TODAY, the wheat market is going thru its annual pyrotechnic. Not only grain prices are going up; the price of flour and cost of bread follow. It is the holiday of the food speculators. The board of directors of the wheat exchange. The gamblers in the necessities of life are in their glory.

The mounting prices do not benefit the poor farmer. His wheat was taken from him long ago to satisfy some mortgage, to pay the interest on his numerous debts, or to meet the rent if he happened to be a tenant.

American wheat is "protected." A high tariff keeps out foreign wheat. This is the case with American wheat being sold in Antwerp at lower prices than in Chicago.

Most of the speculation is being done in May wheat. May will be the last big chance to get rid of the old crop. The highest July and September wheat, when the new crop comes on the market, tell a different story.

That is the vicious cycle in wheat prices one year after another. Be his crop large or small, the farmer is hit just the same. Prices are low when the farmer must sell; they are high when the grain goes to market to cash in on.

Seattle Idea Spreads to Other Cities

It is operated by the Central Labor Council. The bureau is at the disposal of all affiliated unions, whose individual members may secure for a small fee a card which entitles them to service.

System Reduces Cost. Minor advice is given free. Matters requiring more attention and cost more than are handled for unions and members at cost. The bureau renders its service to unionists not only in adjusting industrial matters, but when ever legal aid is needed.

The bureau with its salaries paid has proved a great economy to the unions. Uniform systems are used to deal with injunctions and workmen's compensation disputes.

System Reduces Cost. Corporations naturally oppose this new labor instrument. Private lawyers also dislike the plan since their fees and practice are injured. The Federal office in Seattle, which is doing a tremendous business was established in 1920, by George F. Vandervoer, labor lawyer.

AUSTRALIAN MARINE WORKERS WIN SWEEPING VICTORY OVER SHIPOWNERS, NOT ONE SCAB

SYDNEY, Australia, Jan. 30.—After a fight lasting several weeks over the union shop on the waterfront at Australian ports, the Waterside Workers Federation has forced the shipowners to throw the non-unionists out of their jobs and employ only union labor supplied by the federation. It was a magnificent victory for the waterside workers, due entirely to wonderful solidarity. Of the 40 branches of the Waterside Workers Federation, all obeyed the strike call. Not one scab was employed. In some cases the ports were completely closed and strikers coaling called during the strike.

Capitalist Press Raves. The capitalists were not affected. Coastwise shipping was not affected. As these vessels always employ union labor, the fight was against the overseas shipping companies who set up an agency for organizing non-union labor to break the federation. Ships were held at every port. When it was seen that the union could not be beaten, the prime minister immediately called a conference of the union and the shipowners. After two days' haggling the shipowners admitted defeat and signed as requested.

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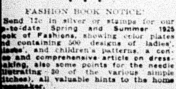

The Miners' Pay

Landlords, Courts and Tenants

Former patriots who could see no connection between landlords and agencies of the capitalist state power like the courts, for instance, are having their eyes opened in New York.

A federation of rentpayers' associations who have been doing their best for some time have been advised, thru the conviction and sentencing, of one of its officers to a year in the penitentiary, that courts and judges are institutions and individuals functioning for the protection of landlords and their class.

Captain Harry Allen Ely, president of a tenants' association, called a certain judge a "numb skull" in an article in the official organ of the association and the association of landlords took care to see that the tenants were brought to the attention of the management of the New York bench with the result above set forth.

It was to be hoped that this experience will have the effect of convincing the members of the tenants' association, in spite of their middle-class character and leadership, that any fight against landlordism and kindred evils is useless unless it recognizes that all the legal appendages of capitalism, legislators, courts, judges, police, and army, are the servants of the landlords and the private property interests they defend.

The frenzied fear that even the mildest form of protest against landlordism and its kept courts arouses in the parastic element of the bourgeoisie that they will lose their property is in all probability looking upon American capitalist government as the supreme achievement of the human race.

The Austrian breakdown creates another serious problem for the imperialists and this problem cries for solution at a time when political crises hold the stage in almost every important European nation.

Three avenues of escape, all of them of a temporary nature, are open to the allied powers. First, Austria can become part of a Danube federation that would strengthen the little nations and in all probability upset French plans in that sector.

Second, Austria can become again a part of the German nation with restoration of strengthening of the working class forces, which neither the German or allied capitalists wish with anything but fear.

Third, Austria can become an Italian protectorate and thus arouse an implacable enemy in the Balkan states that might mean a new war.

The Austrian breakdown creates another situation created by the Austrian debacle with equality, confident that it is additional proof that capitalism cannot solve its post war problems and that with the growing strength of the Communist parties in all European nations, that continent step by step is closing to the path blazed by the revolutionary workers and peasants of Soviet Russia.
