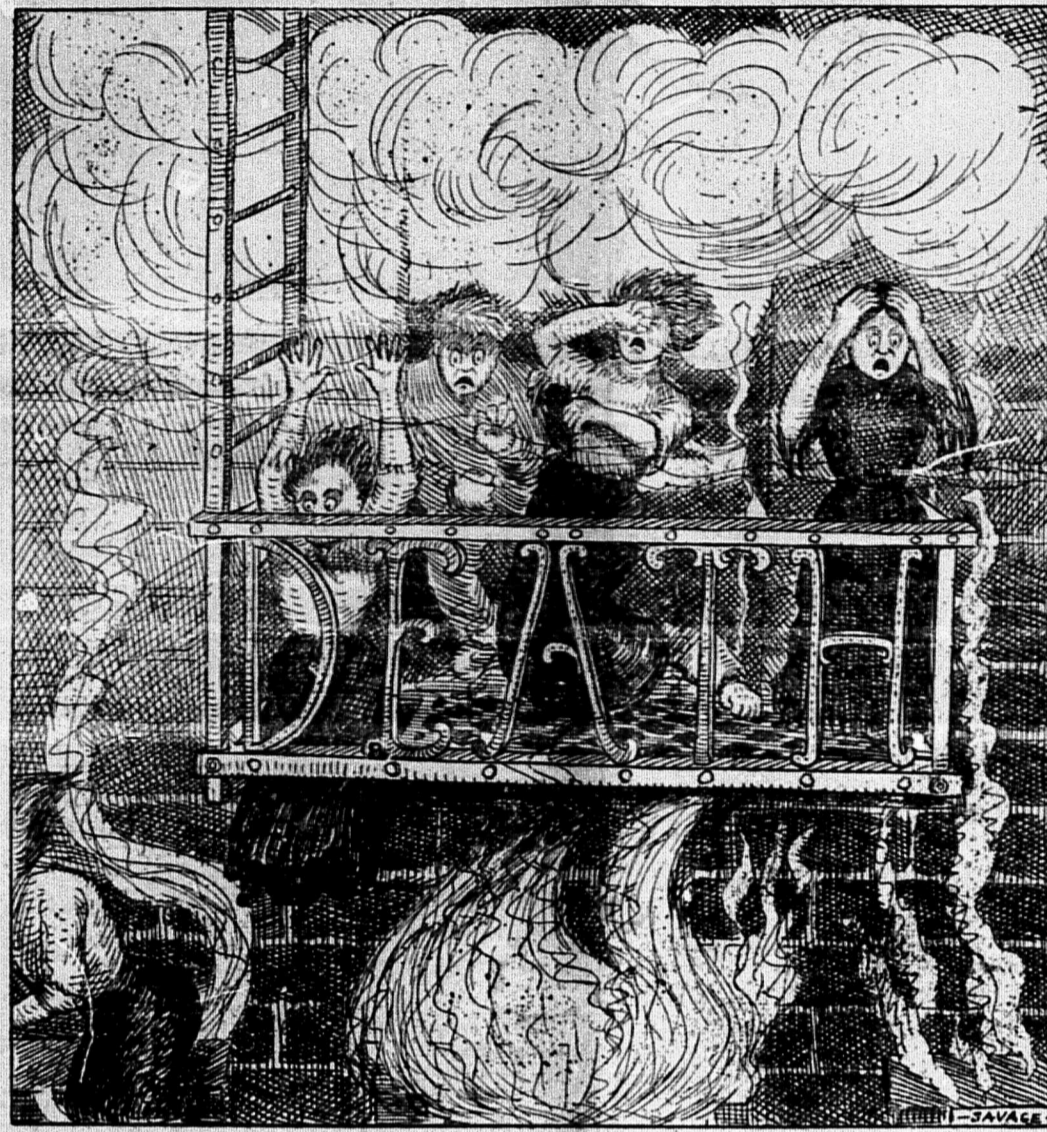

Washington, D. C., May 2.—With hundreds of war-casualty veterans and the diplomatic and military representatives of foreign nations as guests of honor, the government this afternoon unveiled the magnificent equestrian statue of Maj. Gen. George B. McClellan, the great army organizer of the Civil War.

BOSTON WORKERS HOLD DEFENCE MEETING. Boston, May 3.—President Roosevelt and Secretary Taft were denounced and hissed last night at a big meeting of Boston workers.

BOTTLE TELLS OF WRECK. Harbor Beach, Mich., May 3.—Captain J. G. Klah, superintendent of the life-saving station, has received a note, enclosed in a bottle, found on the beach near Lexington, and which explains the fate of the life-boat "Searchlight."

