FREE LOVER LIE FREELY EXPOSED

Antiquated Falsehood Gets Shown Up in a German Editor's Case

(SPECIAL TO THE DAILY SOCIALIST.)
Scafield, Germany, March 4.—The antiquated lie, still accepted by a few purile and prurient intellects, that all Socialists are "free lovers" has just received a knockout blow here.

The tag of falsification this time has the mark "court record" written on it, and the editor of the "Kreislblatt," a clerical organ has been sentenced to a heavy fine for libel and court costs for spreading the slander abroad through Thuringia.

Specific Case of Editor?

The specific case upon which the editor of the "Kreislblatt" seized as proving that all Socialists were free lovers was that of one Heinrich Becker, whom the editor accused of leaving his wife and children in want while he went to Dortmund and lived there with another woman in plenty. The "Kreislblatt," with all the papers of Thuringia following in lead, declared that Becker was one of the editors of the Social-Democratic organ, the "Volksblatt."

This latter statement was pure imagination on the part of the clerical editor, as Becker had never been connected with the "Socialist sheet" in any way. Hofmann, editor of the "Volksblatt," promptly brought suit against the responsible parties for libel.

In the course of the trial the "Kreislblatt" people made desperate attempts to infect the free love business into the trial.

Showed Ignorance of Socialism

They showed their complete ignorance of the meaning of Socialism at every turn and were utterly dumfounded when the attorneys for Hofmann began their cross-questioning in such a manner as to show up that ignorance. Hofmann declared that the man Becker was known to him, not as a Socialist, but as a member of the Central party, the clerical party itself, that he had always regarded Becker as a good churchman and very bad timber for Socialism. Becker had at one time worked as a gardener for Hofmann, and it was on this thin thread that the free love charges were sprung by the clerical papers.

WOMAN ENDS LIFE RATHER THAN PART WITH PET DOG

New York, March 4.—Fearful she might be separated from her little dog Prince, on whose account she had been ordered to move from her flat at 48 Manhattan street, Mrs. Lillian Hagl attached a tube to the gas range in her kitchen yesterday and, placing the other end in her mouth, laid down on a lounge and was later found dead by a boarder, Martin Boland.

TAFT TO WEAR TROUSERS GIVEN HIM BY THE TEXANS

Washington, D. C., March 4.—Mr. Taft's new trousers are finished. Spick and span, nicely creased, and fit for a Fifth Avenue swell, the nether garment which the president-elect's admirers in Texas have insisted on having made for him out of Angora goat mohair are ready for delivery.

A Washington tailor who was given the contract of turning out the trousers from cloth which was made from the famous wool will deliver the results of his handiwork to Cecil Lyon, national committeeman from Texas, who will proceed forthwith to Mr. Taft with the offering, which the latter already has promised shall figure as a portion of his inauguration day costume.

It will be recalled that Texans sent a huge pair of trousers to the Republican national convention for presentation to Mr. Taft when he was nominated. These are not the same trousers. Somebody had to make further demands on the famous goat, who, owing to lapse of time, was able to accommodate the shearer.

PRIMARY HITS "UPLIFT" MOVES

Springfield, Ill., March 4.—Keep away from nonpolitical primaries in municipal elections or sacrifice your right to participate in your own party affairs. This is the ruling laid down by Attorney General Stead yesterday in interpreting the provisions of the Ogleby primary act. It is declared that the opinion will put an end to "uplift" movements.

"If a Republican voter leaves his political party and votes with the Citizen's party—another political party under the statute—he has chosen the political party with which he desires to affiliate, and is bound for a period of two years by that choice," says the attorney general.

This ruling is a jolt to citizens in nearly every municipality of Illinois, outside of the larger cities. In practically all of these places it has been the custom for years to abandon party policies in municipal campaigns, which are waged along logical issues exclusively.

WITH THE ARMY OF OUT-OF-WORK

Progress of Industrial Depression Abroad Shown by Daily's Dispatches.

Le Mans, France, March 4.—Three hundred workmen have been thrown out of employment here by the closing down of the wagon factories, which are the principal source of employment to the inhabitants of this city. The men are without means to pull through the winter and more than 1,500 persons will be in want before a week has gone by.

Hovering Near Starvation

Schoenberg, Germany, March 4.—A census of the unemployed in this city has just been taken, with the result that it is now definitely known that there are 2,306 idle men in the city. Of this number fully two-thirds are hovering close to the edge of starvation. Many of the idle men have large families to support, and the consequent distress following unemployment is acute.

Boycott Makes Sailors Idle

Trieste, Austria, March 4.—There are nearly two thousand idle sailors in this port following the return of the boycotted vessels from Turkey. Most of these men are Lascares of the worst type and a crime wave is expected to follow very soon.

Babies Die From Starvation

Belleval, France, March 4.—Seven hundred workmen are out of employment here and distress is aggravated by the severest winter experienced in this most severe winter that has visited this section for years.

Strike Breakers Laid Off

Smyrna, Asiatic Turkey, March 4.—The "strikebreakers on the Adnan railway have been laid off and trouble is feared when they are brought to this city from the Kuleh branch of the line where they have been working. The Turks, Greeks and Italians who struck in order to help out the agitation for a new constitution some time ago are still in this city in crowds, and collisions between them and the strike breakers, most of whom are Greeks, are feared by the local authorities.

Idly Leave for Marseilles

Narbonne, France, March 4.—Six hundred and fifty men, women and children have left this city for Marseilles as a result of the industrial depression here.

