Harry Polk 'Godfather' of County Liberty Party

Uses it as a Mascot for His "Economy League" Hag—
Hopes it Will Deflect Enuf Votes to Defeat 'Red'
Ticket—Especially Magnus Danielsen

Pat & Bob Bring Forth "Liberator"

Renegade Wobbly Pays Polk, Notorious Publisher of
North Dakota, Liberty Kale Provided by Main
Streeters to Print Party Paper

Harry Polk appears as the "Godfather" of the Liberty party of Sheridan county. Anyway the North Dakota publisher held the baby in his arms while the Honorable Robert Larson of Quitman, one time distinguished I. W. W. organizer and soapboxer, Socialist politician and office seeker, two times Farmer-Labor member of the Montana Legislature, and defeated 1932 Farmer-Labor candidate for State Senator, former member of Communist party, and self advertised reddest of the reds of the northwest and best Communist of them all, officiated as high priest, sprinkling the "unholy water" of betrayal on the lusty but unfortunate infant.

Colonel Pat Wallace, pregnant with schemes of his own, his trenchant and versatile pen behind his ear, just filled the bill as "God Mother," and did his bit to inspire the urchin. The Economy League crew, out in full regalia, witnessed the ceremonies and sang the Hallelujahs wishing the barn bon voyage. Both the Democratic and the Republican mothers sent appropriate presents and good wishes, hoping that the "Little Party" would be able to help Harry Polk elect his man, Friday, Olson of Homestead, county commissioner, and so secure the printing contract for Harry while providing a meal ticket for Pat and Bob during the election campaign.

Just as soon as the baby was baptized, the Economy League decided to adopt the little monkey as its mascot to bring good luck to its endeavors. So that organization put a ribbon about the little fellow's neck, attached a chain to the collar so that it will not escape, will feed it, and will lead it about during this election campaign to the delight of Pat and Bob and the Economy League will take care of it—but he will do tricks when Bob grinds the Liberator hand organ, and he will pass the tin cup along mainstreet for the tickets to provide ink for Pat's pen and incidentals for Bob.

After the spontaneous circulation within the county during the past year of several hundred "Books" written and published by "Coin" Harvey of Monte Ne, Nebraska, the 84-year-old apostle of cheap money, and peddler of patent political medicine, Prof. Zuck of Roosevelt county, of some fame—having served a term in the Montana legislature where he enjoyed a 60-day spree, going haywire to the copper company at some profit to himself—put on a series of well attended meetings in the county at which he aroused considerable interest in the Liberty party proposal for cheap money, abolition of interest and the limitation of wealth as a way out of the present crisis. These meetings were attended generally by the rich farmers, rich in fact or in hopes, and the small business men who want to retain the capitalist system, the cause of the crises and depression, but he who come to reform it in some way so as to save themselves as small exploiters. The Professor's talk sounded good to them, if goosely to students of economy and politics, and the collections were generous. Zuck is a good spellbinder and he kept going as long as the money came in. He found that collections were best in Sheridan, Roosevelt and Daniels counties so he did not wander far from this area in his propaganda work. Following the Professor, came Fuestnow, a druggist of Pelee, over in Daniels county, to speak at another series of meetings. Later, Rev. Duncan, erstwhile socialist, the Liberty party candidate for governor of the state, blew in and under the direction of Larson organized meetings to occupy the entire time of the election campaign in these three counties and especially in Sheridan county where the Communist party is strong and expects to win, to the neglect of all the rest of them. Just as Harry Polk was to devote all of his time to Sheridan county when there are 83 other counties crying for his message was a nut taking a wise one to crack. Yet, in spite of all this preliminary propaganda work,

the libertyites were undecided as to the advisability of putting a list of candidates for county offices in the field. Many of the party members thought the idea foolish as the Communists already had a ticket in the field which had a chance for election. O. B. Hoven, Antelope businessman, one of the bull geese of the party was not so hot for county candidates as his son, Vernon, had been nominated in the primaries for county attorney on the Republican ticket. But the Hon. Bob Larson, leaning for an office himself, or maybe aching to defeat the Communist candidates, and a few of his followers, (Bob probably urged by influential members of the Economy League) insisted on nominating a ticket. Finally a meeting was advertised in Harry Polk's Herald—a meeting and not a convention call—for Saturday afternoon and evening, September 24, at both of which times, Rev. Duncan, candidate for governor would speak.