MINERS' LAWYER ANSWERS PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT—SCENES IN IDAHO JAIL. Boise, Idaho, May 3.—Through Clarence S. Darrow, their counsel, the imprisoned leaders of the Western Federation of Miners, Haywood, Moyer and Pettibone, charged with complicity in the murder of former Governor Steuneger, issued a formal statement which bristles with bitter denunciation of President Roosevelt as well as of the press of Idaho and the state officials.

Parallel for Roosevelt. "On the appearance of this man in court the judge promptly told the state's attorney that he should have this obscure farmer indicted for felony because he tried to influence the mind of a prospective juror. The president knows how much greater weight will be given to his words than those of an obscure private citizen."

Embittered. "We have been confined in jail for fourteen months against our protest and denied bail while our country was in a state of anarchy. We have been made to teach the farmers, business men and workmen of the community that we are assassins and outlaws."

NEWS FOR UNIONISTS. unemployed laborers may be given work on the streets. Cap Makers' International Union concluded its annual convention in New York yesterday.

Atlanta, Ga., street car conductors and motormen seem to have failed in another attempt to organize. Practically all of fifteen men who met recently and decided to apply for a charter from the American Federation of Labor, were discharged.

Cleveland, Ohio, machinists expect to ask for a nine-hour day June 1. Lumber workers in Missoula, Ravalli, Sanders and Granite counties, Montana, are on strike for higher wages.

NEW RAILROAD TO SIBERIA. St. Petersburg, May 3.—Russia's transportation facilities to her possessions in the far east will never be drawn to her again, that they were during the Japanese war, when the plans adopted today by the council of ministers have been carried into effect. It was decided to build the long talked second Siberian Railway. It is now proposed to begin work immediately.

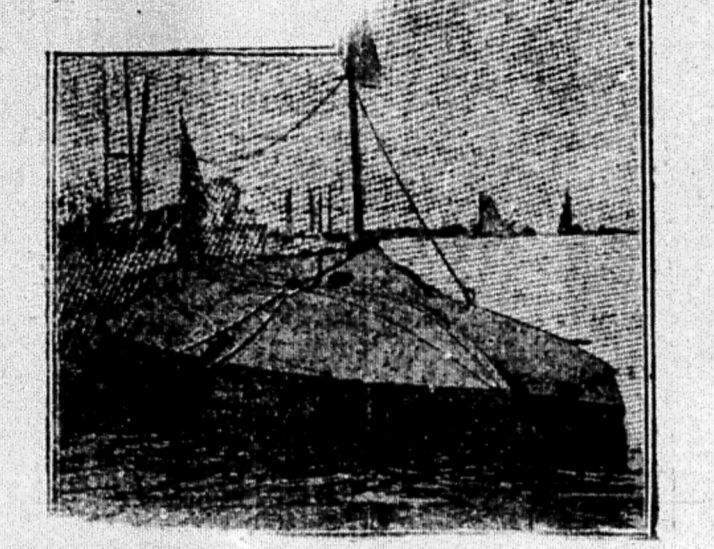
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WILL SPEND \$3,000,000 FOR SUBMARINE SLAYERS

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UNION PRINTERS HELD AS SLAVES IN TURPENTINE CAMP

Their Story of Oppression Startling--Beaten Starved and Overworked Under Semblance of Law

Mobile, Ala., May 3.—Edward Bradford and Frederick Thayer, two members of the International Typographical Union, who had worked in the newspaper offices of New York City and of Southern towns, were in this city last long ago to appear before the United States grand jury, then in session, to support charges of wrongful conviction, peonage, cruelty, withholding and opening registered mail, and other counts that they made on behalf of themselves and seventeen other union workmen.

Their charges were directed against the sheriff of Escambia County, Alabama, and C. C. Greer, son & Co., turpentine distillers at Mortimer, Ala. The story of Bradford and Thayer, who are men of considerable intelligence, is in brief as follows.

Both men had been working in New Orleans, and when work grew slack they came to this city. They could get no work here, and with the intention of going north, they boarded a Louisville & Nashville freight train, having secured permission from the crew to occupy one of the empty cars.

While the freight train was on a side track at Plomaton, sixty miles north of Mobile, they were arrested by Deputy Sheriff Webster and three other men at the point, a gun on a charge of trespassing on railroad property. They were taken to the Escambia County Jail at Brewton, where they were held eight days without trial.

Finally when the filthy hole of a prison became filled with prisoners, black and white, they were brought on March 22 before Judge Proctor, a justice of the peace, to plead guilty or not guilty to the charges preferred against them.

A deputy sheriff had previously advised them to plead guilty and pay the fine, which he said was light, as they would thus escape another thirty days in jail awaiting trial.
