I ask of you, do devise some other means, but do continue publishing daily our own smallness on your front page, acknowledging our own weakness.—Contributor to The Call's One Day's Wage Fund.

What does the man mean who wrote those lines? He is a Socialist. A friend of The Call. He gives his money to help The Call. And he honestly thinks that printing The Call's One Day's Wage Fund on the first page shows Weakness and Smallness.

So the world of Capitalism obscures realities, puts folly in infiduous place and builds substance up from the shadows of things that never were.

How does the Wage Fund on The Call's first page show smallness or weakness? It can show smallness and weakness in but a single way. In the matter of money, and in the matter of money only.

True, The Call has small financial means and it is money weak. But when did money become the test of a newspaper's strength? What is the purpose of The Call? Is it true to that purpose? Those are the questions to ask and answer.

SAY DE LARA SHALL NOT DIE

City Where Mexican Revolutionist Was Arrested Holds Great Protest Meeting. 4,000 EXECRATE CZAR

Working-Class of Los Angeles Takes Lead in Struggle to Throw Mexican Despot. (Special to The Call) LOS ANGELES, Cal., Oct. 24.—Four thousand people gathered in the Municipal Auditorium last night at a great meeting of protest against the arrest and attempted extradition of L. Esteban de Lara, the Mexican revolutionist and Socialist organizer, who was arrested here on October 5, and is held in the county jail, pending the action of the immigration commission on the demand of the Mexican despot, Diaz, for his deportation on charges of being an "alien anarchist."

EUROPE SEETHING

Barcelona Revolt Merely Index of General Condition. ITHACA, N. Y., Oct. 24.—That American social workers and students conducting investigations in Europe should beware of arrest and especially keep away from Slavonia and Barcelona are statements made by Howard Scott Creswell, Cornell '07, in a letter to Professor Frank Fetter, of Cornell University. Creswell has been traveling in Europe for several years conducting a series of investigations of economic and social conditions. He writes: "Beware of social studies in Slavonia and Bohemia. They do their best in these countries to arrest everyone they can for political reasons. Above all do not make any investigations in Barcelona or the Catholic provinces which hang you, Paris and Brussels, however, are two good spots for operations."

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Strong resolutions were adopted denouncing the infamous rule of Diaz and expressing horror and indignation at the prospect of the United States government co-operating with the murderous designs of the blood-stained tyrant across the border by handing another victim into his clutches. Judge John D. Works presided, and the speakers were Job Harriman, the well known Socialist orator; Stanley B. Wilson and John Kenneth Tamm, the writer, who was accompanied by De Lara on a trip to gather material for his series of articles in the American Magazine exposing conditions in Mexico. Volley after volley of applause rang forth in indorsement of the thrilling declarations of the speakers, and the meeting was raised by collection for De Lara's legal defense, which has been undertaken by the Socialist party, under whose auspices the meeting was held. De Lara's extradition would mean his certain death, and it is expected that the example set by Los Angeles will be immediately followed by Socialist and trade union organizations throughout the country in order to save De Lara from the fate which Francisco Ferrer met in Spain, and from which Pouden and Rudowing, the Russian revolutionists, were preserved only by the prompt and determined action of the labor movement, which had already proved the power of its unanimous action in the Meyer Haywood-Pettibone case.

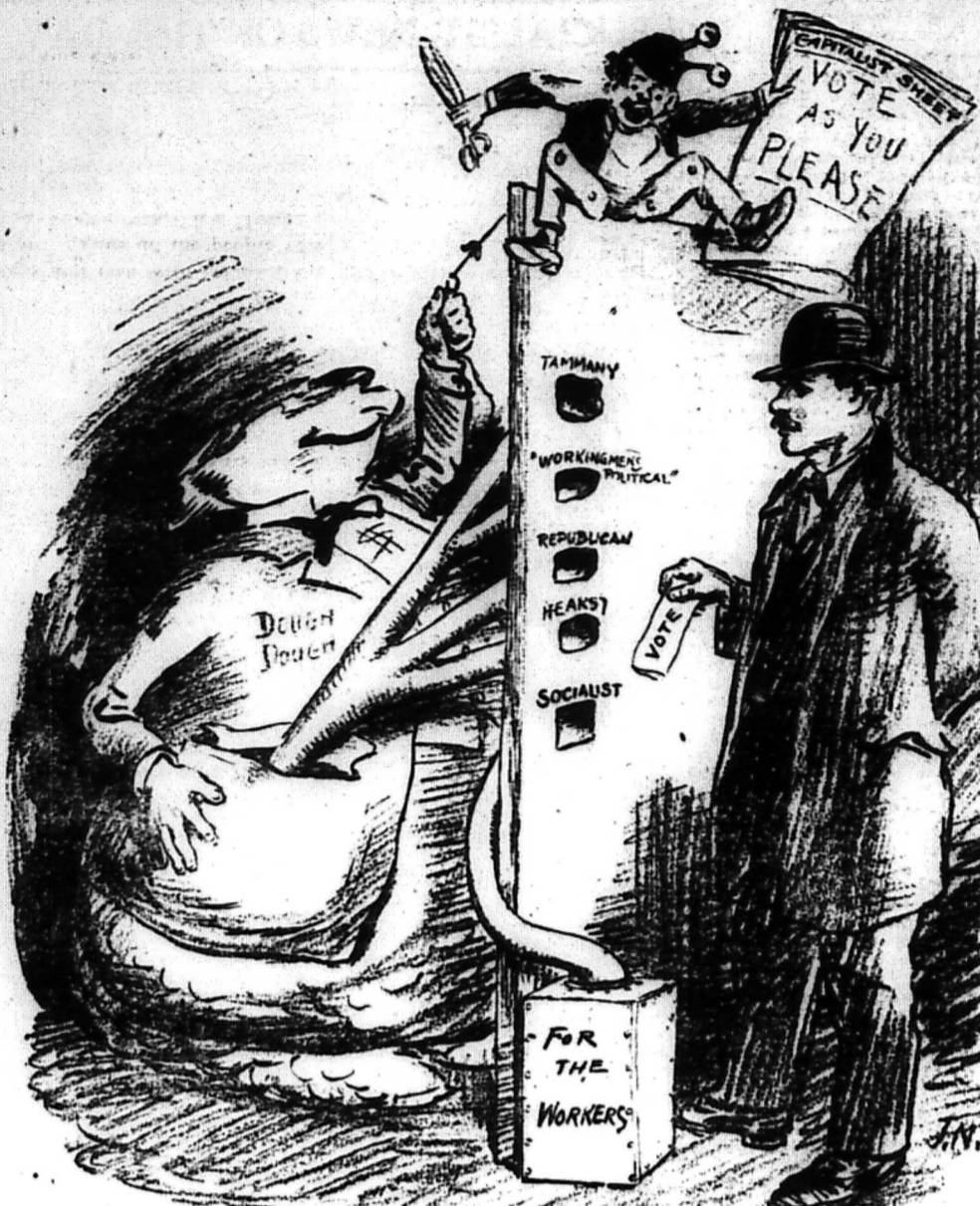
"You have all heard of a great reformer named Cutting, haven't you?" said Gaynor. "You have heard of the Cutting estate, haven't you?"
