Geo. G. Hamilton.

Comrade Geo. G. Hamilton is now in Louisiana where he is making a whirlwind campaign of that Capitalism, secured and democratic oppression state. A private letter received this office states that return dates are being called for from nearly every place. Archie Gullory, an old time worker, who had never heard of Hamilton, after which time he came near Hamilton. He said that his people were ripe and ready for the message of Socialism, that what was wanted was some one who could speak for them in their own language. Gullory is in the United States and is in the program of Uncle Sam's newest school, the Children's Bureau, according to him John Lathrop, the school mistress of this latest addition to the government departments has been about the publication since her official recognition. Miss Lathrop today told all about the plans and achievements of the Bureau.

For the benefit of the humble

mother of the tenement and the leveled number of the publication, the Bureau investigators are searching through the cities finding out all about the conditions under which babies are born and reared—on buried—and everywhere. Miss Lathrop said, mothers are eager to help the cause and spread the doctrine of modern babyhood. She declared that the old system of "the survival of the fittest" would not work out the problem.

Old Theory Explored.

In olden times people seemed to think that it meant only the strong and well should grow up.

This theory has been exploded. There is no more indication of the health rate of a nation than the death of babies less than one year old, she said.

"The first great step in this work has been an inquiry begun to determine the infant mortality. The Bureau is securing data in a series of children born within the period of a year is in finding out just how those children have fared—whether they are healthy, dead, weak and ailing."

No medical data is sought. The social and economic condition of the parents; their lives, before and since their marriage, the attention the child is receiving the baby in the way of clean clothes, milk, nursing, disposition of sewage and how food is regulated, are the things we want to know.

Will Tell Why.

"We will tell our children have passed the first years of their lives, why some have died and others lived."

"Briefly these infant mortality bulletins and all that follow will be an effort to disseminate and popularize scientific knowledge of child-bearing and rearing in a manner that will be understood and appreciated by every mother, in all stations of life."

"Our investigations, just begun, have been most successful. Mothers when they have learned the purpose of our questions have been pathetically eager to help us tell other mothers causes of baby troubles."

"We will publish in our series of monographs, sections on the best methods of bringing children up. You know, of course, that we are as much interested in the protection of proper school life by the growing child, as in his infant upbringing."

We want to keep him from going to work too early; to see that his environment is good and wholesome. But first we must begin at the fundamentals and that is seeing that he begins his right. We want to know how many children are born yearly, how many of them live and how many die."

Until we have a proper method of national birth registration, we will have to get along with statistics we can gather."

Nature Expects Little Ones to Live.

"The most encouraging part of our work is the fact that nature expects little babies to live."

"The minute you begin helping by sending milk, by proper nursing, by medical attention, and by clean linen, you begin to decrease the death rate. Wonders are being worked in the great offices, where babies' lives are being guarded as the models of virtue and piety."

"In addition to our active campaign work, the Bureau is preparing a literature handbook to show large as pertaining to the proper weight and size of babies—and what effect heredity and general education has on them. The Bureau has a library of books, papers, reports and pictures, gathered from all over the world and printed in every language."
