MORGES POLITICAL ACTION FOR LABOR
Fraternal Delegate Roberts' Suggestion Greeted With Much Applause.

AUDITORIUM ARMORY, AT LANTA, Ga., Nov. 18.—Another blast struck the throne of the American Federation of Labor when Fraternal Delegate G. H. Roberts, of the British Trades Union Congress, poured out in favor of working class political action into the convention in session here.

Fraternal Delegate Roberts is the only one of the Labor party in the British House of Commons, and spent the forenoon at the Atlantic in discussing the advantages of political action and the benefit that it had been to the British workers.

Following almost immediately upon the report of Vice President James Duncan, as delegate to the International Secretariat, at Budapest, Hungary, in which he showed the success of the Socialist trade union alliance, the effect is rather disconcerting to President Samuel Gompers and other reactionaries in the A. F. of L.

Since 1900 the British Trades Union Congress has set up as a part of its ordinary work a Labor party to act in the House of Commons," said Roberts, who is accompanied to this country by Fraternal Delegate J. Cronin, also representing the British Trades Union Congress.

"I believe it is now widely acknowledged by the organized workers of Great Britain that our labor movement could never have occupied the proud position it fills today, but that it has added one more to the older functions that characterized trades union movements previous to the calling into existence of that body."

"While in Great Britain we have a great deal to lament, still our trades unions are progressing," said Roberts. "Older methods are being discarded; small ineffective organizations are being eliminated; the principle of amalgamation is more and more resorted to, so that I confidently believe that ere another decade has passed Great Britain's labor forces will appear before the world as among the best organized and most effective of international working class organizations."

GAVE HIM LOVE TOKEN SHE HAD STOLEN
WILKES-BAHRE, Pa., Nov. 19.—James Franklin left this section for the West fifteen years ago. Before going he called on one of his girl friends and as he was leaving she presented him with a gold watch and chain.

MASSACRE RUMORS ARE NOT CONFIRMED

LONDON, Nov. 20.—The Daily Telegraph's dispatches from Peking say that the legends have learned semi-officially that Russia, alarmed at the dubiousness of the situation and the military dispositions of other powers, is now preparing to mobilize reserves in the Pacific provinces of Eastern Siberia.

SOCIALISTS HOLD MONSTER PROTEST
Danville Sees Giant Demonstration Against Tyranny of Injunction Judge.
DANVILLE, Ill., Nov. 19.—Organized labor and Socialism gave its opinion of government by injunction this afternoon in a monster parade through Danville's streets, and at a mass meeting at the Grand Opera House, which was called for the purpose of protesting against six members of the union being sent to jail here without trial on charges that they had violated the Federal Court's injunction.

SECOND CLASS MAIL PRIVILEGE EXTENDED
WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—A new ruling by Postmaster General Hitchcock, recently issued, is of interest to all trade unions having official publications. This latest ruling grants a full year as the period in which the publications are entitled to the second class privilege after subscriptions have expired.

MEYER WANTS GOVT. CLERKS PENSIONED
To Recommend Retirement System for Care of Aged Employees.
WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—Secretary of the Navy Meyer will recommend legislation increasing the pay of employees of the Navy Department and establishing a retirement system for Civil Service employees in his annual report to be published shortly. Mr. Meyer believes that the clerical employees of the navy are paid less than persons employed in similar work in private life.

ANGLO-GERMAN WAR NARROWLY AVERTED
England on Tiptoe for Statement on Liberal Foreign Policy.
BERLIN, Nov. 19.—It is stated that Sir Edward Grey's Anglo-German statement in the House of Commons has been delayed because Germany and Great Britain are collaborating upon a formal announcement which is to be issued in both countries simultaneously.

SECRETARY MACVEAGH FAVORING PENSIONS
WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—Secretary of the Treasury MacVeagh will make the pension retirement system for government clerks a feature of his annual report to Congress. He states: "I always have favored the contributory system of pensions, and favor it with the best interests of the clerks in view."

U. S. TROOPS AGAIN ORDERED SENT TO MEXICAN BORDER
Will Co-operate With Civil Authorities on Rio Grande.
REYES IS CONFIDENT
Thinkers Arrest is Result of Influence of Maderists.
SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Nov. 19.—The menacing conditions on the Texas border become that a patrol of United States troops will be established on the Rio Grande at once to co-operate with the civil authorities in the enforcement of neutrality.

VIOLATED 'ETHICS' OF PLUTES' CLUB

Wiehe, his confidential man, must face charges that they violated the ethics of the club in connection with the Lorimer-Funk scandal, in which it is charged that Hines attempted to secure money from Funk for the fund "that put Lorimer over."

WILD NIGHT ENDS IN DEATH AND ARREST
CHICAGO, Nov. 19.—Two youthful bandits, who attempted to end a night of revelry in the Red Light district with a taxicab and the robbery of the chauffeur, met a tragic ending of their criminal career early today, when one of them was shot and killed by the intended victim of the hold-up and the other was placed under arrest after a chase and a revolver battle with a policeman.

WORKER TRIES SUICIDE DREADING THE WINTER
YORK, Pa., Nov. 19.—Dread of a hard winter and believing that he was a burden on his children with whom he lived, William Ort, 63 years of age, today attempted suicide by slashing his throat with a razor. He is in a critical condition.

STEAMSHIP GOES ASHORE
LONDON, Nov. 19.—An unidentified four-masted steamship went ashore in a gale on the Shingles off the Thames Estuary this evening. A lifeboat has gone to the vessel's assistance.

INSTANTLY KILLED ON RAILROAD
A Jersey Central yard locomotive ran over and instantly killed a clean-shaven, brown haired young man at the Claremont avenue station in Jersey City last night as he was crossing the tracks to catch a train. The man had the return coupon of an excursion ticket to New York, and a receipt showing that G. Grinnans had sent a \$25 money order to Marie Grinnans, a Bristol, Conn. friend, in his pocket. The body was sent to Rocher's morgue.

BLIND, BUT WELL UP IN BUSINESS METHODS
John Frank Coughlin, a blind man living at 338 West 24th street, was arraigned before Magistrate McQuade in the Tombs Court yesterday afternoon charged with grand larceny. The complaint was Chester T. Beck, of 189 Franklin street.

SPAIN MAY GIVE UP PART OF MOROCCO
PARIS, Nov. 19.—Telegrams from Madrid show signs of a more conciliatory disposition on the part of Spain toward France. The determination heretofore displayed to make the retention of Larache and El-Ksar an essential condition of a Franco-Spanish agreement seems to be yielding before the consideration that it is impossible for Tangier, which is to be internationalized, to be separated from the political capital of Morocco by a barrier of Spanish territory.
