ICE PLANT.

The Postoffice Department at
Washington has been making plans
for installing big ice plants supply-
ing its own needs is selling ice to
the Treasury Department.
Treasury Department has been pur-
chasing private dealers \$7.65 per ton,
but is now paying the Postoffice De-
partment 15 cents per ton for ice.
They now get nearly 10 tons for the
same money that one ton cost from
private dealers. At 55 cents per ton
150 pounds would cost 34 cents.
Shreveport is cursed with the pri-
vate ownership of all her public
utilities and consequently the people
are robbed to a fare-thee-well.
This is absolutely no reason why Shreve-
port should not own her ice making
plant, but until the workers rise
up and demand it we will be cursed
with the present system.

A PARADOX. Think, Voter! Stop! Think!

All over the Southland, many
thousands of bales of cotton are to
be seen in the yards of the farmers
because there is no market. Through
out the South, East, North and West,
many thousands of men are idle,
walking the streets, begging for a
chance to work.

In all parts of the country mil-
lions of dollars worth of machinery
is standing idle and every working
family in the cotton States, could
make good use of several bales of
cotton cloth. Ninety-eight per cent
of the cotton farmers have an in-
sufficient amount of cotton cloth-
ing and very poor and inadequate
supplies of fuel.

I drove about fifty miles through
the country, recently, and saw many
front yards decorated with cotton
bales. I knew that these bales con-
tained something more than cotton.
The sweat, the blood, the tears, the
shattered hopes, the stolen pleas-
ure, the wrecked future, the broken
health and childhood and opportu-
nities of girls and boys were im-
prisoned in those cotton bales.

I talked to tenant farmers, and
small farmers, who own small farms,
and they are nothing except desper-
ate conditions in the future.
Thousands of spinners and looms
idle, thousands of strong willing
hands idle, thousands of bales of
cotton rotting on its ground and
millions of people, in the midst of
these things, suffering for the want
of cotton clothing.

Too much cotton! It is possible
to have too much cotton until all the
workers have a sufficient amount of
cotton goods? Ask the politicians
and the preacher about these things.

Which would be better, by a bale
of cotton and had it to hunker
down the price of next year's crop
or start the machinery going and
put that bale of cotton on the basis
of the needy, thereby get only a
living for the present year, but creat-
ing a demand for next year's crop?
Think it over, Ruben, and ask your
congressman about it. You say that
the present conditions are the nat-
ural effects of our system, and can't
be helped, well then, we had better
change the system. Mr. Wilson
says the government would be in
a position to distribute the cotton and
assist the cotton planters, then he
had better abolish the out-of-date
whiskey prohibition.

Mr. Wilson, several years ago, as
an historian, said that the constitu-
tion was framed for the benefit of
the bankers and commercial class.
I claim that there is not a surplus
of cotton until everybody who works
has enough to make clothes. No sur-
plus of the cotton farmers have to
go and sell their own shirts is be-
ing washed and, if the call were to
stop the shirt to pieces, he would
be as naked as a yard dog.
If the Socialists were in charge of
the government, we wouldn't be as-
ked to buy a bale of cotton, but
the unemployed men, not women
would be put to work, the nation
very well run and the money who
is willing to work, would create
enough money.
And yet the Socialists would be
preached that you don't need to
produce and would break up the system
of production and distribution and

With the terrible increase in the
cost of living, the problem of pro-
viding for his family is becoming a
serious one to the wageworker.
How much a year should the ordi-
nary wageworker have in order to
support himself and his family with
the ordinary necessities of life?
A number of very careful, thor-
oughgoing analyses have been pub-
lished for these years.

Dr. John A. Ryan, a "Catholic
great and profound in thought, real
summary, in his book "The Living
Wage" (p. 159), after a careful
investigation of all the elements in-
volved, estimates that \$1915 is the
least amount that a worker should
have to support a family with a de-
cent living.

Frank J. Goodrich, professor in the
De Pauw university, has also in-
vestigated this subject. In his
"Social Basis of Living" (p. 152) that
the "extreme low limit" would be \$650 a year.
Most students of economic soci-
ety is another authority who has
studied this question and written a
book upon it; and he estimates, in
"The Basis of Living" (p. 97), that
from \$750 to \$850 a year is absolutely neces-
sary to support a family with the
most sufficient means to meet the
ordinary requirements of life.

Take an average of these esti-
mates, and it is found that a year is required
for each family of workers to sup-
ply them with the ordinary neces-
sities of life.

This says nothing of course of
the luxuries and comforts of life.
It provides for nothing of educa-
tion, culture, or recreation—only
the barest living necessities. For
these it is estimated by these careful
analyses to be about \$757 a year
is required.

What Do The Workers Get?
The average wage of the work-
ing class in America is \$1315 a year
in the manufacturing, \$1600 a year in
mining, and \$1537 a year in farming.
These figures are based on various
sources, such as census reports,
special reports of the government
on mining, and reports of the de-
partment of agriculture.

What, then, are the facts concern-
ing the working class, in the aggre-
gate, and in the average? In the
United States under the present cap-
italist system? The facts are these:
The working class on the average
is getting about more than \$1300
a year of a sufficient income to enable
them to provide a decent life, and
the sufficient income to enable them
to provide for themselves food, cloth-
ing and shelter, leaving them nothing
for the higher things of life.

In other words, the present cap-
italist system is slowly, inevitably
undermining the physical stamina of
the working class.

Surely here is a matter worthy
of the attention of the greatest
statesmen, as well as every true
lover of humanity.

And upon these facts rests the
demand of Socialism.
