The Seventh Congressional District of Oklahoma is preparing for a major campaign for next fall and a fierce contest of the election of a Socialist congressman. Up to the present time they have arranged for twenty-five district encampments in the district to be held in July and August. R. D. Oakford and his son, Paul, the baby orator, have been secured as speakers for the first day; W. P. Rice and Caroline A. O'Connell for the second day and J. H. H. Stalford for the third day. In addition to the encampments, speakers they have secured for the first day are: Mayor of Tulsa, Missouri, for the day in August, and Emil Biedel, mayor of Milwaukee for the day in September. A fund is also being raised for the purpose of carrying on a great literature campaign. They have taken the name of "Oklahoma for Socialism in 1914," as their battle cry. The state secretary reports that 376 towns with a membership of 1,000 have been organized since Jan. 1, 1914.
