GRAND PROFITS WHILE MEN DIE

70 Chicago Workers Killed; 275 Crippled by Their Employers' Neglect

To keep dividends flowing into the hands of the stockholders and to pay the cost of maintaining a lobby at the legislatures, where representatives must be paid to prevent employment protection laws from being passed, the first six months of 1906 took seventy lives of Chicago workers and 275 more were disabled for thirty days or more.

As usual, the railroads, the most strenuous fighters against all laws which would tend to protect the lives of their employees and the very worst economizers, come first in the list.

Suffer Terrible Deaths.

An idea of the awful peril that railroad and factory employees are constantly subjected to while at work may be had from reading the list and noting the cause of the accident. Some of the causes were:

"Struck by train," "Fall under cars," "Asphyxiated on top of blast furnace," "Crushed between cars," "Explosion," "Struck by falling iron," "Clothes caught in shafting," "Struck by low bridge," etc.

FIND SERUM TO CURE PHTHISIS

New York, Sept. 8.—Tests are being made in New York city of a new serum treatment for tuberculosis, the invention of Dr. J. Gabrielowitch, director of the Imperial Russian sanitarium for tuberculosis, at Hallia, Finland.
