ADOLPHUS BUNSCHE REPORTED NEAR DEATH IN GERMANY. MAY INVOKE U. S. TROOPS IN STRIKE

Talk of Mullaney and Wood Was Mere Blind to Make Naming of Criminal Easy

HE IS ARCH-ENEMY TO LABOR Man Backed by Employers Is in Danger of Going to Prison if a Special Prosecutor Should Be Named

PRISON DOORS WILL YAWN If Busse makes Lavin chief of police it will be a challenge to the decent citizens of Chicago that they cannot ignore. If the people of Chicago are goaded into demanding a special prosecutor over Mr. Wayman's head, new evidence can be gathered that will be sufficient to put at least thirty in prison—including the men "higher up."

The haze which has concealed the real situation in the police department of the city of Chicago is at last clearing away and it is now becoming evident that the real intention of those in power is to appoint the arch-criminal of the force, Patrick J. Lavin, the man who stands practically convicted of inciting to burglary, the man who, with the help of "Dutch Meyer," knows about bomb throwing, the man whom the decent citizens of Chicago know to be absolutely the most unfit man on the force, to the position of chief of police.

The friend of things, the arch-foe of labor, the protector of rackets, the lick-spittle of the employers' association, the hob-nobber with scoundrels, the king grater and the biggest all-around scalawag that the police force of Chicago has ever known has been practically selected to maintain "law and order" in the city of Chicago.

PART OF LAVIN PLOT

The outcry that was raised when it was proposed to raise Capt. Stephen B. Wood to this high office because the captain's energies had principally been devoted to protecting vice in the Twenty-second street district, now turns out to be merely a piece of provocation of the public on the part of Busse in order to make Lavin the inevitable choice for the high position which has heretofore been decorated by Shippy. Lavin's chief claim to the position is that he knows every crook in the city of Chicago—and is friendly with the same, as far as he dares to be. Lavin's appointment as chief of police means just one thing—the further CRIMINALIZATION, the complete CRIMINALIZATION of the police force of Chicago.

Lavin never sleeps. If he does he has two lieutenants, Detectives Sheehan and Murphy, on the job. These men are not paid to run down criminals, under Lavin's direction. When not employed at shadier work they are used principally to watch the other police officers and terrorize the police force until it becomes respectful to Lavin.

POLICE ARE TERRORIZED These men and Lavin himself have a line on every wrongdoer and rightdoer on the police force. There are a few of the latter left, but they will not last long when Lavin gets to be chief. Lavin's activities have been almost wholly directed against the police force of Chicago instead of against the criminal element. There is hardly a patrolman in town who is not desperately afraid of him. Lavin and his two detectives have the "goods" on nearly every man on the force who is crooked and can easily cook up the goods against the men who are trying to be straight. Hence the fear which he has managed to spread of himself and his two agents throughout the force.

WHO IS "DUTCH" MEYER? The latest position in which Lavin has distinguished himself has been as director of the gambling squad which was "endeavouring" to find the bomb throwers. When "Dutch" Meyer was accidentally arrested after the explosion of bomb El Lavin saw to it that he was promptly freed after a short conversation. "Dutch" knows too much and Lavin does not want him tied. He might tell some things about

Judge Grosscup, as Receiver, Has a Whip He Can Use in Behalf of Car Companies

MEN STAND FIRM, HOWEVER "It's Time We Know Who the Real Rulers Are," Says President Buckley of Union; No Hope in Peace Negotiations

TWO GOOD CRONIES Yesterday afternoon Peter S. Grosscup, traction magnate and federal judge, played golf with John M. Roach, former president of the Consolidated Traction company and now president of the Chicago Railways company.

Federal troops may be called to prevent the union motormen and conductors from getting an increase in wages. The man who can appeal for such troops is Peter S. Grosscup, traction magnate and judge of the United States Circuit Court of Appeals, sitting in Chicago. As soon as a strike is declared Grosscup has the right to issue an injunction which will restrain the strikers from interfering with cars of the Consolidated Traction company and with cars operating along its right of way. Not only does the fact of his receivership of the Consolidated Traction company give him that power, but the through routing of cars over tracks of the Chicago Consolidated Traction company extends the judge's jurisdiction south to South Chicago, north to Evanston and west to the city limits.

