

## MURRAY BRINGS SUIT FOR \$25,000 AGAINST WILKIE FOR ARREST

### Socialist, Taken at Secret Service Chief's Instigation, the Complainant

### OTHER SUITS ARE STARTED

### Mexicans Prefer Charges Against the Chief of Police of San Antonio

(OFFICIAL TO THE DAILY SOCIALIST.)

San Antonio, Tex., Oct. 22.—John Murray, secretary of the Political Refugee Defense League, who was arrested in San Antonio during the visit of President Taft, has started suit for \$25,000 damages against Chief Wilkie of the United States secret service for false arrest.

Wilkie Goes in Hiding

Wilkie, who has been responsible for the arrest of a large number of innocent Mexicans and Americans from Los Angeles to San Antonio because of Taft's trip to meet Dictator Diaz, has gone into hiding to avoid being served with the papers in the damage suit. His baggage is being watched at the St. Anthony hotel and there is every prospect of his being caught unless he leaves the state secretly.

E. Davila and M. Ybarra, two Mexicans who have been driven from their native country by the Diaz bloodhounds, have each started suit against Chief of Police Van Ripper of San Antonio, Tex., for false imprisonment during the Taft celebration.

Murray First Thought Kidnaped

Murray had been in the southwest recently, devoting a good deal of his time to the protection of Mexican refugees. He was arrested by United States Marshal Lancaster under instructions from Chief Wilkie during Taft's visit and charged with violating the neutrality laws. He was thrown into the county jail, where he was kept for two nights without being permitted to communicate with his friends or with an attorney.

Members of the local branch of the Socialist party believed he had been kidnaped and were preparing to go on a hunt for him when it was learned that he was in prison. Immediately after his release all the federal officials here began denying they had had anything to do with Murray's arrest.

## HOG OF LAKE FRONT WILL NOT ELECTRIFY

The Illinois Central railroad, "the hog of the lake front," has refused to electrify its terminals and in place of taking the course demanded by the city hints that it may some time use coke instead of coal and thus avoid smoke. This course could, it is declared, do away with smoke and at the same time prevent the expense of the entire replacement of the steam locomotives with electric ones and the installation of huge power plants to generate electricity. It is probable that if the other railroads agree to the same change in fuel, the roads will thus destroy the city's case for electrification and the Snow ordinance will end in a four-flush of the city administration undertaken with a view to winning public favor and erasing from the public mind the memory of various unsavory acts of the city authorities.

Would Out Into Profits

The case on which the Illinois Central directors and stockholders rejected the electrification plan rested on the basis that, though electricity, once installed, insured cheaper operation, its installation is so costly as to create interest, depreciation and other charges of sufficient size to cause great inroads on the net earnings, and, second, the handling of freight and il-

OFFICIAL PLOT IS CHARGED

Friends of Mexican Point Significantly to Theft of Letters

Los Angeles, Cal., Oct. 22.—Stories are circulated today by friends of Gutierrez de Lara, the federal prisoner, to the effect that there is an official plot against the Mexican to have him deported from the United States as an anarchist. It is declared that there is a direct connection between De Lara's case and the robbery of the postoffice at Terminal Island, near San Pedro, Tuesday. The significant fact in the robbery is said to be that the only mail taken was that from Mexico, including letters to friends of De Lara. The postmaster, it is said, refuses to discuss the robbery.

The Herald says that two members of the Los Angeles police force are accused of serving the Mexican government in cases in which political refugees have been arrested. The officers are believed to have given information to Immigration Inspector Ridgeway, purporting to show that De Lara is an anarchist and an alien, under the law, should be deported to Mexico.

Word is expected from Attorney Clarence S. Darrow of Chicago in reply to the request of the De Lara Defense League that he come to Los Angeles to help the prisoner.

APPEAL TO DANIEL KEEFE

Barnes Will Ask His Aid in Behalf of De Lara, Socialist Organizer

J. Mahlon Barnes, national secretary of the Socialist party, today communicated with Dan Keefe, commissioner of Immigration in the department of commerce and labor at Washington, D. C., concerning the case of L. Gutierrez de Lara, the Socialist organizer, arrested at Los Angeles, Cal., under the alien-anarchist law.

