Schmidt Case Gets Mistrial.

Very Unable to Agree as to Priest,

New York, Jan. 5.—After delib-
erating thirty-six hours the jury try-
ing the case of Hans Schmidt, the for-
mer priest of St. Rose's church, ac-
cused of the murder of Anna Am-
miller, reported about 10 o'clock to-
night that it could not reach a ver-
dict as to Schmidt's sanity and was
discharged.

TO WORK FOR FREE SPEECH.
American Political Science Associa-
tion National Committee.

Washington.—Steps to insure per-
fect freedom of thought and speech
for professors of political science in
all American universities will be
undertaken by a committee appointed
here at the closing session of the an-
nual meeting of the American
Political Science Association.

Although the resolution was
passed without discussion on the
floor, having been approved previ-
ously by the executive committee, Pro-
fessor Brooks and other leaders of
the movement was a result of the
recent action of a well-known uni-
versity in dismissing a professor of
economics who had helped along a
piece of progressive state legislation
to which the conservative officers of
the university were opposed.

John Bassett Moore, counselor of
the state department, was elected
president of the association. The
members of the executive commit-
tee include W. J. Shepard of the Uni-
versity of Missouri. The association
will meet next year in Chicago.

deserve; neither will anyone buy the
products of any factory, for, for
profits, after goods are sold, the
factory will be closed, and the
cost and carriage. With all their
slaves freed from wage-slavery, and
all of their customers freed from
the exploitation, the occupation of all ex-
ploitors will be gone, forever.
