MEASURE GIRLS FOR U. S. SERVICE

New York, Sept. 13.—Through the efforts of William J. Flynn, local head of the secret service, an end has been put to a case which threatened to involve the good name of one of the best known families in Manhattan. Some time ago an advertisement appeared in several newspapers under the name of "Capt. Marshall, United States Secret Service Officer," calling for "attractive young women, physically perfect, to become experts in the United States secret service. The applicants were requested to call at the Marlborough hotel. Many young women, mostly in their teens, answered the advertisement. When they met the "captain" at the hotel they were shown into a private room, questioned, and then each applicant was told she would have to submit to a physical examination in order that her measurements might be filed with the War Department...

GIRL AIDS POLICE

The man who posed as "Capt. Marshall" is tall, of distinguished appearance, with wavy hair, and a well-cut beard. He is well known to hotel detectives in this city, but not as Marshall. One girl from the west, who was at the time staying at a hotel, told the police that she had seen "the captain" but had refused to undergo the physical examination. This lady became suspicious after she read the story and wrote to Flynn. Flynn was told to look into the case and paid a visit to the boarding house. After some persuasion Flynn got the girl's consent to go further with the case should she hear more from the "captain." The girl soon received a letter from "Marshall," asking her to allow him to call. The girl communicated with Flynn and he was hidden behind the piano in the parlor on the night that "Marshall" called. The girl submitted to his examination and carried on a conversation with her caller, who insisted on holding her hand and creating her until Flynn showed himself and took the man downtown to await the arrival of one of the United States district attorneys.

OF GOOD FAMILY

"Marshall" was able quickly to establish his identity. He is a member of one of the best known families in the city and is well known as an artist of ability. He is married and has two children. His explanation was that he was merely out for a frolic and adventure. "Marshall's" social and business standing were such as to convince Flynn that he was not a swindler, but a moral delinquent, and it was a question whether any law had actually been violated. It was determined, however, to punish him. His wife's brother, and all his male relatives in town, were summoned to the United States district attorney's office and in their presence the man was made to tell his story. His wife was not told of that chapter of his life which comes under the heading of "Capt. Marshall."

JAILERS NOW ARE ORGANIZED

(Mail Correspondence.)
Lexington, Ky., Sept. 11.—Come to Kentucky for unique things. The state now has a jailers' association, which was formed here with eighty-one members.

The association is to be known as the Kentucky Jailers' association, and will lead its influence toward having laws regulating jails, and matters in which jailers are concerned. One of these is to have electrocution substituted for hanging, another to define the duties of the jailer as to the county courthouse, of which he is now made custodian, and from whom this responsibility has been assumed by the fiscal courts in some places, and to regular fees making the jail self-sustaining.

The organization has nothing to do with the commercial aspects of jailing nor the science of making money out of jails, as practiced and brought to such a fine art in Chicago. If it has the association has not said anything about it.

CARMEN HEAR REPORTS; ALL DELEGATES ON DUTY!

The carmen began the third day of their convention today. The rights of Chicago failed to keep the delegates from their duty, and when the seas opened almost the entire 250 craftsmen were on hand.

This should be an indication of how these same men would work should they be sent to congress, instead of sending their bosses, Chauncey Depew or Clark, or others of the same kind.

The convention is getting down to work and much business is expected to be transacted and the organization put on a firmer foundation than ever before.

The women who came with their husbands are busy in State street. Even the wife of a union man, one devoted to the improvement of the working class, cannot entirely give up the delights offered by the great merchandise emporiums in State street.

The one subject discussed last night by delegates to the convention was the opening address of Grand Chief Carman Frank L. Henneaux of Kansas City, Mo.

The Chicago Daily Socialist secured a typewritten transcript of the address this morning, a condensation of which is published in this issue. The complete report consists of more than 15,000 words, which it would have been utterly impossible to put in type in time for today's paper. The full address may be printed in a future issue.

In opening his report, the executive said:

"I appreciate sincerely the compliments bestowed by kind Providence in permitting this auspicious gathering of the representatives of our brotherhood and trust that on the part of each the spirit of our motto—friendship, unity and true brotherly love—is recognized as the occupant of an unseen seat and a silent listener to every discussion that will be indulged in from time to time.

"The biennial period just closed has in several respects been the most remarkable in our history, which brotherhood has passed since its history began. Remarkable in that the increase in membership has been greater than during any other two years.