Conventions Call Inadequate
This call did not state that the meeting would be a mass convention of the members of the Liberty party, calling upon all members of that faith to attend for the purpose of nominating a list of county candidates, of drafting a platform and program, electing a county executive committee and doing any and all things proper for a mass convention to do, as the law requires; there was in other words no legal convention. Nevertheless the so-called convention proceeded to nominate a list of candidates. The Honorable Robert Larson of Quitman precinct was chairman and John Shoal of Westby precinct was secretary.

Hoven Against Ticket
O. B. Hoven, the Antelope representative at the meeting, moved that no county ticket be nominated. Chairman Larson called for discussion. "Comrade" Larson, himself, was for endorsement of a full ticket. After Delegate Larson had completed his talk which was quite extended, and the others had made remarks, the motion by Hoven was rejected, and a motion passed to make nominations. In the arguments pro and con the nomination of a ticket, according to a report of the convention in Harry Polk's Herald, of Sept. 29, which paper is very close to the Liberty party:

"There was considerable discussion among the delegates as to the advisability of placing a ticket in the field, but it was decided if it was not done, the Liberty party would pass out of existence in Sheridan county within a few weeks."

—and it was to keep the party from passing out of existence in Sheridan county before the general election on November 8, the ticket was nominated.

Nominate Full Ticket
The following candidates were named for office as indicated:

For representative in Legislature—Truitt Jensen of Archer; John Shoal of Westby.
For County Commissioner—Peter Glein, of Dagmar.
For County Attorney—No endorsement.
For Sheriff—Andrew Dahl, of Dagmar.
For Clerk and Recorder—Robert Larson of Dagmar.
For Treasurer—Alfred Jensen of Dagmar.
For Clerk of Court—Harry Ehrmantrout of Dooley.
For Assessor—William Nash of Reistone.
For Superintendent of Schools—James Randall of Comertown.
For Coroner—Bernard Nelson of Reserve.

Candidates Mostly Green Timber
The ticket as a whole is made up of untied and green timber, excepting Robert Larson who has had considerable political experience in the old socialist and in the Farmer-Labor party, having served two terms in the legislature as a member of that party. In 1928 he was defeated for re-election to the House of Representatives as that party's candidate and in 1930 he was

EXAMINATIONS IN OUR SCHOOLS

Our country school children should be given their seventh and eighth grade final examinations in their home schools. There is no good reason for the arrangement which has prevailed in Sheridan county for many years requiring children to go to some town school for their final examinations. Sometimes they are allowed to go to a nearby town but many times they are expected to go to the county seat under his signature, declared that Sheridan county had a total of 6,512 taxpayers for the year 1931, of which 3,206, over a half, were delinquent; that in Roosevelt county there were 6,200 of which 2,600 were delinquent. Congressman John M. Evans of the first congressional district, Montana, home Missoula, in a speech delivered in the last session of congress, entitled, "Taxes in Montana," which has been franked out to the voters in the state under his signature, declared that Sheridan county had a total of 6,512 taxpayers for the year 1931, of which 3,206, over a half, were delinquent; that in Roosevelt county there were 6,200 of which 2,600 were delinquent. There was no report for Daniels county as that county failed to answer the solons questionnaire in the premises.

The record delinquent county in the state is Rosebud with 4,700 names of the tax roll of which 3,673 are delinquents.

Mrs. King was a fine old lady, well known and highly respected by a large circle of friends and acquaintances who will deeply regret her passing.

Foster & Ford November 8th

In little over a week the farmers will be called on to cast their ballots nationally and on a state basis. The breaking of the grain markets during the past two weeks brings drastically to us the realization that the crisis is not over—but that it is entering new low levels.

This sharpening of the crisis means an intensification of the exploitation and the oppression of the impoverished farm masses—unless they repel this sharpened attack by united struggle.

What have the capitalist parties said regarding this situation. What of taxes, what of foreclosures and evictions, what of relief for these masses?

The third point of the Communist party program gives the only real answer to the farmers concerning this situation. This point reads:

"Emergency relief for the impoverished farmers without restrictions by the government and banks; exemption of impoverished farmers from taxes, and no forced collection of rents or debts."

The "immediate relief" program of the capitalist parties, of all the capitalist parties, is the program carried out by the Reconstruction Finance Corporation. It is the program of billions for the banks, the insurance companies, the rich—and NO relief for the toiling masses of the country.