CHICAGO CHARTER TO BE CUT INTO TEN SEPARATE BILLS

Chicago's proposed charter-out into ten separate bills was to be taken up this afternoon by the steering committee of the convention and work pushed so that the measures can be sent to Springfield for introduction in the legislature next week. Since the last meeting of the committee, Prof. Ernest Freund has been busy redrafting the charter into separate bills. He has attempted to do little more than prefix an enacting clause to each section and make the necessary changes in wording so that each bill can stand alone.

DORA M'DONALD FILES ANSWER

Mrs. Dora McDonald, wife of the late gambling king, who was acquitted of the murder of Webster Querin, artist, in his own studio, this morning filed before Judge Mack a reply to allegations in the Goodrich divorce suit in which she was named as co-respondent of T. E. Goodrich, husband in the suit.

Mrs. McDonald declared that so far from being a co-respondent of Goodrich she was his prosecutor, since he had stolen from her jewelry and valuable articles and that it was her original charge of this nature that had caused the first of the Goodrich divorce bills.

When Mrs. Goodrich sued Goodrich for divorce she named Mrs. McDonald as co-respondent in the case. Goodrich promptly retaliated by filing a cross suit, and in both suits Mrs. McDonald was handed without gloves. The third angle was taken when Mrs. McDonald moved both sides in her reply filed this morning.

MONTANA KILLS SAME JAP BILL BEATEN IN CALIFORNIA

Helena, Mont., March 4.—The legislature was in session until midnight. After a hot fight the "Yellow peril" Japanese bill, framed after the California measure, which would have prohibited oriental holidays, land, was killed by a vote of 24 to 22 in committee of the whole.

Dies in Subway

New York, March 4.—Stricken with apoplexy while riding on a subway train, Edward V. Hallack, aged 72 years, a wealthy grain dealer of Queens, L. I., died before medical aid could reach him.

MAN KNOWN IN IRISH GIRL CASE

A. Anhalt Said to Be One of the Torturers of Miss Ella Gingles

A new twist was given today to the case against the alleged white slavers who are said to have tortured Ella Gingles, the little Irish lacemaker, when it was discovered that a man named A. Anhalt was mixed up in the case.

This man is alleged to have been one of the torturers of the girl and from a description given by Ella Gingles, as well as by the names given by her to the detectives, it is now claimed that he is the man who climbed through the transom from the bath room in the Wellington hotel into the room of Miss Donahue, secretary of the hotel and sworn enemy of the Gingles girl, who accuses her of having passed the knock-out drops through the transom on the night of the torturing.

Anhalt Aided Woman's Alibi

The man Anhalt is the one through whom the Barrette woman attempted to establish her alibi by proving that she was at the flat of one Victor Greenbaum, 4719 Indiana avenue, causing from 11:30 to 2:30 on the night of the torturing.

Independent investigators on the case have found that Anhalt is a partner of Greenbaum, both of them being jewelry salesmen for the firm of Guttmann and Solomon of New York.

Ella Gingles in her story has described Anhalt perfectly as the man who climbed through the transom as she was coming to her senses after her tortures. She did not get the name correct owing to the fact that she has no knowledge of German pronunciation, but thought that the Barrette woman, whom she alleges to have been in the bathroom at the time, called him "Doc Anders" or "Anderson."

Another Hole in Theory

A connection between Greenbaum, Anhalt, the Barrette woman and the Hale woman has been established perfectly by the independent investigators in the case. A further hole was put in the police theory, also, when it was found that the transom between the bathroom and the room of the Donahue woman was of the old style removable sort, and that it was easily possible for a man to pass through it.

The police statement that the dust had not been disturbed was further discounted when repeated attempts to remove the dust failed, owing to the fact that it is caked and evidently the deposit of years. A man by pressing his thumb down hard into the dust cannot even get a smear on his finger, much less make a permanent mark in the dust.

Greenbaum Not Implicated

Whether Greenbaum accompanied Anhalt and the woman from his flat to the Wellington hotel on the night of the torturing is a fact yet to be established.

A VICTORY FOR FRENCH WOMAN WORKERS

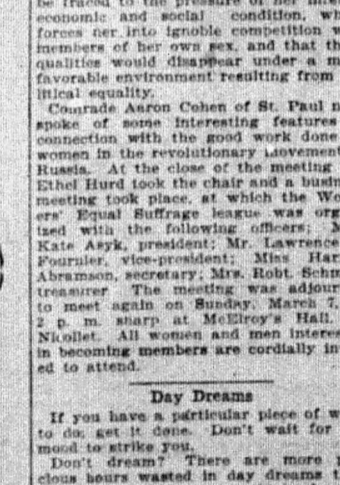
An interesting and very old established labor tribunal exists in France, Belgium and one or two other continental countries, known as the "Council of Prud-homes"—a trades council, or jury, consisting of representatives of workers and of masters of any given trade.

The women silk spinners were controlled and represented by "Prud-femmes" and the men and women silk weavers appointed between them one master and three women as a jury. The principal functions of these juries, composed of men and women, were the control and protection of apprentices, the convocation of the workers (guet), the examination and reception of men and women candidates for the position of "maître" or "maitresse", the collection of fees, the administration of finances, and the general control of the production and sale of the articles manufactured.

Prior to the revolution the official records showed more than 1,500 "maitresses" in one trade alone, and 4,000 workwomen; but Turgot abolished with one stroke all these corporations in 1791, and the confusion in trade relations that ensued later during the long turmoil of the revolution, obliterated, for a time, their necessity.
