

SOCIALISTS GAIN IN TWO STATES

Tribune and Inter-Ocean Men Tell of Conditions in Ohio and Indiana

The staff correspondents of Chicago newspapers continue to forecast a big vote for Eugene V. Debs next Tuesday week.

Raymond of the Tribune, writing from Cleveland concerning conditions in northern Ohio, says: "There is evidence of a heavily increased vote for Debs, particularly in Cleveland."

Drovers Will Vote for Debs "They form a dissatisfied and radical class. They cannot be appealed to by the argument that if Taft is beaten it will mean a reduction of the chances of labor because they are already out of work."

Big Vote in Indiana Charles N. Wheeler of the Inter Ocean, writing from Indianapolis concerning the situation in Indiana, says: "The best judgment that can be formed of this very much muddled situation among the labor voters of Indiana is that Eugene V. Debs is going to get a surprisingly large vote."

9,923 DRINK CAUSE OF PUPILS' HUNGER

GOYTHAM TAILORS HIT AT GOMPERS Largest Local of That Union in United States Comes Out for Socialism

(SPECIAL TO THE DAILY SOCIALIST.) New York, Oct. 21.—Local No. 230 of the Journeymen Tailors' Union of America with nearly 1,000 members, the largest local of the tailors' organization, cannot see that the Democrats have offered anything to the working class, and dispute the views taken by President Gompers. This local has declared for Socialism.

Text of Local's Letter For the October issue of the Tailor, the official organ of the tailors' organization, published at Bloomington, Ill., New York local has sent a letter that reads in part as follows: "Moyer and Haywood were tried by juries, but they were kept eighteen months in jail before their case came to trial. Suppose a strike occurs and the leaders are enjoined from speaking, picketing, or even advising men to go on strike. Suppose they disobey the injunction, and to break strikes, are held for contempt. Can they be kept in jail until the strike is lost?"

Nothing From Democrats "The Democrats have given you nothing. They have been only a little more honest than the Republicans. That is all. The Republicans adopted the injunction plank which promises to legalize the injunction. The Democrats adopted an anti-injunction plank which promises to try you by jury in case you offend the autocratic ruling of a judge by exercising your constitutional rights."

Governors Use Militia "You have seen Republican and Democratic governors order out the militia to shoot down workmen at the behest of their capitalist masters. Governor Comer, a Democrat, ordered out the troops in the Alabama miners' strike. You have seen a Democratic president send the Federal troops to break the Pullman strike."
