Special from Department of Agriculture.

In the public mind the Weather Bureau is engaged only in forecasting day-by-day weather changes, storms, frost, etc., whereas to business men these forecasts are but one phase of the work. The Weather Bureau has been for some time past disseminating from day to day reports of weather conditions in the cotton region, the corn and wheat belts, in the citrus regions of California and Florida and in other recent years in the cotton and wheat belts of the South for the direct benefit of the state bankers and other interested in the cotton industry in Texas, Oklahoma, eastern Colorado, western Texas, and eastern New Mexico.

The bulletin is issued at Alexandria, Va., on each weekday throughout the season, from April 15 to October 31, and will be mailed to any individual desiring to receive the information gratis. Requests for copies should be addressed Official to Bureau, Washington, D.C., or to the nearest office.