All the evidence which it is expected will be presented for and against De Lara will finally go to the secretary of commerce and labor for his decision. Keefe was president of the Longshoremen's union before receiving his federal appointment, and it is expected that he will give the case his careful attention. Keefe was instrumental in permitting the Russians who escaped from Siberia to Alaska in skin boats across the Behring sea to remain in this country.

The seriousness of the case against De Lara is recognized by the Political Refugee Defense League, which will take up the matter at its meeting tomorrow night. It is recommended that there is a sort of understanding between the governments of the United States and Mexico, as a result of the Taft-Diaz meeting, concerning the return of political refugees. That the blood rulers of Mexico have not been slow to take advantage of this arrangement is seen in the numerous arrests being made along the Mexican frontier.

Says He's Not an Alien

The government will seek to show that De Lara has not lived in this country for three years and is therefore an alien. De Lara claims he has lived in the United States more than three years. The present move on the part of the federal officials is looked upon as but a ruse by the Mexican government to get De Lara again within its grasp, which will mean his certain death.

The entire Southwest and Pacific coast is aroused over De Lara's arrest and protest meetings are being held everywhere to raise funds for his defense.

COUNTRY EDITORS ORGANIZE FOR WAR ON CANNONISM

## SAYS EMPLOYERS RUIN WOMEN

### Raymond Robins at Belleville Meet Declares They Make White Slaves

Belleville, Ill., Oct. 22.—Speaking before the convention of the Illinois State Federation of Labor, Raymond Robins of Chicago held the employers of women responsible for the driving of women into the red light districts.

"The sweatshop employers are responsible for driving women into the red light district," Robins shouted, amid tremendous applause, during the session that had been turned over to the women delegates to the convention. Mary McDowell of the University Settlement, Chicago, was in the chair. Elizabeth Maloney of the Waitresses' union, Chicago, had said in her speech that waitresses who work twelve hours a day walk ten miles and carry over 100 pounds of dishes. These figures she read from federal reports.

Robins in his speech said in part: "The red light parade headed by 'Gypsy' Smith was spectacular. If the 'Gypsy' had led his followers into the factory districts and demanded that the exploitation of women should cease he would have attacked the white slave traffic."

Miss McDowell expressed the thanks of the women delegates to the Baptist ministers' conference, who had promised to take up the ten hour fight and push it among the churches of their denomination. Elizabeth Maloney called Judge Tutthill's granting of the Ritchie injunction against the women's ten hour law "a travesty on justice."

Robins spoke at the afternoon session, and when he had finished Frank Farrington, a delegate from the United Mine Workers of America, rose and said:

**Resolutions to Tutthill**  
"I move that a committee be appointed to draft resolutions which will let Judge Tutthill know what the members of this convention think of him."  
The motion was passed and the committee will be appointed. Prior to that, however, the resolutions asking all local unions in Illinois to join in the ten hour fight had passed without a dissenting vote. The resolution proposed by Farrington was for the purpose of conveying the opinion of the convention to Judge Tutthill personally.

A resolution was presented by Edward Nockels, secretary of the Chicago Federation of Labor, asking that agitation be undertaken for the passage of an eight-hour law for postal clerks. It was the sense of the meeting that as soon as the ten hour law for women had been validated an eight hour law for women should be undertaken.

**Speech Made by Wright**  
In his speech to the convention Edwin R. Wright, the president of the State Federation of Labor said on the ten hour law for women:  
"The measure originated as an eight-hour law, but our friends in the general assembly thought ten hours about right, notwithstanding that many of our male workers are now employed but eight hours and the rest of them are bending every effort to secure a shorter workday. For nearly an hour the crowd sought to drown their voices, and it required the services of thirteen policemen to keep the mob of Wall street retainers, each of whom expects some day to be a millionaire, in check.

Mr. Morgan heard the speaker denounce capitalism.

