The latest "banking scandal" in this city was nothing more nor less than a repetition, on a smaller scale, of the famous "banking scandal" of 1907. It also ended in the same way. The great bankers, headed by the greatest of them all, J. P. Morgan, "came to the rescue" by gobbling up some of their weaker rivals and fastening their grip upon others.

The paid press organs of the great banking interests are now telling the public that the officers of the Carnegie Trust Company were dangerous characters, who had to be eliminated for the good of the "financial community" as a whole.