Through an appeal to Taft, who, as a judge, had an injunction record, Grosscup could secure troops from Fort Sheridan to keep open the lines on which cars of the Consolidated Traction company, now joined with the Chicago Railways company, run.

COURT STILL CONTROLS The Chicago Consolidated company went into the hands of the federal courts in bankruptcy proceedings over twelve years ago on the petition of several of the stockholders. The company was then, and is still, encumbered with a vast amount of the securities of the original companies which were brought together in the Consolidated Traction company. The Consolidated Traction company is still in the hands of a receiver, as a whole. Not only this, but stockholders of its underlying companies are petitioning for a separate receivership for each of the underlying companies.

HOW PLAN WILL WORK Here are the facts in detail. The Chicago Consolidated Traction company was a Yerkes traction trustification. It took over the lines of the Evanston Electric Railway company, the North Chicago Electric Railway company, the Chicago Electric Transit company, the Ogden Street Railway company, the Cicero & Proviso Street Railway company, the North Side Electric Street Railway company, Chicago, Jefferson & Urban Transit company. The original capital stock of the company was \$12,500,000.

JUDGE GROSSCUP'S POWER "Judge Grosscup," said Fisher, "can not as receiver for the Consolidated Traction company enjoin the men from leaving their posts, but he can and undoubtedly will enjoin any physical interference with the operation of cars on that company's tracks, and cars from that company's barns which operate over the through routes into all parts of the city."

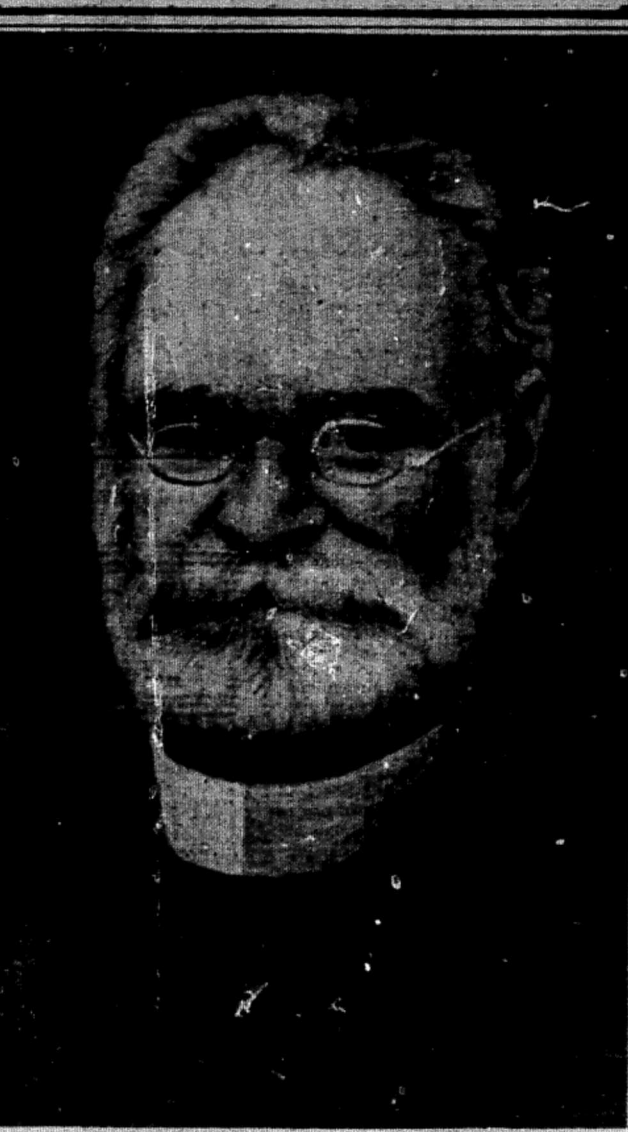