## IDLE OVER RUN UNITED KINGDOM

### Thousands of Jobless Seek the Government's Aid; Factories Are Closed

Washington, Oct. 22.—Great Britain's army of unemployed is constantly growing larger, and the distress and discontent is growing so acute that the government is becoming greatly alarmed. As yet, however, the ruling class of the United Kingdom has not been able to answer the question: "What is to be done?"

In a special report John L. Griffiths, United States consul general at London, gives extracts from a special statement just issued by the royal commission on the poor law and relief of distress.

**Thousands Seek Government Aid**  
The commission declares that during the fiscal year ending March 31 last the number of those who were without work and who sought government aid totaled thirty-one persons in every 1,000 of the population, while in the fiscal year immediately preceding only fourteen out of each 1,000 made application for assistance.

The number of men who applied for relief in the last fiscal year constituted 41-10 per cent of the workmen of England and Wales, while during the year ending March 31, 1908, they constituted 21-10 and the year preceding only 13-10 per cent.

The destruction and absence of work for the unemployed is not confined to London, but is general in practically all of the manufacturing cities and towns in the United Kingdom.

**Able Bodied Men Hunt Vainly**  
A striking feature of the situation is that the men seeking work are for the most part in the prime of life, only 5 per cent being either under 20 years or more than 60 years of age.

The government also is seeking to discover some means of cutting off the supply of unskilled and unintelligent labor by training boys to enter regular and permanent work. This may be accomplished through the establishment of government technical training schools, wherein the sons of the poor may be educated in the various trades.

Marshall Field & Co., Mandel Bros. and Carson, Pirie, Scott & Co. have scab tailoring shops. The tailors who have signed today are: Harry Soroken, Philip Singer, N. H. Gray, P. Orlov, S. G. Nathan, Leonie Boedeker, L. J. Mitchell, M. S. Bank, Abe Cohen, A. Rosenberg, Louis Swidlow, Kerr & Smith, Louis Glasburg.

The big stores on State street, following their time-honored policy, have started a fight on the union.

## WHISKY DEMAND BREAKS RECORD

New York, Oct. 22.—According to figures presented by the internal revenue commissioner more whisky is being drawn from bonded warehouses throughout the country than ever before. Withdrawals from bond last year aggregated 134,901,468 gallons, the heaviest on record, and since then they have been even heavier.

The manufacture of distilled spirits is still well below the high rate established in 1907, when 168,572,913 gallons were produced. Last year the production was 128,634,025 gallons, and the output so far this year is said to be considerably heavier than that.

**Sell Liquor to Indians**  
Washington, D. C., Oct. 22.—Men who have been selling "fire water" to Indians in Wisconsin, where the secret service is making a vigorous campaign for the suppression of the drink habit among the red men, are having a hard time, according to reports made to the Indian office here. With twenty-four liquor cases presented to the federal grand jury at Milwaukee, twenty-three bills were returned.

## PROBE WATCHED BY SOCIALISTS

The evidence submitted to the federal grand jury last December in the peonage cases at Argo, Ill., where the Corn Products Refining company was erecting a plant, was taken before the special congressional peonage commission yesterday and today. The evidence was worked up by government secret agents and representatives of the Daily Socialist. The Daily Socialist has in its possession duplicates of the statements of the witnesses which it will publish when the congressional committee announces its action. The Daily Socialist representatives who worked on the case have communicated with the committee and their letter and offer of evidence will be published later.

The evidence presented was such that Attorney General Bonaparte desired prosecution, an anxiety which was not shared by the office of the district attorney in Chicago. Interesting facts along that line may be brought out before the commission within the next few days. Some cases against Greek holders of peons resulted in convictions, but a big corporation which owes a United States senator \$79,990 is a different thing than a few friendly Greeks. ## Quick Climax Comes as a Result of World Protest on Ferrer's Death

**THRONE NOW TOTTERING**

**Ministers Step Out in Order to Save the Scepter of King Alfonso**

Madrid, Spain, Oct. 22.—An enraged people won a victory yesterday when the Spanish cabinet, headed by Premier Maura, resigned as one of the first fruits growing out of the public protest against the execution of Prof. Francisco Ferrer.