"I have reason to believe that the advocacy of a policy tending toward employment of arbitration, mediation and conciliation as was pledged by this brotherhood by the adoption of a resolution has been of great benefit during the last two years.

"The period just closed has been one of continued activity in the performance of their duties of each one of the grand lodge officers and organizers. Without almost superhuman exertion on their part the results attained would not be favorable at this time. For this spirit of self-sacrifice, the grand chief carmen are due and are herewith expressed, perhaps not as elaborately as they should be, but nevertheless with sincere appreciation.

"In several instances our properly

constituted boards, who for the first time made a request on officials, even when such were well known and of good intentions, have been rudely ignored with the reply that 'No dictation by any committee of employees would be granted.'

"On several occasions it became necessary to employ an attitude that would leave no doubts in the minds of any one interested that the carmen of the system felt positive of certain rights that they had right to have respected. I am glad to announce that all such instances resulted to the honor of the B. R. C. of A.

"Reference to suspension of work to enforce demands on the Louisiana lines of the Southern Pacific Railroad July 1 at New Orleans, which terminated successfully for the union, the grand chief carman said:

SOLIDARITY.

"Our brothers were supported by public opinion as well as by other grand lodge officers. The address of this report is on the subject of 'Solidarity' and a stricter adherence to the constitution.

"A minute report of the expulsion of a lodge at Marshalltown, Iowa, was made by the grand chief carman, declaring that no other course could have been taken in conformity with the laws and constitution of the order.

"Considerable credit was given the grand executive board for the business-like manner in which its duties had been performed during the past two years. Commenting upon other officers the grand chief carman said:

LOTS OF WORK.

"The volume of business in the office of the grand secretary-treasurer has constantly increased during the past two years and that in the face of the editor and manager of the Journal and without almost superhuman exertion on the part of these two officers there would have been many failures of apparent respect of the order.

"Those lodges not yet having formed joint protective boards were urged to do so and by such action relieve the grand lodge officers of work which could be satisfactorily conducted by local officials.

"A more ready response to communications from other lodges was urged in the recommendations and also the submission of reports to the grand lodge for that of 'limited withdrawal card,' as at present employed.

"The 'piece work' system prevails to a great extent on many railroads employing carmen and organizers. The grand chief carman recommended that a policy tending to harmonize the ideas of employer and employee be approved. The piece work system is established by rule and is not satisfactory to both the men and the companies, while other members of the brotherhood are strenuously opposed to the system.

STRIKE BENEFITS.

Strike benefits to be disbursed after one month's cessation of work were recommended by the grand lodge officers. It was advised that this fund be secured by assessments not to exceed 25 cents per member per month.

In addition of \$1 of the membership fee and \$1 of the reinstatement fee is recommended for the fund.

"Healthy agitation in favor of such co-operation with one another of all railroad organizations as have, or hereafter shall establish a reputation for conservative advancement" was also advised.

Referring to the Mutual Aid association, the speaker drew attention to the fact that the auxiliary was not conducted for mutual benefit, but against making membership in the association obligatory on all members of the brotherhood.

To the "Loyal Star," the women's auxiliary of the Brotherhood of America, the grand chief carman paid a sincere tribute and every encouragement the convention could consistently confer.

SUFFER FOR UNION.

Once more referring to the splendid support of the grand lodge officers, the speaker said:

"I know as perhaps none other than themselves know the hardships the grand lodge officers have been subjected to. I also know of the meager salaries with which each has been compensated, and while I would not forget the necessity to conduct the affairs of the brotherhood with the utmost economy, having personally in years gone by when the work was scarce a ray of hope for the final success of our order, even suffered hunger because of a lack of the wherewithal to procure the necessities of life, all because of a determination to make the brotherhood a success. I can most conscientiously recommend an increase in the salaries of those who devote their lives in sacrifice to the hardships encountered.

THE CUSTODIANS.

The delegates, who are the custodians of the brotherhood collectively, it is a brotherhood possessing power that has been created by fidelity to truth. It is pure in character. It is splendid in its record. Its record in overcoming obstacles encountered in its progress, unexcelled by any association in the world. Even greater possibilities lie before it and other obstacles will be overcome. Brothers, meet them bravely, fearlessly, conscientiously.

"I bid you all to be ever loyal and true to the brotherhood and its sincere aims."