The Communist party demands immediate cash relief for these toiling masses. For the masses in the cities it demands "Unemployment and Social Insurance at the Expense of the State and Employers. For the farm masses it demands, in the words used by Comrade Foster at Chicago on September 13, "Immediate Federal Cash relief to the impoverished farmers."

The capitalist parties want tax reduction thru "economies" in government expenses. This reduction is for the capitalists—to reduce their taxes. It is part of the same program that gives hundreds of millions to the rich as "tax refunds," that gives billions to them from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation. For the masses they advocate not tax reduction but increased taxation thru the introduction of the sales tax, gradually at first, and ending up with a whole system of plunder taxes on the commodities that the masses consume. The Communist party demands "relief from taxes" for the masses in city and country, and INCREASED "taxes on wealth and capitalist income," to use the words of Foster, the Communist candidate for president.

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Niels Madsen Admits that Liberty Party Was Illegal In Letter Answering Query

But disclaims any responsibility in the matter and gives impression that he has no discretion in the matter and must put list of candidates on the ticket. However the laws provide plainly that Certificates of Nominations for county officers shall be filed with the Clerk and Recorder who makes up the ballot, and of course it is his duty as well as the secretary of states' in case of Certificate of Nominations for state to inquire of the law has been complied with providing for nominations by Mass Convention.

Neils Madsen's letter follows:

Plentywood, Montana
October 6, 1932.

Dear Sir:
The Certificate of Nomination of Candidates for County Offices of the Montana Liberty Party was filed in this office on September 27, by Mr. Robert Larson and such names will be placed on the Official Ballot for the General Election, as far as I know at this time. You say in your letter that the Liberty Party did not comply with the law in holding a closed Convention, instead of a mass convention, and you are probably right, it is not for me to decide as to the legality of instruments filed with me.

The Convention at Antelope probably was a closed convention, so was the Communist convention, I have been told. You could not attend any of them except upon certain conditions and I was told that unless you signed certain papers at the Communist Convention, you were refused admission. This is all second hand information; but as far as I am concerned, both tickets will be placed on the Ballot unless an injunction is obtained from the court restraining me from placing them on the Ballots.

P. S. Read the P. N. of last week. I have heard rumors that the Communists have intentions of doing something about it.

Ed. Note: The Communist party never had any intention of fighting the placing of the Liberty candidates on the ballot; the party has no objections at all to the filing of liberty candidates or any other nominations on the ballot, as a matter of principle. It only calls attention to the fact of the insufficiency of the the Liberty call, and the willingness of the Economy League officers to file the Liberty ticket after their efforts to keep the democratic ticket vacant.

However, the Communist Mass Convention complied with the law in detail. The convention was open to everybody who wished to attend—all that was required was the signing of declarations that the signer believed in the principle of the Communist party and would support the platform and candidates nominated.

The Producers News wonders if Neils Madsen would have put the Communist party ticket on the ballot if its convention had not complied with the law. We doubt it very much.

UNITED ACTION OF 3,000 NEB. FARMERS CONTROLS FORCED SALE PERSONAL PROPERTY BRINGS \$7

Roosevelt County Communist Candidate for Commissioner Will Receive a Large Vote

People Turning Against Bill Adams, Renegade Radical, Now Candidate on Republican Ticket Supported by Roosevelt Co. Gang—Will Vote for Johnson

Communists In Active Campaign

Taylor Will Speak Over the Radio From Wolf Point Next Friday on Party Program and Candidates

Froid, Mont., Oct. 27.—Robert Johnson, popular young farmer of McCabe precinct, Communist candidate for the office of county commissioner in Roosevelt county, is going to get a lot of votes in the east end of the county November 8. In fact the entire Communist ticket will receive a vote that is going to surprise the capitalist politicians as the farmers here are turning in numbers to the Communist party for the party has put up a set of candidates that stand well with and have the confidence and respect of the farmers and workers.

But especially, in regard to the commissioner contest; since it has become generally known that Wm. Adams, once radical farmer but now renegade, is being supported for re-election by Banker Huxol and Frank Young of Wolf Point and the rest of the Roosevelt county gang; the farmers are making up their minds to vote for Robert Johnson, the Communist, and when the votes are counted, if things go as they look now, renegade Bill is booked for a sad surprise.

