The American Tobacco Company, or he Tobacco Trust, has found a way of paying "the highest wages" and yet coming across to its employes with no more money than if it had been paying not the highest but lowest This miracle is worked by the To

acco Trust through a system of fines The employes of the trust, mostly young girls and women, are fined for everything—even for sighing when they are tired. The system of fines has been in operation for a considera-ble length of time in all of the trust establishments. On Tuesday of las week the limit to this fining system

employes found that their day's earn-ings had been cut down by approximately 20 cents for each of them. They were told that it was a fine. As is customary in the trust shops, no questions are alked. But when the girls were outside the factory on the sidewalk they held a little conference, cursed the forewoman and a few be-gan to cry. The word "strike" was gan to cry. The trust has trained the girls to suspect each other and hone of them dared to suggest the calling of a strike for fear that the might be betrayed by the next on




