He went on to say that the mill owners are misrepresenting affairs when they state that they cannot afford to pay the same wage for fifty-four hours as they did when the employes worked fifty-six hours a week.

"I contend," said he, "that the machines are speeded up, they are improved so that they turn out more work in less time; that the workers themselves are obliged to work harder and that thereby the amount produced is as great as under the fifty-six hour rule."



IN BE INVESTIGATED TRUST ARE ASSAILED

Senator Borah Scores Long Hours of Labor and Horrible Conditions.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26 .- The United States Steel Corporation was taken to task today for the "hell holes"

en to task today for the "hell holes" it maintains, where it works men twelve hours a day, by United States Senater Borah.

The sizzling arraignment of the Steel Trust was made by Borah at a hearing hefore the Senate Committee on Education and Labor on the House bill, which would impose an eighthour labor restriction on all government contract work. Chairman Borah, of the committee, said some industries had gone so far as to need federal attention.

"From the reports of the Depart-

dustries had gone so far as to need federal attention.

"From the reports of the Department of Commerce and Labor on the steel industry," said the Senator, "it is shown that the Steel Corporation is paying millions of dollars in dividends, and yet they have in their hell-holes men who work twelve hours a day seven days a week, and others who work eighteen to twenty-four hours in one shift. No man who has taken an oath of office can isnote this."

James E, Emery, counsel and lobbyist for the National Association of Manufacturers, objected that the employing manufacturers should not be made "the vicarious victims of abuses existing only in one industry."

Emery was put on the job by the National Manufacturers' Association, of which Harrison Gray Otis, of Los Angeles Times fame, is the moving spirit, to attack the eight-hour bill. He called the provision vague and ambiguous, though there is nothing vague about it to any one except the manufacturers who are guilty of maintaining "hell-holes."



MINERS' DEMANDS

Workers Want Too Much, Bituminous Coal Barons Think.

INDIANAPOLIS, Jan. 26 .- Strong opposition to the demands of the United Mine Workers for shorter hours and higher wages was voiced here today by the chief bituminous coal operators of the United States. The interstate joint wage conference, composed of the miners and operators, made little progress as a result.

Operators said the demands of the miners for a seven-hour work day and an approximate general increase of 20 per cent were "exorbitant." The attitude of the operators caused considerable talk regarding a

strike by the miners when the pres-ent contracts expire on March 31. Delegates to the miners international convention here gathered in groups and discussed the situation. The general statement was that arbitra tion and conciliation should be exhausted before there was serious con-

sideration of a strike.

Many of the leaders of the miner assert that the operators desire suspension of work because it helps

business.

Counter demands as presented by the operators included a 10 per cent reduction in wages, the abolition of the system of paying for the mining of coal before it is screened and the limitation of the check off, by which the union dues are collected by the operator out of the mine workers' wages. The dues are then turned over to the union officials.

Although only representatives of the operators and miners of Ohio, Indiana and Illinois, and Western Pennsylvania are in the joint wage.