The farmers here are amazed at the fact that Bill Adams, the most outspoken "red" in this section of the county, who before being appointed to office always denounced the banks and mismanagers and the capitalist parties, both republican and democrat, has gone over, body, soul and bristles, to those he once despised and denounced in bitter words, after his appointment to that office at the hands and as the results of the efforts of his old radical neighbors.

One hundred and four people had come to the high school auditorium Friday evening to listen to the two democratic speakers, the candidate for Lieut. Governor, Mr. F. H. Cooney, of Missoula, and Mr. Roy E. Ayres of Lewistown, candidate for U. S. Congress. Beside the speakers the stage was decorated with such men as J. W. McKee, Simon Faaborg, Attorney Greer, our local democratic candidate Attorney Guenther, J. J. Gibbons and Miss Linda Hall. The speakers done well enough with what material they had to work with. They raked Hoover and the Republican party over the fire and blamed it for the present miserable conditions, but they failed to mention where the democrats had even suggested a method that would bring relief to the farmers and the millions of starving people in the cities.

Mr. Cooney told us he would like to see everybody live in a \$3500 home without taxation—which sounds like Hoover with his chicken in every pot. Mr. Ayres is what you call a good speaker, had his speech learned by heart and delivered it well. He told us how we had been exploited and robbed, how his heart was bleeding for us, but the only thing he promised was, that

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NOTE EXTENDED

Banker Forced to Cancel Second Mortgage On Property

NEBR. PLAN WORKS

Local Nebr. Farm Holiday Organization Is Run by Small Farmers

Newman Grove, Nebr., Oct. 17.—The farmers of northeastern Nebraska again demonstrated the power over the bankers at a foreclosure sale held near Petersburg, Nebraska on Friday, Oct. 14.

The Petersburg State Bank held a mortgage for \$825.20 on the personal property of two farm boys, Lester and Joe Avery. These boys had been hauled out and were unable to pay either interest or principal. The banker, Lee Juvenal, decided to put them on the road by depriving them of all livestock and machinery.

But the farmers decided otherwise. 3000 FARMERS GATHER
On the day of the sale 3,000 farmers gathered at the Avery home. The banker arrived at 2 p. m. and after meeting with the local committee of action consented to renew the note for 13 months, to stand the costs of the sale and to cancel a second mortgage on the same property for back rent.

During the discussion the banker made the mistake of declaring that he had always been fair with the farmers. Joe Ackerman, militant leader in this section, leaped to his feet, shook his fist under the bankers nose, and declared the statement a lie and went on to prove it.

ROAR AT BANKER
The mass of farmers outside, closely pressed against the house and peering in at the windows, saw the fist and roared—a roar that for the first time embodied the collective, deep seated hatred of all farmers for the bankers and

"The policy of the Hoover government," said the Communist candidate on September 13 "openly proclaims the necessity of driving hundreds of thousands of farmers off the land and into the bread lines of the cities . . . The Roosevelt Democratic party program differs in no essential respect."

Against this program of robbery and eviction, of mass destitution, the Communist party brings forth the demand for struggle "against forced collection of rents or debts." "Only the Communist party," said Foster, "supports the struggle of the farmers, to secure for them undisturbed possession of their land."

Thousands of farmers have been and are engaged in the struggle for higher prices, and against evictions. Only the Communist party, of all political parties, has actively supported these struggles. Only the Communist party actively supports the Farmers National Relief Conference, which was called on the initiative of the Rank and File committee of farmers which met in Sioux City on Sept. 9, and proposed the demands which the conference will take up.

The farmers all over the country are learning rapidly that only struggle can win relief for them, that demands unsupported by the determination of the farmers to fight for them are just so much paper for the waste baskets of the capitalist office holders.

The recent struggles of the farmers have shown us the attitude of the capitalist parties towards the struggles of the farmers. Their office holders, capitalist office-holders, use these offices to beat, tear gas, jail the toiling farmers just as the city workers are attacked and jailed when they demand relief. The program of the capitalist parties is the program of the club and the gun and tear gas bomb.

"The Communist Party alone of all the political parties operating in America today supports the struggles of the farmers to relieve their catastrophic situation which is rapidly destroying the possibility of life for them."

In the present political campaign there is one party that the toiling farmers should support, there is only one party that the United Farmers League and its official organ, the Producers News, can support. This party is the Communist party.

