WOMEN'S CLUBS OPEN BIENNIAL CONVENTION

Over 5,000 Persons Present at Opening Session in San Francisco.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 25.—With 5,000 men and women present, 3,000 of them delegates from every corner of this country and from over seas the eleventh biennial convention of the General Federation of Women's Clubs opened here today.

The opening of the convention proper took place this evening and started with a debate on national woman suffrage. Federation government and other subjects that will occupy the women delegates for ten days to come.

The men who were here to speak included H. L. Weil, secretary of the National Playground Recreation Association; Capt. J. B. White, of the National Conservation Congress; H. H. Gross, president National Home League; William Hard, the author; Hector Alliot, the artist; Clinton Rogers Woodruff, of the National Consumers' League; J. Horace McFarland, of the American Civic Association; and Overton W. Price, forestry expert, of Washington.

Among those who made up the long roster of celebrated women speakers in San Francisco today were Prof. Maria Sanford, of the University of Michigan; Louise Graham, a journalist; Mrs. Frederick Nathan, of the National Consumers' League; Miss Laura Drake Gill, D. C. L. of the University of the South; Mrs. A. Barton Miller, of the Women's Rivers and Harbors Commission; Dr. Rachel Varros, social worker of Hull House; Mrs. A. F. Morrison, of the National Collegiate Alumnae; Dr. Jessica Pilott, of the University of California; Mrs. Philip Carpenter, LL. B.; Mrs. Francis Equires Porter and Miss Julia C. Lathrop, of the National Children's Bureau, Washington, and Baroness Caron Suttner, the celebrated Austrian author, who will plead for world peace.

There was not a woman's organization in this country, it was said, that was not represented by its president or other officer here. The council for the first discussion of campaign plans that are to stir the biennial took up the "Pennsylvania plan" and general revision of by-laws, also new resolutions to be introduced, endowment plans for the year where by the women's clubs will assist girls all over the country to an education.

At the great meeting this evening, after an invocation by Dr. Luella Clay Caron, president of Mills College, Mrs. Philip N. Moore, of St. Louis, the national president, introduced Mrs. E. G. Dennison, president of the local Biennial Board, as the presiding officer of the evening.

The retiring president holds that the federated clubwomen of America have no platform unless it be the broad platform summed up in "women, children and home," meaning in the last analysis, she declares, not only the individual home, but the city, State and nation.

CHINA KICKS OVER TRACES ON LOAN

State Department Announced Today that the Chinese Government has rejected the plan agreed upon by the international group of bankers at Paris recently for the supervision and control of the expenditures of the "six Power" loan.

PEKING, June 25.—The foreign bankers in this city have informed the Chinese Government that their principals in Europe and America insist on even stronger measures of supervision over the proposed loan than those suggested by the Peking bankers.

Lu Chen Hsing, Minister of Foreign Affairs, who is acting Premier, informed the financiers that China would not borrow money on such terms, and the deadlock continues.

Farmers in Shanai province have successfully resisted an official who, with the aid of troops, tried to destroy the opium crop. Many of the soldiers were killed, and the entire province is up in arms against the authorities.
