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National Election Returns

Texas Returns.

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The vote cast for the Socialist party shows an immense increase in every portion of the United States. Once again will the voice of labor be heard in the halls of congress. The Socialists have captured Tammany Hall's greatest stronghold on the east side of New York City by electing Meyer London, the champion of the oppressed working men of the first Socialist congressman from America's metropolis. The New York Call, the Socialist party's English daily, publishes the result as follows:

Meyer London, third the Socialist Party candidate for Congress from the Twelfth New York Congressional District, was elected by 1,031 plurality vote over Henry M. Goldstein, the Tammany opponent. Goldstein was reported by gone to Congress from that district since 1902. Again and again the toilers of the great East Side of New York have made desperate efforts to dislodge this enemy to the cause of labor from office which was gained by intimidating and brooding the workers.

Meyer London was the candidate for Congress two years ago, and then it was conceded by people on the inside of the Tammany ring that London's election was stolen.

But it was the grim determination of the working people of the East Side this time that at an honest count the Socialist vote must be had at all costs. They carried on a splendid campaign of education. Hundreds of street meetings were held every day and night and over a quarter million pieces of literature were distributed with the result that their energetic work finally bore fruit. Meyer London, elected by 1,031 votes. It is said that if he fairly honest count were, several London's plurality would exceed 1,500 mark.

It is believed that congressmen may be elected from other points to assist London in his battle against the entrenched plutocrats of the national house of Representatives. In cracy that now controls the national house of Representatives, the Milwaukee race within a few hundred votes of electing Winfield R. MILWAUKEE, Wis., Nov. 5.—By no more than 392 votes Winfield R. Gaylord and Victor L. Berger, Socialist Party candidates in the Fourth and Fifth Congressional Districts, were beaten. Notwithstanding this, the Socialists captured every important office, in the county. The Congressional candidates carried the city wards but lost in the suburbs, which are part of the Congressional Districts.

The shon sweep in the county came to the capitalist politicians like a thunderbolt from the clear sky; while it surprised the Socialists beyond all expectations.

The Socialists elected the district attorney, the county clerk, the county treasurer, one State senator with strong probabilities that we may carry the county clerk about in the trial war.

SOCIALISTS WIN

Oklahoma City, Okla., Nov. 6.—The Socialists have elected, in this state, one Oklahoma, one representative, and the Socialist vote is increasing as the returns come in.

There is still a chance that later returns will elect one

Socialist congressman. Hundreds of township and county officials have been elected.

The Daily Oklahoman, that has persistently suppressed all mention of the Socialists during the campaign, says of the result:

"The Socialists polled a heavy vote in all southern counties of the state and in a number on ahead of the Republican ticket."

"In one or two western counties the Socialist candidate for governor, Fred W. Holt, received more votes than either Fields or Williams." Two latter were the Republican and Democratic candidates.

The above news will set the heart of every Socialist beating with joy. It clearly shows that the workers in the South are at last awakening from their lengthy sleep and realize full well who their friends are and from now on we will progress with leaps and bounds.

The Socialist representatives from Oklahoma will attack the Dead Machine of Oklahoma City from the State Legislature and thus can do work of immense value to the working class. The capitalist representatives will be placed on record, labor measures will be introduced as never before and a ray of light will come into the eyes of the workers' lives.

In Oklahoma's sister state of the north, Kansas, the Socialist party made immense gains. Our pollsters George L. Brewer, the veteran of a thousand fights and editor of the "Worker's Chronicle" has been elected to the state legislature by the votes of the oil miners in Crawford Co. This in spite of the fact that the Democrats and Republicans combined on most of the offices. The Socialists also elected the sheriff, probate judge and other officers.

Coming south again we find that the Socialists at Wood County carried the Cabin Creek District which was the center of the gigantic fight between the miners and their masters last year. They elected all district officials and polled over 4,000 votes. The courages are making the welkin ring with their song: "Oh Buddy, I am longing for my party."

In Illinois four members are elected to the legislature and many more ago expected when the final returns are in.

Away out on the Pacific Coast there is great jubilation because the Socialists have stormed the stronghold of the infamous Vets and sent four representatives from Los Angeles to the state legislature at Sacramento.