This party offers the only real answer to the immediate situation of robbery and eviction that is upon the farmers. Its demand of "Emergency relief for the impoverished farmers without restrictions by government or banks; exemption of impoverished farmers from taxes and no forced collection of rents or debts." is the only plank in the platform of any political party that meets the immediate needs of the farmers.

defeated as the same party's candidate for the State Senate. Outside of Bob Larson who has proven himself a plain renegade Communist and I. W. W., who is now for the purpose of aiding Harry Polk's Economy League elect its ticket, secure the printing contract, maybe accidentally a job for himself. Nothing can be said personally against the Liberty slate of candidates.

The Liberty candidates are all farmers, sincere and honest men who stand high among their neighbors, who actually believe that the Liberty party proposals provides a way out of the present crisis—men honest but confused by the quack nostrums of old "Coin" Harvey, and misled by renegades like Bob Larson and other fly-by-night adventurers at Plentywood who work together under cover in behalf of the Wall Street Hoover outfit for the few nickels they can pick up, and in revenge for not being nominated for an office by the Communist. These nominees and the rank and file of the Liberty party are all sincere men, farmers and workers who have broken with the old capitalist parties and who will align themselves with the Communist party as soon as they understand the Communist program and that the Communist party is the only party of the toiling farmers and the industrial workers, and that the Liberty party is just another capitalist party with inadequate and ridiculous proposals.

No County Platform

The Liberty candidates however have no county platform. They make no promises to the bankrupt farmers and starving workers. They do not promise as do the Communist candidates:

"No forced collection of rents or debts; no foreclosures or evictions; no Emergency relief for the impoverished farmers without restriction by the government and banks; exemption of impoverished farmers from taxes and no forced collection of debts. And
"For Unemployment and Social Insurance at the expense of the state and employers."

Candidates Make No Promises

For instance, Andrew Dahl, liberty candidate for sheriff also a democrat committeeman for his precinct, does not promise that in case of eviction orders being issued that he will refuse to evict, nor that he will positively refuse to carry out foreclosures sales, and that he will fight against forced collection of debts, as does I. W. W., the Communist candidate for sheriff. And Peter Klein liberty candidate for county commissioner does not tell the farmers positively that he will not put the resolutions on the minutes of the county board to sell any resident farmers' land for taxes, but will only enter such resolution for the sale of lands owned by the mortgage companies and other non resident land owners, and then he the farmers and workers, actual tillers of the soil for such prices and on such terms as they may under the circumstances be able to pay.

These candidates do not promise to protect the farmers and workers. They promise only to administer the county affairs and enforce the laws, which means they will foreclose and evict, and look after the interest of the exploiters and capitalists. In other words they have exactly the same county program as the fusion or Economy League candidates which the Liberty party organ refers to as "old gang" candidates. As far as the candidates and the county programs are concerned, the liberty party candidates and the Economy League—candidates, as easily seen, if they read their own program and statements stand for identical programs.

The difference is between liberty and Economy League platform and candidates and the Communist platform and candidates. In short the first two parties are capitalist parties and the last party is the Workers and Farmers party; the first are parties of the exploiters and the latter is the party of the exploited.

And that difference makes all of the difference in the world, and that difference makes a great difference in the candidates themselves as far as the farmers and the workers are concerned. The first two list of candidates are under no discipline while the Communist candidates are under the discipline of the Communist party of the county—a party composed of workers and farmers of the county.

Liberty Party Nominations Filed

After the nominations had been made at this Liberty party meeting, Rev. Duncan, the liberty party candidate for governor—(who has been by the way repudiated by "Coin" Harvey, the party's candidate for president, as a traitor who betrayed the real Liberty party and followed the Webb and the

Norskog faction or some other faction of the dozen or so into which the Liberty party has split) made a short eloquent address. He explained the proposals of the Liberty party and made a plea for the support of these proposals and the candidates nominated by the meeting. The meeting elected an executive committee and provided for the publication of an election dodger to be called the "Liberator," and then adjourned.