The Cortes which was recently called together as a result of the combined demands of the liberal and democratic elements in the country, showed a coalition of all the elements in opposition to the bloody Maura regime. It was this situation that forced a quick change in the ministry, in order to save, if possible, Alfonso's throne.

**Pontius Pilate Attitude**  
It was La Clerva, minister of the interior in Maura's cabinet who declared to a correspondent for the London Times:

"If Ferrer is accused of complicity in the military rebellion he must be judged by that competent tribunal. The government has no concern in the matter."

That this Pontius Pilate of Madrid was mistaken when he declared that the government could not interfere in matters pertaining to jurisdiction over Ferrer is now seen in his own downfall, where the final appeal went to the people.

The government now faces a Cortes in which all the leaders of the opposition are united, representing an outraged populace, supported and backed by the entire press of the country save the government organs, the clerical and the military journals. It is this situation that has brought about the overthrow of the Maura-La Clerva ministry and which is causing Alfonso's throne to totter in the balance.

**Backed Up by Church**  
It was these two leaders of the Spanish cabinet, ministers Maura and La Clerva, who declared their intention of inflicting exemplary chastisement upon all those who provoked the recent revolutionary movement. This policy was continued until the ministry, urged on by King Alfonso and the church, overstepped itself in the execution of Ferrer.

It was the government of Minister Maura that undertook the campaign in Morocco against the Rif tribes, who had been so insolent as to oppose by force a Spanish invasion of their territory. The pretext and object of the invasion was to compel respect for the property rights of certain mine lands which one of the large stockholders was Count de Romanones, an ex-member of the cabinet.

**Brought Own Retribution**  
Maura, the military capitalist, press, and the military clique had to defend the interests of the capitalists, and were unwilling to consider the will and the sentiments of the majority of the nation. This policy first brought its own retribution in the riots of Barcelona and now in the forced resignation of the Maura cabinet.

The sessions of the chamber of deputies have been exceptionally violent ever since the meeting of the Cortes. The position of the government was shaken at every gathering.

Senator Moret y Prendergast, the former premier, who on Monday made a severe arraignment of Premier Maura and his ministers, redoubled his attacks Wednesday.

"We do not fear threats of violence," shouted La Clerva, minister of the interior, and brother criminal with Maura, in return to Prendergast's arraignment.

"We will remain," continued La Clerva, during a lull in the tumult, "for to resign would be cowardly."

**Loophole for Alfonso**  
Just one day after he made this statement the Maura-La Clerva ministry has crumbled and become a thing of history. The resignation of the cabinet was immediately accepted by King Alfonso, which was expected. He has been endeavoring to place the blame for Ferrer's murder on Maura's shoulders ever since he became aware of the world-wide indignation aroused by the assassination of the great educator.

The news that Maura, whose attitude has been for the strictest military punishment of Ferrer's friends, had surrendered under the attacks of the populace was received in Madrid with demonstrations of joy.

It was feared by the authorities that a policy of repression at this time

Sutherland was invited to speak on subways and his hearers expected an illuminating discussion on legal questions and the movement of cars, but he said: 'Not content with the foul record of the past, even now that council is plotting more imply deviltries.'

Corruption Stalks Abroad 'Corruption stalks abroad in our city. The majority of the body sworn to protect the public and work for the welfare of the community are grafters of the lowest grade. And I wish to say that that bond issue of \$18,000,000, planned to wipe out deficits caused by the corruption of the public officers of Chicago, is an imposition on the people.'

A Noble Body of Men 'I want to say that the Chicago council is the most noble, upright body of men in a similar position in the world today,' he began. 'It is not as Mr. Sutherland says, destructive, but constructive.'

When I attacked the administration I did not include those present,' said Mr. Sutherland, interrupting Mr. Fowler. A fight was prevented by Alderman W. E. Dever, who pacified the two disputants.

