Petition of the Renter's Union.

The Executive Committee of the Renter's Union of Texas has prepared the following petition to be submitted to Governor Colquitt in which he is asked to call the Thirty-fourth Legislature together in session at the first possible moment. The thirty-third legislature any day which will be November 4th, 1914 and that failing in this project we call upon the governor who will take office in January, 1915 to pay heed to the requests embodied in the said petition.

To O. B. Colquitt, Governor of Texas:

Dear Sir:

You have repeatedly pointed out during the past three months that something must be done for the cotton farmer and renter, to save laborers of Texas and the small merchant, all of whom are so weary of bankruptcy and poverty due to circumstances over which they have no control and with which you are thoroughly familiar. The last legislature has, as you have pointed out, done nothing. As though they were in session 60 days at a cost of \$100,000. Can we hope that better results will come from the Thirty-fourth legislature? Believing that anything is possible because the situation grows darker every hour, we respectfully request you to call the legislature in session to act as follows:

First: Pass a moratorium or stay law preventing the collection of any and all debts for a period of 6 months.

Second: Issue bonds in the usual legal manner of small organizations for the purpose of building factories to be owned and operated by the people of the manufacturing section of the state. The operators of the said factories to be employed on eight hours a day at the prevailing rate of union wages.

Third: Pass a law to restrict the acreage in which cotton can be planted to not more than 20 acres at the ratio of 20 acres to each quarter section or a 160 acre farm.

Fourth: Recommend to the senate that they initiate a constitutional amendment that shall have for its object the taxing of all lands held out of use for speculative purposes to their full rental value. This amendment being to Section 8 Article 9 of the present constitution that now provides that no land shall be taxed for more than 35 cents on the \$100.

We believe that if you present these propositions to the legislature, they will carry, provided that there are big enough men to grapple with the present deplorable situation. If they are not, then we ask you to call the legislature together in session at the first possible moment. There is presented to them a petition of not less than 150,000 Texas citizens of voting age who believe that these measures should be so acted into law.

Believing that you will give this commination your most careful consideration, I subscribe myself on behalf of the committee.