In the course of a few days, the certificate of nomination for candidate nominated at this liberty meeting was filed with Clerk and Recorder Neils Madsen at the court house. The Producers News had already called attention to the fact that the liberty meeting which had nominated candidates, was not a legally called Mass Convention of the liberty or any other party. It called attention to the fact that the meeting was not called as a Mass Convention but as a meeting, advertising Rev. Duncan, presumed candidate for governor for speaker; that it did not name the purpose of the Convention, viz., to draft a program and nominate candidates nor did it call all members of the party to the convention; so therefore the convention was illegal, the candidates not legally nominated, and hence the Certificate of Nomination null and void. However, Neils Madsen, Clerk and Recorder who is charged with discretion in the matter, who is bound to inquire as to whether the law had been complied with, in spite of the above accepted without inquiry the Certificate and filed the same with out the showing which could not be made; and so the liberty candidates went on the ballot and the liberty party election campaign started. Clerk and Recorder Madsen was exceptionally sympathetic to the filing of the Certificate of Nomination even though the Hon. Robert Larson was a candidate against him for his job as Clerk and Recorder, which fact in itself discloses the very intimate relations existing between Bob Larson and the Economy League candidates, the signs of which relationship crop out daily.

The Liberator Printed by Polk

Following the filing of the Certificate of Nominations, the Hon. Robert Larson as chairman of the liberty party proceeded to publish the Liberty Party Campaign Dodger, designated "The Liberator."

The Honorable Robert went first of all to Harry Polk's Herald for a bid on the job. It was a business proposition. He then went to Joe Dolin for a bid. Then he meandered over to Grenora, North Dakota for a bid. Then Bob came back to Plentywood and gave the job to Polk, not the lowest but the best bidder. He did not come to the Producers News to ask for a bid, even though the Producers News was the farmers paper and had supported Bob for office in four campaigns in two of which he was victorious and in two of which Polk had opposed and ridiculed him and held him up to public contempt, and even though the Producers News had always fought consistently for the farmers and workers. But Bob had a reason to give the job of printing the Liberator to Harry Polk. If Bob's man for county commissioner is by chance elected, no doubt every paper in the county and the paper at Grenora, North Dakota, except the Producers News, will be asked to submit a bid for the county printing and then the contract will be let, not to the lowest, but to the best bidder, and that will be Polk's Herald's bid.

Then Bob hired the colorful and elusive Col. Pat Wallace, here on another mission, to prepare the copy for the dodger, which Pat did in his best style.

The paper emerged, embellished by the pictures of the Hon. Robert Larson, himself, and Peter Klein, the candidate for the important office of commissioner—Bob borrowed the cut at the Producers News office where he forgot to ask for a bid—from the Herald press two weeks ago last Tuesday without date, except October and the place of publication given was Archer, Montana, which indicated that the paper was mailed at that postoffice.

Just why Economy Leaguer Jack Bennett's post office should have been passed up, after Economy Leaguer Polk had printed the paper is just another mystery, tho of course the Producers News nor the reds find no fault with Bob for this, as the Archer postmaster is a good "red" and will vote the Communist ticket from top to bottom; and all "reds" are glad that the Archer postmaster got the postage for his job groceries for about 20 per cent under the Plentywood merchants, to the Plentywood people who go weekly to his store to trade.

About 2,000 issues of the "Liberator" were printed and circulated over the county. It carried a cargo of main street ads, the revenue from which paid Pat for writing

the copy and Polk for printing the dodger. The dodger intimates that there may be another before election, providing the money to pay Harry for printing can be extracted from the Plentywood mainstreeters who boycott the Producers News or from the campaign fund of the Economy League.

Such is the story on the surface of the liberty party and its organization and activities in Sheridan county.

But There Is Another Story

But there is another story, under the surface, that is still more interesting, which will throw a lot of light on the political maneuverings in Sheridan county occurring during the past few months which follows.

seat no matter how great the distance.

Getting a child to the place the examination is to be given costs the parents time, trouble, and money. The distance may be anywhere from five to thirty-five miles. This means an expenditure of from one to five dollars for traveling expense. It usually means also that one of the parents must accompany the child and leave their home duties for someone else to attend. There are meals to pay for and where the distance is great, lodging must be paid for as well. Furthermore if the trip to the designated place is made in the morning and many miles must be traveled before nine o'clock when work commences, the child must be routed out of bed at an extremely early hour. His sleep is unfinished. The earliness and the rush of getting off will prevent him from eating a satisfactory breakfast. After that comes the long trip very likely over muddy or badly rutted roads so that the car slides from side to side or bumps in every conceivable way.

Then last but not least after all the turmoil he has gone thru, the child from the small country school, timid and often unaccustomed to mixing with strangers, is set down in strange surroundings, among strange children with a strange teacher before him and is expected to write intelligent comprehensive answers to sets of hard questions. Is it any wonder many of the children get low marks and some fail to pass? The wonder me is that any of our country children pass their final examinations.

