

THE COAL STRIKE IS ON!

The coal mine strike was not stopped by Woodrow Wilson's letter. It was not stopped by the "mandatory injunction" of one little man sitting on a Federal bench in Indianapolis. And it will not be stopped by any order from officials who have no authority to veto the action of the Cleveland Convention.

The strike remains in full force and effect until the miners themselves decide to stop it. Up to date there has been no good reason advanced for them to change their original decision to stick it out until their demands are gained. Orders from union officials are worth no more than orders from a court unless there is some power to enforce them. And we have never yet seen any power in this country to make men work against their will. The constitution specifically prohibits involuntary servitude, and men who have heard so much talk about "Democracy" are poor subjects to attempt to force it on so suddenly.

The Rank and File of Organized Labor Supports the Miners

We will not here attempt to analyze the motives which led the Executive Council of the American Federation of Labor to pledge the support of the membership of the A. F. of L. to the coal miners in the strike and to issue a proclamation that in effect—defers the government. It is sufficient to say that the Gompers machine has been forced to openly state that the government and the courts are functioning for the capitalist class and against the workers.

One thing is very evident. The spirit of the organized file of the unions all over the country is such that no group of men, claiming to represent the unions, could refuse to support the miners and retain their leadership.

STRIKE! KRIEGER JURY DISAGREES No Verdict Reached After 42 Hours Deliberation and Jury is Discharged

TULSA, OKLA., Nov. 10.—The jury in the Charles Krieger case was discharged this morning, after 42 hours' deliberation, when every chance of a verdict being reached was precluded by the sharp disagreement. The first vote in the jury room was 7 to 5 for acquittal. The second vote was evenly divided. The third and final balloting gave seven for conviction and five for acquittal. The 12 men obviously had gone through a strenuous fight, their faces bearing all the marks of almost two days continuous argument, after a month spent in listening to testimony.

The state's case was closed by Flint Moss, Carter O'Grady attorney. Banking on the ignorance of his listeners, he resorted to a spurious attack on the I. W. W. and barely touched the evidence. His speech was probably one of the most shamefaced appeals for prejudice for the conviction of an innocent man that any jury has ever heard.

The effect was the more striking, increased with the smile of a man, come from the disbarred and shabby state trial lawyer who filled the room. He went on to say that it is not unlawful to belong to the I. W. W. organization. This is a neglect of the jury, but the great dawn of the morning has come when right action will be taken against the hands of those men who preach open defiance of the law.

Such was the burden of the argument on which he sought to convict the defendant of a specific, criminal act.

Fred Moore's Speech. Fred Moore spoke for three hours. His analysis of the evidence audited during the weeks of trial, and outlined clearly the black plot against the boy. The hung jury means another trial, but no date has as yet been fixed for the court. Meanwhile the ball was set at 2:30 and it is expected that Krieger will be under the bond in a few days.

One of the most noteworthy facts about the case, particularly evident on the last day, is the attitude of the Standard Oil lawyer, J. H.