James H. Maurer, member of the national executive committee of the Socialist party and president of the Pennsylvania State Federation of Labor has been elected to the state legislature. Other state capitals that have been invaded are Massachusetts, New York, Ohio. When the official returns are published it is safe to say with out the slightest trace of exaggeration that never before in the history of the United States were there so many representatives of militant labor voicing the ideals, aspirations and ambitions of our class in the law making bodies of the land. The Rebel salutes these worthy champions of labor and wishes them God speed in their fight. We commend the workers who are wise enough to defend it, their wives and children by electing their own representatives. Hats off to the courages of the nation who are making history here. We publish below returns from boxes and precincts in 100 counties in Texas. While the figures are meager they are the only returns of the Socialist party's vote and its immense gain published in any newspaper in Texas, up to the time of writing, which is 7 days after election.

For the first time in the history of our party in the state, we have elected many important county officers. In Grand old Van Zandt we swept the city of Grand Saline as the following dispatch to the Rebel shows:

Straight Socialist ticket carried Grand Saline Precinct, by a majority of 28 votes, resulting in the election of the following Socialist officers: C. C. Green, Constable. Socialists made substantial gains all over Van Zandt county. At Sand Flat the vote was Socialist 70, Democrats and Republicans combined only 30. Socialist majority 40. Sand Flat box is in Grand Saline Precinct.

In Lavaca county, the home of the Rebel, we carried precincts 4 and 5, elected justice of the peace and constable and failed in electing a commissioner by a few votes and made an all around increase of over 300 per cent. In Falls county a similar increase was made and several boxes were carried for the Socialist ticket.

In Collin and Grayson counties we carried several boxes and in fact all through the black land county a splendid increase has been shown since nothing save the enormous money paid to the Democrats, although tradition and being recalled by the July primary prevented us from carrying some of these counties. The Courier Gazette of McKinney, one of the most conservative landowner organs of the state, confesses as much as does the Sherman Democrat which states that: "The way in which the Democrats can be gotten out into next time will be by giving each Democrat a few truck-laden, and cause the Socialist to pay a high price for their road."

It is expected that when the official vote is in that from 75 to 100 boxes throughout the state will have been carried by the Socialist party. Boxes such as Pear Valley in McDowell Co. where the vote stood 58-42.

The attitude of the big papers towards the election returns is striking to say the least of it. Not since the railroads and telegraphs were introduced to any extent in Texas has a gubernatorial election been so poorly reported. Were it not for the resources of the state office and the splendid corps of volunteer workers through the state we would not be in a position to give any idea of the Socialist vote. If we had to depend on the muzzled press, three days after election a half-dozen papers in the southwest the San Antonio Express did not carry one line of information of the vote of any party in the state. Their theory seemed to be: "Ferguson is elected, what is the use?" The Dallas News states editorially that not in 20 years has the financial vote been so pathetic as in this election and that out of about 700,000 votes not less than 250,000 were cast for all parties. They would indicate that while there are a great many more voters than in 1912 so much Ferguson will secure a most many loss votes than he got in 1912 by his pre-processor and will probably fall way below the 250,000 mark.

The Dallas News and all other dailies of the state concede that E. R. Meitzen, the Socialist candidate, has beaten F. M. Ehrig, the Progressive party candidate, and John W. Phillips, the Republican party candidate. Meitzen has beaten the Progressive about 5 to 1 and the Republican about 2 to 1. In this connection it should be remembered that Meitzen is the second time in his career that he has beaten the Republican and Progressive, and in so much as the Progressive party has dwindled almost out of sight in this election and the Republican party is confessedly only in existence for postmasteries and other political spoils from the Federal government, it is in short a party without real aspirations or hope of success we now know that the Socialist party is the only party left in the state to grapple with the degenerate donk.

The figures that we have received from our watchers show that E. R. Meitzen has received 7,335 to J. E. Ferguson's 14,578. It must be remembered that these figures do not represent more than a title of the vote in this election. The figures are the scattering returns from single boxes in 100 counties and are not official. The official counting commences this week in every courthouse in the state and it may be two weeks more before we are in receipt of the official returns. Judging by the report published above from our watchers E. R. Meitzen will poll an enormous vote when the full returns are in and now for the first time it is possible to go into the campaign of 1916 at once with an even chance of becoming the first party in the state.
