"Prospects are better than any time since the beginning of the strike five months ago, and the boys are determined that it shall be a fight to the finish. The decision of Judge O'Brien (which has caused the emissaries of the company to charge him with being a foe to law and order) relative to his injunction against parading the strikers, and by which the hands

in the district is owned by the company and if it should succeed in evicting the strikers for non-payment of rent, 75 per cent of the

population would be homeless! there would be no chance of having the thousands vitally concerned in the struggle. Ten or twelve in a family is the rule rather than the exception among the strikers' miners of Michigan - thirty the sad children homeless!

In fifty years a Grand Jury has been called, and this one is composed of men working for the Company. And every one of them is a member of the Citizen's Alliance. This organization was formed in the Copper district some time during the month of November, its avowed purpose being to hasten the end of the strike by forcing the officials of the Western Federation of Miners to leave the district, claiming that they were agitators and a menace to its future welfare and prosperity.
