They may hide that record of shame in the Senate document room, but they cannot prevent the story of the hideous shame of Lawrence being made known to the whole world. Their very act in trying to seal it from the citizens of this country, who have every right to know, will only further emphasize the true story of Lawrence.

It is a sordid tale, told in dollars and cents, human lives, brutality, official incompetency, merciless exploitation and hunger

One-third of the Lawrence mill workers receive less than \$7 a ek, and that only when they are working full time. The average full-time pay of the 21,922 operatives is 16 cents an hour, or \$9.60 a week of ten hours a day. There are a few hundred workers who have receive much more than this. The average is far below any such sum, and the average for the year, making allowance for the number of days and weeks when there is no work whatever, is far less than that.

Yet on such scant earnings the workers of Lawrence were expected to live, to raise children who would later go into the mills. to walk in the fear of God and the wholesome respect for the law, and uncomplainingly submit to any reductions or speeding up to which the mill owners saw fit to subject them.

So merciless was the slavery and so terrible the fear of starvation that child bearing women stuck desperately to their work until within a few days or even a few hours before their time, and were back again at the body racking grind a couple of days after they had given birth to a child. Father, mother and the children were all drawn into the industry.
