OFFICERS TO BE ELECTED

All Socialist League, county and district secretaries, should note that on October 1st the new constitution requires the holding of elections. Nominations are first to be called for. Those who are nominated must be notified. Those who accept nominations are to be placed on a ballot and sent to all secretaries in the district affected. A tabulated vote is to be sent by locals to the Co. Secretary, who in turn sends the election to the district secretary and he to the State Secretary. In unorganized districts or counties the local secretary sends tabulated result to state secretary.
