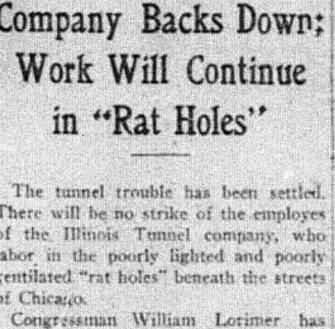

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BURSTING OF A FLYWHEEL KILLS

Two Dead and Many Injured in Wrecked Suburban Plant

The bursting of a flywheel at the power house of the North Shore Electric company in Waukegan last night caused the death of two men and the injury of several others.

The accident was caused by the bursting of a belt which in slipping from a power wheel allowed the flywheel to race and burst from centrifugal force. The pieces of the huge wheel shattered the building, which is valued at \$125,000, and killed and injured.

The dead and injured JENSEN, J. H., manager of the telephone exchange at Waukegan, hit by piece of wheel; died at hospital an hour later.

The injured KACIN, instructor for Waukegan Electric Light company, scalp wound and bruised.

The destroyed electric plant furnished light for Waukegan and other north shore towns.

When the great wheel flew from its fastenings and crashed through a solid brick wall the noise awakened hundreds of people who thought an explosion had occurred.

At the Hotel Edmund, where a hole was ripped in the roof and plaster knocked from the walls amid the splintering of window glass, nearly 100 guests were badly frightened and a stampede was narrowly averted.

The other buildings damaged were the old armory structure and the building of the Waukegan Joe company. A piece of the wheel weighing more than a ton crashed through the brick wall of the latter, which is more than a block away from the lighting plant.