New York, Oct. 22.—Determined on an extensive lecture tour in which she will tell of the barbarous methods used against woman suffragists in England, Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, twice imprisoned for advocating the cause in which she believes, arrived in this city yesterday. She was greeted by a committee bearing the sign, 'Votes for Women.'

Tells of Her Imprisonment 'I suffered solitary imprisonment,' she said, 'and only one hour of exercise out of the twenty-four. The other twenty-three I was kept in a little cell 6x10 feet. I had cell 47 on the second floor of Holloway prison and I wore the regular prison garb, too, but I did not bring this costume to New York with me.'

The movement is progressing satisfactorily in England. We have pledged from practically two-thirds of the members of parliament to vote for us as soon as a bill is prepared by the government. And we expect sooner or later to compel the government to introduce the bill. Just when this will come to pass I am not prepared to say.

Stoutly Defends Militant Tactics Mrs. Pankhurst stoutly defended militant tactics. 'All great movements have been worked out by violence,' she said. 'The American people got their liberty by violence, so why not rush the house of commons to obtain what we regard as our rights? The ballot granted to women will make them more intelligent, less self-centered, and on the whole much better citizens.'

In U. S. Until Nov. 22 Mrs. Pankhurst will remain in the United States until Nov. 22, but will not be able to get as far west as Colorado, where suffrage is being tried. She will speak at Boston Friday and Worcester, Mass., Saturday, returning to New York Sunday for a reception by the National and New York State Suffrage associations.

On Monday night next she will appear at Carnegie hall and deliver an address before what probably will prove to be the largest audience she has faced in her career. The box holders will include E. H. Gary, Mrs. O. H. P. Belmont, and others. Lady Cook (Tennessee Clavin) is expected to attend.

WOMAN CHARGES INSPECTION OF MEAT IS PURE FRAUD Richmond, Va., Oct. 22.—Direct charges of incompetency in the federal department of agriculture and of disregard of the rules of the bureau of animal industry in the federal inspection of meat were made by Mrs. Caroline Bartlett Crane of Kalamazoo, Mich., here before the American Public Health association, in convention.

Mrs. Crane stated that last Friday in Chicago in company with the inspector in chief of that city she had visited one of the packing plants there and saw that not one of the condemned carcasses that came under her observation had been marked condemned, according to the rules.

Mrs. Crane openly attacked the department for allegedly misleading the public into believing that the meat inspected by federal officials was passed upon justly and with the best interests of the public at heart. She stated that the standards of health of animals slaughtered had decreased since the scandal in meat inspection of 1905.

50,000 SOLDIERS WILL GUARD CZAR IN ITALY

Rome, Oct. 22.—The czar will arrive at Raconigi next Saturday afternoon. He will return to Russia by way of Germany, going through Modane on Monday. He is traveling incognito at present, but will appear as czar when he reaches Bordonechia, the first Italian railway station after leaving France.

The railway from Bordonechia to Raconigi, where he is to meet King Victor Emmanuel, a distance of about 50 miles, will be guarded by 50,000 soldiers.

The czar will not go to Messina, but may visit the Spina dockyard. Part of the time he is at Raconigi will be spent in shooting. Although his visit assumes the character of one of intimate friendship, Prime Minister Giolitti and Foreign Minister Tittoni will be present at Raconigi.

FINLAND CAN'T RESIST TYRANNY

St. Petersburg, Oct. 22.—Open resistance to Russia's demand for an annual military contribution of \$4,000,000 by Finland is entirely out of the question, according to a statement made today by a prominent Finnish official.

He believes that there will simply be a passive refusal to appropriate money for the national defense and that there will be little headway made in the collection of the amount until that work is placed in the hands of Russians.

The official considered the annexation of the eastern portion of the Viborg province settled, and he expressed the opinion that this would lead to the general resignation of the Finnish residents to the new frontier.

The threatening situation in Finland has spread dismay in St. Petersburg society, owing to the prospect of the officers of the crack regiments of the guard being called upon to pass the winter in the bleak barracks of the cantonments of Finland instead of participating in the gayeties attending the return of the court to this city.