Nor is this the end of the story. For, while the country child is enduring so many inconveniences and hardships to write his final exams, the town child is usually excused from his final exams altogether. How do you country teachers and country parents like that? What do you think of such discrimination against the country child? The school law specifies that teachers shall teach the child Justice. The idea of asking a teacher to impress justice on the child's mind when such injustice is meted out to him. It is to laugh.

Because the property had never been probated it was decided to have the sale to clear title to the property. Only Joe Avery bid. Plows and cultivators sold for 10 cents, a binder for 15 cents and all the personal property for a total of \$7.10.

After the sale the farmers listened to Holiday speakers, sang songs and ate watermelons.

FARMERS HOLD LEADERSHIP

It must be remembered by farmers elsewhere who read of our successful struggles here, that the Nebraska Holiday Association is not like the Holiday movements in other states.

In Nebraska it is run by farmers, farm laborers and dispossessed farmers exclusively. No dues or membership fees are required or salaries paid. Collections are taken for the necessary expense which are small. Organization, program and leadership come from the farmers themselves.

International News

Maxim Gorki, Honorary Red Commander

Moscow, Oct. 3.—The men of the Third Moscow Rifles have elected Maxim Gorki an honorary commander of the regiment in view of his great services to the revolutionary proletariat. The same honor has been conferred on Gorki by the men of the Cavalry Brigade "Stalin." The men of the garrison in Nizhni-Novgorod, now Gorki-Gorod, have decided to name their clubhouse after Gorki.

In a letter to the men of the Red Army thanking them for the honors conferred upon him Maxim Gorki points out that the Red Army is not only an army in the usual sense, but is a cultural institution whose pupils are not only taught to handle modern weapons of war, but who are also taught to handle a still greater weapon, the science of Marx and Lenin.

Heavy Sentences for Revolutionary Workers

Four workers have been tried by the court in Zagreb, Yugoslavia, charged with engaging in Communist activity. Two of the accused were sentenced to two years hard labor each and a third to eighteen months hard labor, while the fourth worker was acquitted.

Paris S. P. Condemns Anti-War United Front

Paris, October 4.—A plenary session of the Paris district committee of the Socialist party of France has been compelled to adopt a resolution put forward by the Central Committee of the party condemning those of its officials and members who have cooperated in the anti-war campaign together with the communist workers and calling upon them to alter their attitude under pain of disciplinary action.

The adoption of the resolution was preceded by a lively discussion in which a strong minority opposed the resolution. Over three thousand six hundred votes were given in favor of the resolution and 1,188 against.

Balance of Vienna's 'Fascist Day'

Vienna, Oct. 4.—The police now publish statistics giving a balance of the collisions which took place in connection with the national congress of the Austrian fascists in Vienna. Three hundred persons were arrested, including 189 social democrats, 74 fascists and 58 communists. One hundred thirty-one persons were injured, including 97 fascists, 17 policemen and 17 workers. As can be seen from the police report the promised "conquest of Vienna" did not come off.

Unemployment Rising in Vienna

Vienna, Oct. 6.—There are at present 106,665 registered unemployed workers in receipt of relief in Vienna, or 25,779 more than in September last year. Naturally, the real figures are considerably higher as many workers are no longer in receipt of support.

Final Official Figures for Elections

Athens, Oct. 7.—The Greek Ministry of the Interior has now published the final figures for the Greek parliamentary elections which took place on Sept. 25. According to the official list the seats are distributed as follows: Venelists 101 (193), People's Party 94 (19), Progressive party 15, Communist party 10, Agrarians 10, the Peasants 8, Radicals 5, Independents 3, Free-thinkers 3, and the Conservative Democrats 1.

The press points out that the Communist party has had the strongest gains and is in fact the third strongest party, having received more votes than the Progressive party. Despite this, however, the Communist party receives less seats than the Progressive party. Pure arbitrariness on the part of the government has altered the real results in favor of the government.

A Million Unemployed In Czechoslovakia

Prague, Oct. 7.—At the last session of the socio-political committee of the Czechoslovakian senate the representative of the Ministry for Public Welfare declared that unemployment figures in Czechoslovakia had now risen over the million mark. The number of registered unemployed was now about 500,000. The tendency was a rising one.

