

Wagner Tells 'Daily' Fur Hearings Will Be Held Very Soon

Protest On Rumors by Fur Workers' Union Brings Action

WASHINGTON, March 8.—Chairman Wagner of the National Labor Board today told the Daily Worker final arrangements for holding the election in the fur industry are now being worked out by a Labor Board sub-committee composed of Dr. Leo Wolman, employe representative, and Lewis E. Kirstein, employe representative.

"We placed the matter in the hands of the sub-committee yesterday," Wagner said. "I think they will act quickly."

The Board's action following protests by the Fur Workers' Industrial Union members against reports that the election was being sabotaged. The Board on Feb. 16 announced it would conduct an election to determine which union shall represent the workers. Since then the A. F. of L. union officials, in an effort to discourage and demoralize the militant union membership, have made public statements that there would be no election, and it has been said here by authentic sources that William Green, of the A. F. of L., and the Labor Board, is attempting to stall off the election.

These facts were recalled to Wagner. He practically confirmed that the Board deferred to the militant union demands over the opposition of Green.

Officials Refuse to Free Schneider

NEW YORK.—Immigration officials refused to release Jack Schneider yesterday, following the posting of \$2,500 cash bond. Schneider had been out on bond for two years on a deportation charge, but was taken back to Ellis Island and the old bond was revoked. The Needle Trades Workers Industrial Union placed a cash bond yesterday, but the officials refused to release him.

200 Seamen in Marchion C.W.A. For Housing

NEW YORK.—Two hundred seamen, under the leadership of the Waterfront Unemployment Council, marched on the State C. W. A. offices at 79 Madison Ave. yesterday, in the teeth of a driving snowstorm, to demand an end to the grafting and discriminatory practices of the Seamen's Church Institute and the James St. Mission. They presented demands signed by 1,500 seamen.
