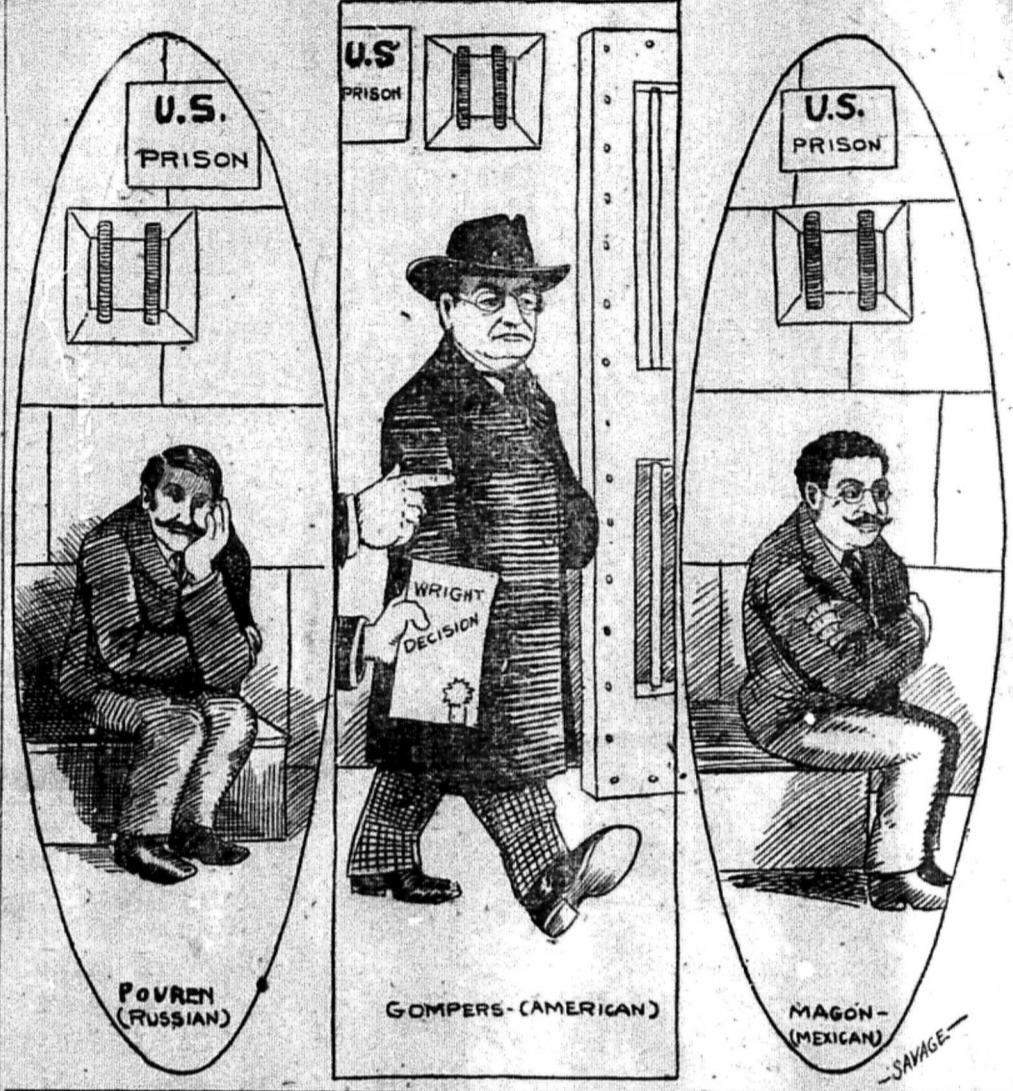

Secretary of State Elihu Root has set Christian Ansoff Rudowitz free, according to dispatches from Washington. The long fight begun by the Daily Socialist in Chicago has been won.

The decision of United States Commissioner Mark A. Foote has been reversed and the state department, following the representations made from time to time in this paper, has declared that the offense for which Christian Ansoff Rudowitz was wanted by the czar was a political offense and that this country was not giving up political offenders to foreign governments—not yet.

'I Am Glad,' Says Foote

"I am the happiest man in America at the outcome of the case," said United States Commissioner Mark A. Foote, when told by the Daily Socialist that he had lost in the matter and that his decision had been reversed.

ATTORNEY RIGBY 'SURPRISED'

Attorney Rigby, who represented Russia, declared that he was surprised at the decision of the secretary of state. This is not the first time that Attorney Rigby, who is himself an American, has been more or less surprised throughout the course of the trial.

JURAW IS A MARTYR

Following him on the stand came Martin Juraw, the hero of the trial, the man who declared on the witness stand that rather than give up the names of his comrades in Russia he would go to the gallows.

Dr. Charles Cheney Hyde declared that the decision was a vindication of the American spirit. "This decision shows that law and justice still live in America," said Dr. Hyde.

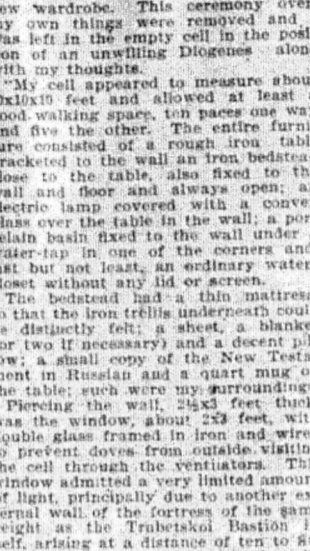