Revolutionary Soldiers on Trial

Warsaw, Oct. 9.—The trial of 28 soldiers of the Warsaw garrison has now begun before the Warsaw court. These soldiers are charged with having carried on communist propaganda amongst their comrades in conjunction with non-military persons.

A trial of 32 workers has begun in Sosnovitch (Dombrova coal district) on charges of being members of the illegal Communist party, of having taken part in illegal communist congress and having attacked policemen.

Socialist Workers for Anti-War Congress

Paris, Oct. 2.—The disciplinary action being taken by the Central Committee of the French Socialist party against those of its branches and members who answered the appeal of Henri Barbusse and Romain Rolland to take part in the preparation of the International Anti-War Congress in Amsterdam is meeting with strong resistance from the rank and file of the Socialist party. A number of branches have adopted protest resolutions and yesterday a meeting of 700 members of the Socialist party took place in Paris and listened to speeches on the issue. A resolution was adopted by 700 against 40 votes expressing complete approval of the action of those members and officials of the Socialist party who cooperated in the International Anti-War Congress, protesting against the measures of the Central Committee and against the one-sided reporting of the official party organ "la Populaire" and calling for room in the "Populaire" for the articles of the pro-congress elements and for the immediate holding of a national congress in order to discuss the whole question and affiliate the party to the permanent anti-war committee. Up to the present "la Populaire" has not even mentioned this most important meeting and resolution.

hows and associates, whom he now shuns, too stuck-up or maybe too ashamed to meet.

"Nobody ever thought Bill Adams capable of such a thing," said one of his old neighbors, an old cronie.

"Of all men, Bill Adams, selling himself so quick and for such a measly mess of pottage. No more than got into office than he moved in with the bankers and old gang. Funny how some seemingly good men when put into office swell up like a poisoned toad and out-respectable the respectable. But I never thought Bill Adams would go that route. Its too bad. Election day Bill is likely to have a broken heart. I am sorry for him, I had lots of confidence in him, but I am going to vote for Robert Johnson, the Communist candidate who is not ashamed to take an honest stand for the farmers and workers, and tell the world." So said another of Bill's neighbors today.

About a year and a half ago, Wm. Adams, member of the Progressive Farmers, United Farmers League, leader of the local farm-labor party, and Communist sympathizers, got the endorsement of his neighbors for county commissioner to fill a vacancy caused by resignation, as a result of the activities of his red friends and neighbors. The Plentywood reds, whom Adams came to see, supported his candidacy also, so Adams got the appointment. His neighbors said here is a man we can depend on to stand by the farmers.

As soon as appointed, the bankers started to pat him on the back and invited him to little parties, and the ink was hardly dry on his appointment before he deserted those who had secured his appointment. He grew more respectable every day. In a short time to went over to the gang, and in order to be sure of re-election to this stinking little job, he filed for nomination on the republican ticket—a capitalist party that he had so long and loudly denounced and scorned.

Well he got the nomination, but he lost the high respect of his neighbors. His friends' disgust was changed into contempt when they saw the bankers and the gang out actively campaigning for their old red neighbor, now a renegade. They remember the renegade commissioners of Sheridan county and their end. They hate to believe it of Bill, but they must believe what their eyes see. They wonder naturally whether the American Legion leaders are for the workers or for the big bankers, the veterans or those that exploit them and shot them when they asked for their bonus to feed the thousands of their comrades who are starving in this capitalistic depression.

The people at all of the meetings listened attentively to Comrade Taylor explain the Communist platform and program and define the Communist way out of the present crisis. He made a lot of Communists on his tour.

Posters for the Communist party and candidates have appeared everywhere and are up now in places impossible a short year ago. Communist candidates' cards can be found in farmers' houses all over the county. Communist sentiment is surprisingly good in all parts of this county.

Liberty Party Nominates

When the Liberty leaders, who had been inactive before, heard that the Communists had put a ticket in the field, they got busy and called a convention. The call was deficient, but they rushed a ticket into the field for the campaign, nominating three candidates, two for the legislature and a candidate for the office of county superintendent of schools. One of the candidates for the legislature nominated by this party is discredited by J. W. Anderson, several times the republican sheriff of this county, defeated for nomination two years ago, who left office under a cloud of graft, with a grand jury mandate instructing the county attorney to bring action to recover about \$8,000 for fraudulent and illegal fees which he had collected during his tenure of office.