WIFE MURDERER IS TO BE HANGED HERE TOMORROW

Andrew Williams must die on the gallows tomorrow for the murder of his wife, at their home in Englewood. Governor Deenen, acting upon recommendation of the state board of pardons, last night refused the petition for commutation.

Preparations for the execution of the negro will be begun today. At noon he will be sent to the death chamber, and tonight the scaffold will be made ready for his hanging.

Williams is slightly agitated by the approach of the day of his execution, but tells all who visit him that he is ready for the fate he must meet.

RASMUSSEN SAYS COOK WAS THERE

Danish Explorer in Statement Confirms Doctor's North Pole Details

Copenhagen, Oct. 22.—Knud Rasmussen, the Danish explorer, in a statement dated Julianehaab, Greenland, September 25, forwarded to his wife in Copenhagen, declares that Dr. Cook reached the north pole and gives evidence obtained indirectly from the Eskimo youths who accompanied the successful exploration to the "big nail." The evidence which he gives to prove that Cook discovered the pole is at second hand, but he says that it comes direct from the northern youths and can be relied upon in every detail.

Refutation of Peary Charges The statement, which tends to refute the Peary charges, is in part as follows: "The last post from Denmark tells that there has been some surprise among my countrymen that Dr. Cook was the only white man who saw Cook's start and the only man with a real knowledge of the Eskimo language who has been in contact with Cape York Eskimos, have not sent any statement to civilization about my impressions of Cook's north pole trip."

Therefore, now hasten to take this opportunity, which is afforded me by the accidental meeting of the steamer Expedite, to send my opinion to Denmark, an opinion which, in view of Peary's attacks, may be of value.

It is, of course, impossible for me to give absolute proofs that Cook, a single white man, with two Eskimos has been at the pole. It must necessarily more or less be a matter of belief, as the authorities can always maintain that a clever swindler, even if he has not reached the pole, would be able to construct a series of observations which, together with and in continuance of the real observations, are impossible to be proven falsifications, except in the same way as it is possible to condemn criminals on circumstantial evidence.

Eskimos Corroborate Story "That Cook was away from Anoritok since January or February, 1906, until the spring of 1909 is a fact. The start of the expedition and the route from Anoritok took place, according to the Eskimos, exactly at the time given by Cook."

Only Cook and two men, Ahpelah and Itookashoo, continued after they reached the polar ice, and the little party had gone directly to the north. The two men knew then that the goal was the pole. The direction was well known to them through Peary's many expeditions, in which most of the men of the tribe, at one time or another had taken part.

While Peary used to start from North Point, Grant's Land, Cook selected the western route because he, on the basis of Peary's observations, expected to find better ice conditions there, a supposition which turned out to be correct, so the Eskimos who know conditions north of Grant's Land say.

Statements Agree With Cook's "How far has the expedition been from the shore? The Eskimos, of course, cannot give the distance in figures, but they tell that the journey over the ice field from the shore extended so long that the sun began to appear, stood high on the sky, and at last didn't disappear at all, so that it was almost summer before they reached land again.

Furthermore, they have told that it was autumn before they decided on going to the winter quarters and before they tried to make the return journey to Anoritok.

These statements, therefore, amount to the same as Cook's, who gives September as the month in which he decided to go into winter quarters at Cape Sparbo on the south side of Jones sound.

The Eskimos, who are accustomed to take their bearings on a map, have themselves on my map given the route of the expedition to the pole and the winter quarters at the Jones sound district, of which they know from their bear hunt.

Statements Are Correct "Cook's statements about how they got over the winter, fighting musk oxen and walrus without ammunition, also are correct, as compared with the statements of his companions, as in his statements about the slow and difficult wandering from Cape Sparbo to Anoritok, where they had to drop their sledges for two months.

I therefore make this conclusion that, whenever Cook's statements are compared with the statements of his companions they appear to be quite truthful."

SECRETS OF THIS CAMPAIGN
