Non-Union Min Organize.

The Independent American Mechanics, a union of non-union men, filed articles of incorporation this week in Indianapolis, Ind. It is the first organization of the kind in this state and so far as is known the only one incorporated in the country.

According to the articles the objects of the association is to encourage and maintain amicable relations between employers and employees and to "defend its members against any and all attempts by any person or combination of persons to strike the faithful workers and operators thereof for such wages as shall be mutually satisfactory to the individual workman and his employer."

ANARCHISTS ARE HIS FRIENDS, SAYS THE KAISER.

Dear Sir:—

They Have Become Remarkably Active Against the Socialists in Berlin and Are Agitating Against an Increased Tariff.

Berlin, March 28.—An election draws nearer, the local Anarchists of which there are considerable numbers here, are becoming feverishly active. They have already prepared an election manifesto, are ready to issue an anarchistic daily paper, and have secret meetings and conferences every night.

Their efforts are, strangely enough, not directed against the government, but against the Socialists, whom they consider their worst enemies. They try to prove to the people that nothing can ever be gained by voting for any of the existing parties and point out that the Socialists in the Reichstag have never accomplished anything and that the petition of the people signed by more than three million voters as a protest against an increased tariff had no effect on the legislative bodies.

The government has taken no steps to restrict the Anarchistic agitation, as it is hoped that this will diminish the number of votes cast for Socialist candidates.

The Kaiser recently laughingly remarked to a personal friend that at the present time he had no more useful friends than the Anarchists.—Daily paper.

A WISE LABORER.

The Philadelphia Ledger calls attention to the fact that a few days ago Patrick Muldoon, familiarly known by the New York Bellevue hospital officials as "Old Method," resigned his position as a scrivener in that institution which he had held for thirty-five years.

When "Old Method" resigned his post he was 69 years of age. On the same day he asked the property clerk for his savings, which he had entrusted to him. The latter produced the money, which was in several packages, counted it, and found that the total was \$7,300, saved in thirty-five years out of a salary of \$1 a day. In other words, he had saved considerably over one-half his pay for that time. When "Old Method" received his money he quietly said: "That's the savings of thirty-five years at \$9 a month. I haven't feasted much away. Looks like enough for my old age."

"Old Method" He teaches the lesson that industry, faithfulness, and economy pay. His experience illustrates the necessity and advantage of laying up something for "the rainy day." He uttered an important truth when he said: "I haven't feasted much away." He has illustrated the truth of the old saying: "Take care of the penny and the pound will take care of themselves." It is the money foisted away which makes many a rich man poorer, and it is also the money foisted away which makes many a poor man poorer, keeps him poor all his life, and leaves him nothing to live on when he is too feeble to work. If the money foisted away were laid away, or better still, invested safely at the ordinary rates of interest from youth to the time when the years are but "labor and sorrow," old age would not be such a burden and its penalties would not be so severe as they are upon the man who has drifted along with no thought for the future, and foisted away the money which should have been kept as a help and relief in the time of old age. Mr. Muldoon is an ignorant man, it is said. He is a wise man. His "method" might be studied with profit, even by those who have more knowledge and more money than he.—Chicago Tribune.

Capitalism and capitalists are full of praise for the wage slave who will trudge along and "lay by" for a "rainy day." The worker who is content with a beggarly pittance of his earnings and will scold and plan to

lay some by for old age, is more to be pitied than commended. The long continuance of the strike had received as wages. This was a little better than 50c a day. Noble sacrifice to help capitalism make more profit.

AMINEWORKERS GIVES HIS OPINION ON RECENT AWARDS.

I have read with great avidity every word I could find in every paper I could get hold of, about the award of the strike commission, the various comments made by a great many different persons and the great many different parts of the award taken to establish the fact of a great victory. But, strange to say, the men that are affected by the award have not been asked to give their opinion on the matter. Now, without using any arguments or inducements to get the men to vote on a false record, let them by a secret ballot independently cast their opinion and if ever any action of a set of men was vehemently condemned I do honestly believe the action of these men will overwhelmingly be condemned. I have carefully read and re-read the award published in different papers and taken section by section the only ones that I can see that have derived any benefit from the heroic sacrifices made and sufferings endured are the contract miners, the firemen and a few engineers. BUT THE GREAT MAJORITY HAVE DERIVED NO BENEFIT WHATEVER FROM THE AWARD, and I have any one to successfully prove that they have not the men who have derived any benefit disbeliever that every one of the great majority will undoubtedly be forced to do just as much work in nine hours, after March 31, as they formerly did in ten hours. Just let those men who talk so much about our grand victory, as they are pleased to call it, wait until the new terms after the new system is into effect and see if my words do not come true. I have not worked forty years in the mines without learning many a bitter lesson. I can easily recall many occurrences that had to be endured by my fellow workers in the different labor organizations that have existed since the strike, but what I can't recall is to know that our condition has been steadily growing worse. For every time that the men were about to reap the benefit of the sacrifices made and the sufferings endured some method was found, either by hook or crook, to keep the men where they were. No doubt the commission think that they are themselves on the belief that they have done great good for the mine workers, but if they live for a short time longer they will surely discover that they made a very great mistake in not granting us the eight hour day as well as in not establishing a uniform scale of wages for the entire industry. There is no man that possesses any good common sense but who will acknowledge that it makes no difference whether a man does an honest day's work in the Shamokin or in the Scranton, Schuylkill or any other region, so long as he has to do the same work, but what he gets for it should be the same pay. To illustrate what I mean we will take a company leader in the Shamokin region and say that he leads from twenty-five to thirty tons of coal per day (and many lead more) and another leader in another region leads the same amount, but in the latter case he is paid with a scope shovel, now why should the man in the other region for like collector for that matter receive more pay than in this region, and yet so far as I can find out such is the case. Surely men in other regions are not doing this slavish work for the beggarly pittance of six cents per ton? But what he ought to receive is the region that small remuneration.

West on "American Politics," assumes to analyze the situation pretty closely, and shows the anti-trust legislation of Congress to be simply a move to win favor and votes from the American people for the republican party. But the writer is alarmed at the growth of the Socialist vote in America, as witness the following:

"There is another significant and indicative phase of the campaign. The long continuance of the coal strike, with its consequent impoverishment and suffering, awakened a Socialist trend of thought which finally found formal expression in the declaration of the New York Democrats, in State convention assembled, that the Federal Government should assure the ownership of the coal mines. It was not natural that this feeling should be stimulated by the conditions which existed. Hundreds of thousands of people, ready and willing to buy coal, found themselves completely helpless and between the upper and nether millstones of striking miners and unyielding operators. The situation was intolerable and the only present relief but future avoidance seemed impossible. The conditions were to be allowed to continue without change. The effect of the coal strike upon the country from an economic and sociological point of view would, in itself, be an interesting study; but even from the standpoint of politics it must not be ignored. Immense gains were made by the Socialist in every state. They saw their opportunity to make an impression, and they labored earnestly. Unusual efforts to win votes were exerted in Pennsylvania, New York, Connecticut, and Massachusetts, the great manufacturing centers of the country. In Pennsylvania, a Socialist State ticket was nominated and the Socialist candidates ran in several districts. In the mining regions Socialist exhortations nightly addressed enormous crowds. In New York the propaganda was also active, while in Connecticut the Socialist leaders worked in harmony with the labor organizations. The result of this industrious missionary work was seen in the figures of the election returns. In the Socialist vote the Socialist strength increased to 24,000 as against 5,000 at the last election; in New York the gain was over 100 per cent; and in Ohio, 200 per cent. The Socialist vote in Cleveland increased from 700 last to
