JAPS READY FOR INVASION

Mexico Alive With Oriental Soldiers Armed and Ready for War, Says Editor

(By United Press Associations.) Bangor, Me., Sept. 10.—Thousands of Japanese veterans are in the Mexican states bordering the United States, equipped with arms and secretly organized in readiness to gather and invade this country on short notice.

This startling statement is made by F. H. Guernsey, editor of the Mexican Herald of the City of Mexico, who is spending his summer in Maine.

According to Guernsey, Mexico's liberal immigration policy has enabled the Japanese to flock to that country in large numbers. An effort has been made apparently to settle veterans of the late war in the northern part of the country.

In Sonora alone, he says, there are more than 1,000, divided into groups, each with a superior officer in command.

In some central Mexican cities there are now two Japanese generals, experienced and able to lead an invasion should war between this country and Japan make it desirable.

"The Japanese are there," says Guernsey, "ostensibly as laborers. But it is notorious that when they arrived, under contract to work in the coal mines of southern Mexico, they have promptly deserted under one pretext or another."

GAME FOR \$150,000,000; ALDERMEN ARE APPALLED

Traction and Telephone Franchise Discussion Ignores Workers; the Men Who Run Institutions and Those Who Use Them

The city council met last night and decided to take up the telephone and traction ordinances at a special meeting next Thursday afternoon.

Tens of thousands of working men and women and children this morning stood up in dirty, ancient cars, crowded like cattle on a traction system that breaks the world's record for ineffectiveness.

The two franchises are worth \$120,000,000 in profit, and "times are good." If the traction gang does not get together and settle its internal quarrels by Thursday morning, well, the city council may give the gang more time to quarrel and more time for the silent thousands to hang to straps.

In one of the largest cities in the world, with the great "Association of Commerce" boasting and talking about its greatness, the people are away behind the rural communities in point of car service.

Stragglers are beginning to understand that the "business men" are not "efficient."

The city has been ruled since it began by the "business element" and it has become more ineffectual, its affairs in a more tangled shape and the working class, inactive, more and more ignored.

The traction and telephone situation has developed warfare between the "business men" who got together and with their newspapers fooled the people again at the last election.

If the lid ever is lifted and the inside workings of the deals now under way shown, Chicago will have "Trisco and St. Louis" beaten on the graft record. That the quarrels between the capitalists will result in graft exposure now seems certain.

As in the campaign for the franchise at the last election the quarrels now in no way regard the thousands of men who really run the cars.

They are ignored by courts, aldermen, mayor and the capitalist newspapers.

The same crowd that put the city in its present traction mess is "boosting the charter."

Whatever the city council does or whatever new decision the federal courts may "hand down," one fact stands out clearly today—the mass must continue to be provided like cattle and forced to hang to straps for two or three years.

After that time there may be a few new cars and other improvements, but the mass will be handled simply to make profit for J. P. Morgan and the capulet field estate.
